## Coach Stresses Scholastics

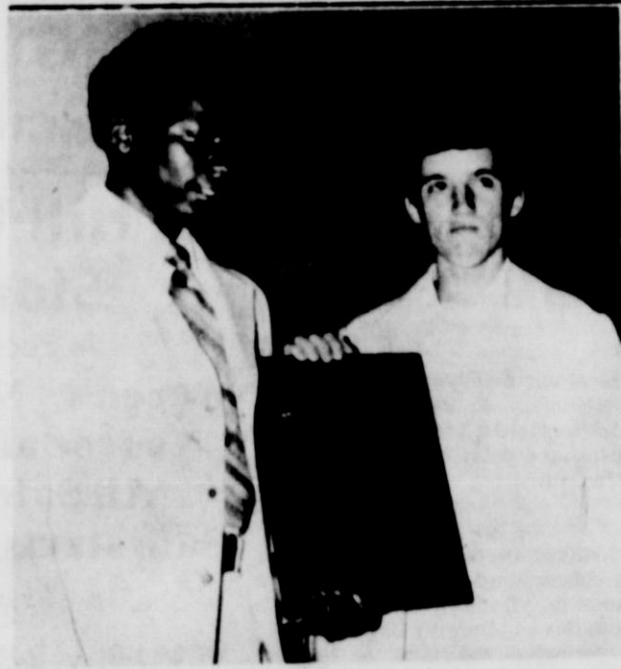

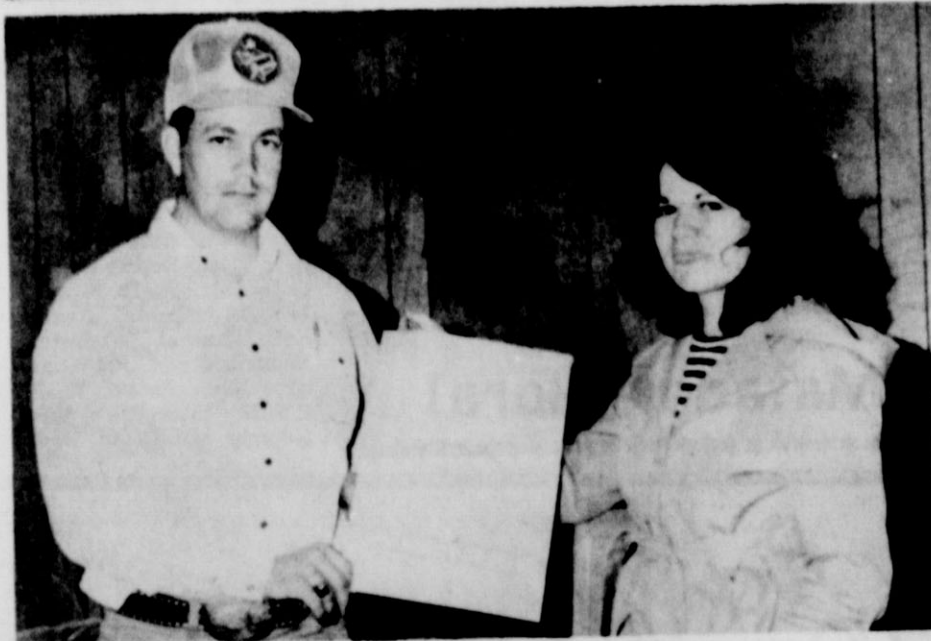

## Emergency Upstages Opening Of Hospital

OPENING of Motley General Hospital was precipitated by an emergency which occurred Sunday afternoon during open house activities which interrupted a talk by Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls. The hospital had been scheduled to open Monday morning for admission of patients. Melvin Dirickson, 76, long-time resident of Matador and former ranch employee of the Matador Cattle Company, was brought to the hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises sustained when he fell from his pickup, driven by his grandson, Steve May. Mr. Dirickson, who has been ill for several months, was taken for a drive east of Roaring Springs, on the oil field road, where the accident reportedly occurred. After being treated here, he was transferred to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview. "It is for priorities such as this emergency, that bring us here today," Senator Farabee declared in resuming his talk following the brief interruption. "This is a great day for this county and area. It was not an easy task to

build this hospital, nor was it an easy task for people 70, 80 and 90 years ago to meet an emergency without the modern facilities which we have today. An available facility such as this one may mean the difference between whether you live or die." The State of Texas is realizing the need for more rural health units, the senator said, and is endeavoring through CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act) to provide more medical resources. J. M. (Sonny) Russell presided at the program and introduced Senator Farabee and also Mrs. Betty Libby, who spoke briefly. Mrs. Libby said that she was representing both Governor Dolph Briscoe and Ben McDonald, head of the Department of Community Affairs in Austin. "They share an interest in rural health care," Mrs. Libby declared. "This is not the end of our interest. I am glad to have a part in this project." Also here for the open house was Ron Warren from the South Plains Health

