The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns
listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal districl to make the necessary changes to solve problems. li you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the
ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive ARB will set your case for a hearing. You lireceive
written notice of the time, date and place of the
hearin, The hearing will be informal. You and the happraisal district representative will be asked to present idence about your case. The ARB will make its decis a based on the evidence presented. You can
get a wipy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at the Motley County Courthouse Appraisal office. Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members
outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.
