Senator To Attend Open House

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls will be here Sunday to attend Open House activities for Motley General Hospital, and will speak at 2:30 p.m. The open house will continue until 5 p.m. Also here will be Ms. Betty Libby from the office of Ben McDonald, head of the Department of Community Affairs, Austin.

The Matador Jaycees will hold a drawing for a CB Radio and \$100 beef gift certificate, which will be given away Sunday during Open House of the Hospital. The hospital will open at 8 a.m. Monday, May 2 to receive patients after having been closed since July 1, 1966. It was opened briefly in 1970 after being renovated with federal funds, but was closed after four months because of lack of required registered nurses.

The hospital will now meet all requirements of HEW and will be able to accept medicare patients, according to Sut Braselton, administrator. The hospital will open with a staff composed of Braselton, administrator, X-ray and lab technician; Dan Jackson, LVN, assistant administrator in charge of emergency and operating rooms; Nancy Nolan, RN, director of nursing; Michelle Crouch, RN, and Johnnie (Mrs. Bill) Warren, LVN. Polly (Mrs. Charles) Gwinn will be in charge of insurance and medical records for both the Motley General Clinic and the hospital, and Joyce (Mrs.

Kirby) Campbell is book-keeper for both facilities. Mary (Mrs. Kenneth) Marshall is receptionist at the clinic. The clinic was opened in July, 1976 in the Traweek Hospital building, with three physicians on duty, Dr. A.C. Traweek Jr., and Dr. Y Hoang Do; and Dr. Thuy Danh Do, who has since moved to Robert Lee, Texas. Coming during the week end to meet the public and attend Open House will be Dr. Han Van Vo and his wife of Falls Church, Virginia. Dr. Vo will consider a position on the hospital staff.

The hospital facility was formerly owned by the late Dr. J.S. Stanley, who came to Matador in 1935 and purchased the practice of the late Dr. H. C. Eargle. He had a small office upstairs in the old First National Bank building where he continued to practice until 1944 when he built the first unit of Stanley Hospital. He doubled the size of the building in 1948.

Dr. Stanley passed away in October of 1970. Serving on the hospital board are J.M. (Sonny) Russell, Marion (Mrs.) Glenn Woodruff, Algie Groves, B. L. Peacock, and Ronnie Cox.

Basketball Coach Featured Speaker For Sports Banquet

Featured speaker for the 1977 Motley County High School All-Sports Banquet is Gerald Myers, Head Basketball Coach at Texas Tech University.

The banquet, sponsored by the M.C.H.S. Pep Club, will be at 7:30 p.m. Thursday (tonight) in the school cafeteria.

Coach Myers was graduated from Borger High School and Texas Tech. He was the first All-Southwest Conference basketball selection in Tech history.

Coach Myers had high school coaching stints at Houston and Lubbock before taking over at the helm of Raderland. He is currently noted as "the winningest active coach in the Southwest Conference."

Myers' teams were known to be team-oriented, fundamentally sound and strong in team defense. Combining a fast break offense and a tenacious man-for-man defense, Tech has averaged 18 wins per season since he's been head coach.

Such success has not been overlooked. Last summer, Myers and North Carolina State head coach Norm Sloan were selected by the U. S. Air Force to conduct a two-week series of basketball clinics in Europe.

Myers has taken Tech to two trips to the NCAA playoffs, a Southwest Conference title, three seconds and a third in five years, a record unparalleled by any current SWC coach.

Motley County athletes have added a number of trophies to the school's trophy case this school term, and several individual honors will be presented at the Sport's Banquet.

JAYCEES TO SPONSOR BLOOD DRIVE

A blood drive will be sponsored by the Matador Jaycees from 4 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, May 10, according to an announcement by Dude Speed, President. The drive will be held in the I.O.O.F. Building (downstairs), regular meeting place of the organization.

Miss Janice Hassell from the South Plains Blood Services in Lubbock met with the Jaycees at their regular meeting Thursday night, April 21, and presented a program and film which explained the process of donating blood.

