Flomot is Assured Fine Water Supply

A MODERN water system will soon serve 55 customers in the Flomot community. A certified check for \$55,000 was delivered here Friday by O. R. Stark of the First National Bank of Quitaque to officers of the Flomot water corporation. The loan is secured by the Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration.

An excellent well of water has been located just north of the Flomot Memorial Cemetery on James Williams land, and 8,100 acre purchased with negative water easements on five acres contributed. Contractors expect to have water flowing in the new system within 30 days.

The new system will have a 30,000 gallons pressure storage tank. The system will also serve several businesses, the school and two churches. The water is of excellent quality.

Engineering was performed by Biggs & Matthews of Wichita Falls. Legal services were rendered by Ben P. Ayers of Floydada.

The Flomot Water Corporation is composed of Leon Cloyd, Malcolm Turner and John F. Speer. The corporation has contributed \$1,934 toward the construction of the system. The loan is to be repaid over a period of 40 years.

Final details of the system were completed here Friday in the Commissioners Court room, where contracts were signed and arrangements discussed.

Loans are made to organizations operating on a non-profit basis, such as water districts. Since the beginning of the soil and water loan program FHA has made loans in Texas of over \$8 million.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

COTTON INSECT CONTROLS
During the first 30 day period of cotton, plants need protection from thrips and other insects that delay growth in order to develop plants capable of setting a large number of early squares. During the next 21 days, squares to bloom, early squares should be given maximum protection, as these squares are the ones that should develop into bolls the grower must take to the gin if he is to get the most net profit from his crop.

Well developed plants will put on more than a bale of squares during this 21 day period, with fleahoppers, lygus and overwintered boll weevils the principal insects.

When insecticides are applied before the squares are 1/3rd grown, their use should have little effect on the bollworm problem. Beneficial insects that often aid in keeping down bollworm damage usually move

into the field after the crop starts blooming.

Overwintered boll weevil population should be wiped out before they cause damage or have a chance to lay eggs. This can be accomplished when weevils are out of hibernation and insecticides are properly applied before early squares are 1/3 grown.

The diapause weevil program is not to protect the crop this year as much as to protect the 1966 crop. This program starts in the fall after most of the crop is made, and when the weevils start feeding for hibernation. For a complete control program, ask for a copy of L-218, Tex. Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects, and be sure to watch your crop.

Insects are not always a problem and even if your neighbor is applying controls, it is not a sign that you may have infestations that justify controls. On the other hand, if you wait too late to start controls, their benefit will be very limited if beneficial at all.

BRUCellosis PROGRAM COMPLETED IN COUNTY

Testing of cattle to keep the county certified in the Brucellosis program has been completed, and recently issued certificate is good until March 11, 1967. One fifth of the herds in the county were tested, including all herds where reactors or suspects were found in the initial test. All cow owners in the county should be grateful to these owners who submitted animals for testing so that the county would not lose accreditation.

Only 5 counties west of the 100th meridian (the east boundary of the Texas panhandle) are not included in the program.

TO MAKE RE-CHECK

Testing of cattle to keep the county certified in the TB program went unnoticed to most of the owners. A recheck is to be made each six years, and work has been completed in the county, as the current certificate expires in June 1964.

Cattle owners in Motley County also owe the ones submitting animals for test in this program a vote of thanks.

No additional testing is due in either the bangs or TB programs for 3 years, but those who have animals they would like to have tested are requested

to notify me so that a list for the next check can be compiled.

DISEASES KILL PLANTS

Ornamental plants frequently suffer damage or die as a result of various diseases. Certain viruses, bacteria, fungi and nematodes cause parasitic plant diseases. One of these, powdery mildew, is caused by several fungi.

This disease may attack ornamental plants early in the season. Powdery mildew is common on roses, euonymus, zinnias, and similar plants. It appears on leaves as a powdery white coating, and thrives in warm, humid weather.

A severe attack may result in stunted plant growth; leaves may curl, become dried and drop off. The powdery coating may completely overgrow buds and

stems. New infections caused by tiny fungus spores which are carried by the wind to other leaves and plants.

As a preventive against powdery mildew, protection sprays such as acti-dione PM, captan, karathane and sulfur should be used. Keep a protective cover on leaves, especially in damp weather. (Shouldn't be a problem this year.)

Leaves that have been infected and dropped off should be raked and burned. Additional information is found in MF-10, Diseases on Ornamental Plants, which is available in my office.
