First Baptist Church Centennial Plans Finalized

Final plans are underway by First Baptist Church, Matador, in anticipation of its centennial celebration, Saturday and Sunday, June 26-27, according to announcements by the centennial committee and Gaylon Cox, pastor.

Activities will begin on Saturday when an informal welcome reception will be held from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. in the fellowship hall, followed by a sandwich supper from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. An evening program and worship service set for 7:00 p.m. will be in progress after the supper until 8:30 p.m.

A program and worship service Sun-

day morning will begin at 10:30 o'clock and continue until noon when a catered lunch will be served. Concluding the scheduled activities will be an afternoon program and worship period from 2:00-3:30 p.m. Customary Sunday School and evening services will be dispensed with for the occasion, it was further announced.

Thirty-two pastors have served the church since its organization on May 14, 1893 by six charter members and designated as "Matador Missionary Baptist Church", but later changed to First Baptist Church of Matador by common usage. Nine former pastors who served here

during the past 20 years will appear on the programs and worship services scheduled.

Rev. Miller Robinson of Snyder will deliver the evening message Saturday, and other speakers will be Rev. Larry Heard of Pampa and Rev. Jerry Golden of Lorenzo. Sunday morning speakers will be Rev. Bruce Oliver of Austin, Rev. Gene Joplin, Midland, and Rev. Stacy Conner, Muleshoe, with Rev. Oliver delivering the message. On the Sunday afternoon program will be Rev. Jim Hancock, Plainview, who will present the message, Rev. Gene Hawkins of Lub-

bock, and Rev. Greer Willis of Pecos.

An effort has been made by the centennial committees to reach former members of the church to let them know of the plans and to learn how many might return for the events. Everyone is invited to attend, but the church would appreciate advance information stating the number in each family who will attend any or all the services, and the number of children two years or younger who will be included, so that nursery plans might be implemented. Reservations may be placed by mail, or by calling the church office, 347-2345, or 347-2782, not later than June 18. Schedules and reservation cards may also be picked up at Matador Variety, Pay-N-Save, or First State Bank.

President Appoints Bill Young as U.S. Marshal for Northern Texas

NOTE: The following article was taken from the *Texas Spur*, May 27 issue.

U.S. Senator Robert Krueger announced today that former Dickens County Judge, H.L. "Bill" Young has been appointed U.S. Marshal for the Northern District of Texas by President Clinton.

Young, was a County Judge, trying Civil and Criminal cases in Dickens County from 1975-1988. Young was active in numerous County Governmental organization prior to going to work for the Texas General Office in 1990. He was selected Outstanding County Judge by the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association in 1981 and Outstanding Commissioners Court member by the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas in 1968. He also served as President of those Associations and also a Past President of the South Plains Association of Governments and the Texas Association of Regional Councils.

As U.S. Marshal, Young will be responsible for 100 counties in Northern and Western Texas, covering Federal Courthouses in Dallas, Fort Worth, Abilene, San Angelo, Wichita Falls, Lubbock and Amarillo. As a Court ex-

ecutive, he will be in charge of Court-house security, protection of judges, transportation of prisoners; serving court papers and arrest of fugitives.

He also will be responsible for sale of confiscated property and disbursement of funds from the sale of such property, as well as court budgets as they relate to payment of jurors and contracting for prisoner keep and transportation.

A native of Afton in Dickens County, Young has been a resident of McAdoo in Dickens County for the past 33 years. He is also a farmer, rancher and small businessman. He was a member of the McAdoo School Board for six years prior to entering county government.

While working for the land office, Young served as a Special Assistant to the Land Commissioner for Inter-governmental affairs, Director of Field Operations, Director of Rural Economic Development and as the agency's liaison for aquaculture, a program which seeks to utilize state lands for the commercial production of fish, shrimp and oysters.

Married to the former Mary Woolley, McAdoo, they have two sons, Jeff and Jamey and one grandson.

Young's appointment is subject to Senate confirmation.

