of cotton, plants need protection from thrips and other insects that delay growth in order to develop plants capable of setting a large number of early squares. During the next 21 days, squares to bloom, early squares should be given maximum protection, as these squares are the ones that should develope into bolls the grower must take to the gin if he is to get the most net profit from his crop.

Well developed plants will put on more than a bale of squares during this 21 day period, with fleahoppers, lygus and overwintered boll weevils the principal insects.

When insecticides are applied before the squares are 1/3rd grown, their use should have little affect on the bollworm problem. Beneficial insects that often aid in keeping down bollworm damage usually move