Systems, Lubbock, and Gordon Russell, Administrator of Hi-Plains Hospital in Hale Center. Dr. and Mrs. Han Van Vo of Falls Church, Va., were also here to meet with the hospital board. The Tribune has been informed however, that Dr. Vo will not be coming here to practice. Closing the program was a prayer by Rev. Philip Hilton, pastor of the Assembly of God Church. An estimated crowd of approximately 250 toured the hospital facility preceding and following the program. Refreshments were provided by study clubs of the county, and served by members of Future Homemakers of America, The Motley County Arts and Crafts furnished pictures and other wall decorations. Several other organizations and individuals performed volunteer services for the day. In the drawing for 100 pounds of beef and a CB radio, Fred Vinson of Lubbock had the lucky ticket for the beef, and Sherry Green of Matador received the CB.

## OSHA Sets Hearing

DALLAS - A public hearing on a proposed health standard that would reduce worker exposure to cotton dust will be held by the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in Lubbock, Tex. on May 10. Sessions will convene at 9:30 a.m. at the South Park Inn, 3201 S. Loop 289.

The key provision of the proposed OSHA standard would reduce the present permissible exposure limit from 1,000 micrograms of total dust per cubic meter of air to 200 micrograms, based on an eight-hour time-weighted average. Respirable dust is proposed as the measure because larger cotton dust particles are not believed to be harmful.

In order to hear as many persons as possible, presentations will generally be limited to 15 minutes. However, OSHA will attempt to accommodate requests for additional time required by special circumstances.

All persons giving advance notice of appearance will have time reserved for oral presentations. Others wishing to testify will be allowed to give oral presentations if time permits.

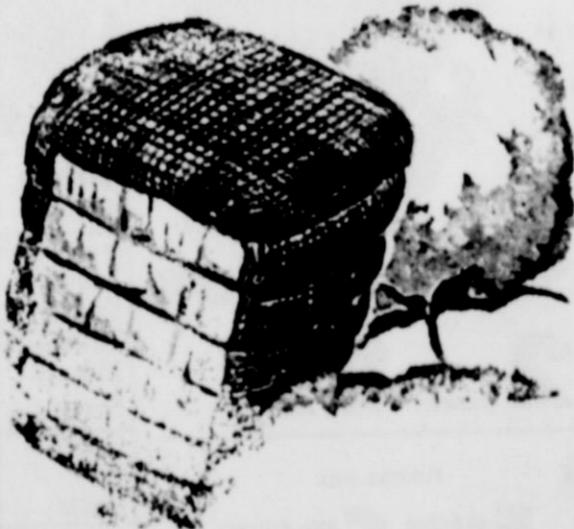

**First Jurors Selected For Murder Trial**

Two jurors have been chosen in Lubbock to serve in the capital murder trial of Stacy Albert Carter, 26, a suspect in the slaying of Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson last Nov. 12. The trial was transferred to Lubbock on a change of venue and is being heard in 72nd District Court before Dist. Judge George Miller. Carter, of Olivia, N.C. and Larry C. Fortenberry, 28, of Mount Hermon, La., are charged with capital murder in the case. Fortenberry's trial, which will be conducted in Plainview, is yet to be scheduled. The two jurors, Miss Cynthia Lynn McKee, 20, described by Frank Patrick, Avalanche-Journal staff reporter as "an attractive young secretary," and Portifio Navarette Ramirez, 43, a welder, were immediately sequestered and will spend their days in the jury room and nights in a downtown motel as the process of selection continues. Eight potential jurors had been questioned Wednesday since individual examinations began Monday afternoon. Prosecutors in the case are Randy Hollums of Floydada and Tom Hamilton of Plainview. Defense attorneys are John Montford and Mark Hall of Lubbock.
