Baptists Involved In 'Living Proof'

"LIVING PROOF," an unparalleled \$1.5 million media evangelism campaign featuring testimonies by well-known personalities such as Houston Oiler Billy "White Shoes" Johnson, actor Dean Jones and others who have experienced changed lives through commitment to Jesus Christ, is being funded by Texas Baptists.

Among the personalities who are offering "Living Proof," of their commitments are former militant Eldridge Cleaver; country western super stars Jeannie

C. Riley & Connie Smith; successful businessman Alan Mayer of Oscar Mayer Company; Miss Teenage America, Rebecca Ann Reid; Rosargentina Pinel, Consul General of the Republic of Honduras; former band leader Paulino Bernal; and Antonio Mendoza of the U.S. Office of Equal Employment. Large numbers of professions of faith have marked the first wave of media saturation and revival meetings since the campaign began February 21 in North Texas.

According to a recent issue of The Baptist Standard, many persons have responded to the "Living Proof" testimonies by writing to Box 1000, Dallas, Texas 75221.

The primary response, however, is expected to come from local Baptist churches and people who have experienced "Living Proof." West Texas saturation began March 28, and churches in the area are in the process of holding revivals to climax the campaign.

Mental Health Services Provided In Floydada

Mental Health Services are available for residents in Floyd and Motley counties through the local Family Service Center located in the Floydada Courthouse. The Floydada office is a satellite office from the Central Plains MH-MR Center in Plainview. Mrs. Audette Kincaid is the Community Mental Health Worker locally, who has regular office hours for people having questions or needing information about Mental health and mental retardation services.

A therapist visits the office on Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week. Joe Tillman M.S.W. has appointments with individuals, families, and groups throughout this two county area. According to Tillman, "individual, group, marital, family counseling is available locally through the Floydada office." The type of therapy provided each client or clients depends on the presenting problems that people are wanting to work with.

Tillman explains therapy as a sitting where individual (s) verbalizes a stressful situation. "Therapy gives people a chance to look at their intradynamic personality make-up, and how a person may want to change behavior according to pressure."

A large majority of counseling done through the local Family Service Center involves marital and (or) family therapy. These types of therapy involve more than one person and usually other family members. "In family therapy," Tillman states, "the identified client may not be the only one with a problem." He continues, "often the presenting problem is only symptomatic of the relationship pattern within the family unit."

The local office provides therapy for the public on a sliding scale fee charge commensurate with a person's ability to pay. According to Tillman, "the services provided through the local office attempts to meet the needs of the community and of those asking for help." Tillman and other staff members are available, at no charge, for community organization programs re-

lated to behavioral problems individually, marital or family.

Persons interested in finding out more about the services through the local office, may contact Audette Kincaid at 983-2584. In conclusion, Tillman states, "the local office is provided for people in Floyd and Motley counties. We want people to feel free to call us at anytime."

Fuel Adjustment Cost Will be Shown As A Separate Item.

The fuel charge you have been paying is now shown as a separate item on your bill from WTU. The money from this charge is used for ONLY ONE PURPOSE - TO PAY THE INCREASED PRICE OF FUELS needed to produce your electricity. None of this money is used for profits or for any other expenses.

Your electric service bill will be similar to the one shown here with base rate and fuel cost charges included among the separately listed items. We've prepared a line-by-line guide to explain these items in your bill.

If you need more detailed information, please contact your local WTU office.



LINE ONE is the base rate portion of the monthly bill. It also shows amount of kilowatt hours used.

LINE TWO shows the fuel adjustment separately. The fuel adjustment has been part of the rate since 1959, but until now has been included as part of the base rate on your bill. The six-digit number shows (017076) is the fuel adjustment factor. This factor reflects the difference between the price of fuel this month and the price in 1959.

This adjustment factor is then multiplied by the number of kilowatt hours used by you, the individual customer.

Example: 017076 x 562 = \$9.60

LINE THREE shows any charges for other electric services, which on this bill includes a Guard-Lite.

LINE FOUR shows the amount of SALES TAX remitted to the STATE.

LINE FIVE indicates your total bill for electric service.