Members of the Jaycees have challenged the Lions

Club members to see which group can get the most donors. Miss Hassell told the Jaycees that the club who has the most blood donated will receive a plaque from the South Plains Blood Services.

After presenting the film, Miss Hassell explained that before donating blood, each person is required to furnish a medical history. Temperature, blood pressure and hemoglobin are then checked. After the blood is drawn it is typed and tested for diseases which could be transmitted to the recipient. If any of these tests indicate a need for medical attention,

the donor is notified and referred to a physician. In about two weeks each donor will receive a donor's card in the mail that will also tell the donor's blood type.

Any person in general good health between the ages of 17 and 65 and with a weight of at least 110 pounds may qualify for donating blood. Miss Hassell explained that about 70 pints of blood were needed per day to meet the needs of this area, and urged all eligible persons to keep the date in mind and donate blood. Cookies and juice will be provided by wives of Jaycee members for each donor.

Following Miss Hassell's film, President Speed and Neal Haralson, troopers with the Department of Public Safety showed two films, one which explained first aid, and the other showing highway accidents and ways in which they might be prevented.

Certificates of membership were distributed, and various committees gave reports on projects. The president thanked members and their wives for attending.

The next meeting of the Matador Jaycees will be Thursday, May 5, at 8:00 p.m. Anyone in Motley County interested is urged to attend.

Finals in the 440 Sprint Relay which took first place was 50.3. Final in the 880 Yard Relay, which took second place was 1:49.1.

Silverton took first place in this meet with 56 points, Motley County came in second with 41, Forsan was 3rd and Marathon placed 4th.

BOYS TEAM WINS DISTRICT

To Whom It May Concern

In recent weeks some criticism has been circulating concerning the Motley County Hospital District, its board of directors, and the prospects of reopening Motley General Hospital. In an effort to correct some misinformation, and to keep you informed, we would like to bring you up to date on some of the recent events concerning our hospital, and to express an opinion.

FIRST, the rumor has been circulated that a member of the hospital board created a job for himself, and is serving both as a member of the board of directors and a paid employee of the hospital district.

THE FACT is that the hospital district board of directors had been attempting for almost a year to secure the services of a qualified person to serve as a hospital administrator and Lab-X-ray Technician, with very little success. Only four persons indicated an interest in the position and they withdrew after consideration of the salary offered and the numerous problems involved with trying to reopen the facility. Sut Braselton, who had been elected to the hospital board primarily because of his 19 years experience in the medical field, reluctantly agreed to take the job as administrator until the hospital could be opened and a qualified applicant hired. Mr. Braselton resigned from the hospital board and Marion Woodruff was appointed to fill his unexpired term. Mr. Braselton is no longer a member of the hospital board.

SECONDLY, some criticism has been leveled at one member of the hospital board for holding a position on the board as well as another elective office of Motley County, after having indicated that he did not want to serve both offices.

SOME OF US who encouraged, and even insisted, that he stay with the board for one more term should share this criticism. We felt that his personal knowledge of the actions of the board during the period of obtaining the services of physicians and establishment of clinic facilities, and his knowledge of the groundwork that has been done in completing the "red tape" necessary to even consider reopening the hospital would be invaluable during the crucial months ahead. It was not through a desire to continue to "run the hospital board," but rather through the insistence of interested citizens that persuaded him not to quit when the task was only partly completed, and to seek another term.

THIRDLY, some have voiced the opinion that the hospital board was operating in secret and was not informing the public as to its actions. This criticism has perhaps some justification, but it is our feeling that it is through oversight rather than intentional.

The hospital board has been prompt to answer our every question concerning its activities, and while we possibly might not agree with their every move, we would want to be first to commend the results of their efforts. Particularly now, when the prospects of reopening the hospital, a goal which seemed to many of us to be an impossibility, seems near.

This is not to say that they have all of the problems solved concerning the hospital. Far from it. There will be numerous problems arise during the next few months, some of which will be major, but the prospects of having a hospital facility for our county seem nearer now than at any time during the past few years.

The members of the hospital board, both present and past, are due our appreciation for their many hours spent in this thankless job, and we would like to use this means to say a public "Thank You."
