# Motor Vehicle Stickers Available February 1

registering their motor vehicles for fiscal 1977 February 1. Registration renewal notices will be in the mail soon, according to the State Department of Highways and Public Transporta-

Some vehicle registration renewal notices will arrive a little later this year. Usually they are mailed immediatley after Christmas to facilitate postal distribution. However, this year, inmates at the State Department of CorrecHuntsville are sorting by zip code all of the approximatley 10 million renewal notices. The State Department of

Highways and Public Transportation will save approximatley \$50,000 in postage discounts for performing this service, which is contracted by the prison system.

The 1977 stickers will have a solid red background with white year figures and state name. The sticker serial number will be printed in

corner. Fiscal 1976 stickers

had a blue background, white figures and red serial numbers in furtherance of Bicentennial theme which will be continued in

Robert W. (Bob) Townsley, director of DHT's Motor

Vehicle Division, said he anticipates less motorist confusion in affixing 1977 stickers to the metal license

DHT first issued multi-year metal license plates in fiscal 1975. Last year was the first for attaching annual stickers to the metal plates.

Although most motorists followed instructions and experienced no problems, others failed to read the instructions for affixing the stickers with - sometimes laughable results," Townsley commented.

The 1977 stickers will be applied to the depressed area in the upper right-hand corner of the REAR metal license plate, Townsley explained. The 1976 sticker should remain in its present location -- the upper left-hand corner of the rear license

#### County Agent Pallmeyer Says

Most farmers and ranchers realize that the price they receive for the items produced are out of line with the retail price of these articles or the things they have to buy. We also realize that the buyer wants to buy as cheap as he can and receive as much as possible for his wages, so how are you going to combat this? So far the best solution is to back what you have to sell, promote it every time you get a chance and develop new markets.

Recently the cotton farmer had a chance to do this, and looking at the reports nationwide, the two-thirds majority didn't carry in all states. The companies producing the synthetics spend millions of dollars each year for the development, promotion and advertising of their products and this has been one of the things that has contributed to the decrease in the use of cotton, or why it is hard to find 100 per cent cotton clothing items today. If the producers don't help in the promotion and sales of the product they produce can they expect buyers to help

Still another way to look at the price determining factor is the demand. Can a beef

beef prices if he always buys chicken, or can the cotton farmer expect high cotton prices if he buys synthetic fiber clothing? At times it may be difficult to find the item you want, but anytime you buy a substitute for the product you are raising you help the competition by increasing the demand for

By increasing the demand for the products you produce you are helping yourself. This holds true for all crops or animal products, so if you don't support yourself, how can you expect support from

Last fall I attended a course in Vegetable production taught by Dr. Roland Roberts, Area Vegetable Specialist. Many of the items learned will help gardners realize more from their efforts, therefore from time to time I plan to list things that should be of value to the home gardner.

All of us know how food prices have risen, and many are planting home gardens to help offset this increase. The purpose of articles that I will write on this subject are intended to help you obtain better results, and not reduce the time or effort you will have to spend because to do a job right there are certain things that must be done, and when these aren't done, don't expect the plants to perform

satisfactorly. The first step is planning. which I will cover in the next article. As a starter, don't plant vegetables that you don't like or plan to use, and next, don't plant more than you need. A small plot properly cared for will produce as much as a larger one that is neglected.


