•If you're the only house in your area with


the light outs or if you don't have any close neighbors, check your breaker or fuse box to see if the trouble is there.

noticed that the bagworms are once again attacking the trees. Those small, silk woven bags, that you find on your favorite tree or shrub, protects the larvae and eggs of bagworms. Bagworms feed on the foliage of most trees and shrubs, including fruit and nut trees, and some ornamental plants.

Handpicking the pest is the surest and cheapest means of control. Be persistent and be sure to pick all of the bags. The bags should be smashed or burned. If thrown on the ground, the eggs in the bag will still hatch in the spring and larvae may crawl back into the trees.

If handpicking is out of the queston, insecticides can be used with fair results Proper timing is the key to successful control of bagworms with any insecticide. Infested plants should be sprayed

control of bagworms with any insecticide. Infested plants should be sprayed while the larvae is actively feeding. Insecticidal control is difficult and not as effective as the larvae mature and close their bags.

Recommended inecticides include Sevin, Dursban, Diazinon, Orthene, insection Sites and Dollars Lost When Done Incorrectly.