Motley County Voters Favor Hutchinson

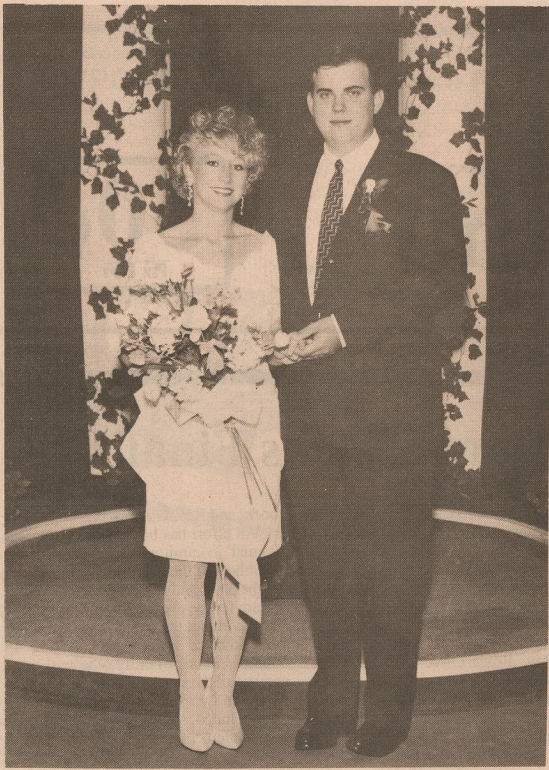
Two hundred and ninety-one Motley County voters came to the polls Saturday, June 5 to cast their vote in the run-off election for U.S. Senator, between Bob

If your lights do go out, we need your help!

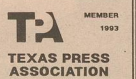
Here's what you can do:

While waiting to be assigned to another Company, the Atomic bomb was dropped, and the war was over. After his discharge in California, he returned to Matador where he resumed his duties at the Matador Tribune.

Single Family Housing Loans Available

Rural Housing Loans for very-low and low income applicants are available through County Offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Spur, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes - add improvements such as bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other improvements. Borrowers may buy an

existing house and lot or buy a site on which to build a home. Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 7.75 percent with 33 year terms. Monthly payments are subsidized with the amount of the payment dependent on the borrower's annual income. Homes will be modest in size, design, and cost but adequate to meet the family's needs. New homes average about 1,050 square feet of living area.

In addition, Farmers Home Admini-

stration guarantees home ownership loans made to applicants of low or moderate income. Guarantees offer opportunities to families who are unable to afford a commercial loan without a Guarantee. These loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the value of the property and are made for terms of 30 years. The interest rate is based on the Federal National Mortgage Association rate with a maximum loan amount in most counties of \$67,500.00.

Malathion, and Bacillus Thuringiensis. Be sure to read the label of all pesticides and make certain that it is labeled for use on your infested tree or shrub.

There are several topics of importance to ranchers on the agenda, such as The Importance of Body Condition Scores and How to Determine Them; How Much Nutritive Value Do Our Native Grasses Have; How Nutrition Effects Breeding Back; and Injection Sites and Dollars Lost When Done Incorrectly.

Texas State 4-H Roundup is being held this week (June 8-11) at Texas A&M University in College Station. These contests include Food Show, Fashion Show, Rifle Contest, various Judging Contests, and Method Demonstrations.

This year, Motley County will be represented at State 4-H Roundup by five 4-H members. Heather Turner will be competing in the State 4-H Fashion Show. Dustin Davis, Joe Gonzalez, Kobbi Risser, and Christie Pierce will compete in the State 4-H Dairy Judging Contest. These 4-H'ers earned the right to participate in State Roundup by placing first at the District level.

I am looking forward to spending the week at A&M with these young adults. They have worked all year and I know they will represent Motley County with pride.

Around the Courthouse recently, I have

noticed that the bagworms are once again attacking the trees. Those small, silk woven bags, that you find on your favorite tree or shrub, protects the larvae and eggs of bagworms. Bagworms feed on the foliage of most trees and shrubs, including fruit and nut trees, and some ornamental plants.

Handpicking the pest is the surest and cheapest means of control. Be persistent and be sure to pick all of the bags. The bags should be smashed or burned. If thrown on the ground, the eggs in the bag will still hatch in the spring and larvae may crawl back into the trees.

If handpicking is out of the question, insecticides can be used with fair results. Proper timing is the key to successful control of bagworms with any insecticide. Infested plants should be sprayed while the larvae is actively feeding. Insecticidal control is difficult and not as effective as the larvae mature and close their bags.

Recommended insecticides include Sevin, Dursban, Diazinon, Orthene,

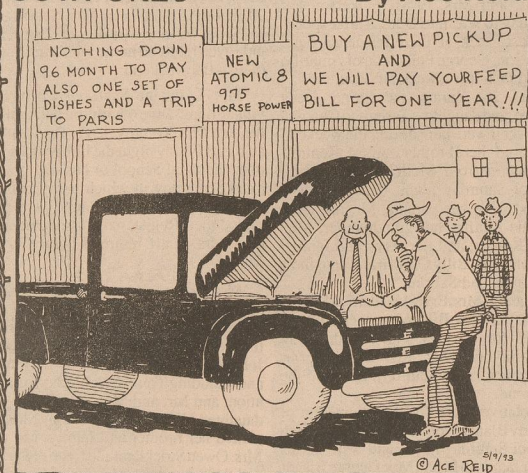
