I used to exercise it while riding horseback alone, or when riding a cultivator behind a gentle team, and later within the walls of a shower.

Too much leisure time at the disposal of a generation may someday be classed as a curse from which there is no escaping.

A former Matador resident, W. W. "Butch" Waybourn, has been named News Editor of The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, morning editions, in a recent announcement by Robert R. Norris, general manager. Waybourn will be responsible for coordinating all news from the area, city and national and international wire services. He also will be responsible in the absence of the managing editor. Norris said Dave Knapp, managing editor, will continue to be responsible for the overall direction and coordination of the entire newsroom. Waybourn began as a sports writer for the A-J in 1967, and was named Wire Editor in 1969. In late 1971, he assumed responsibilities as City Editor. At 25, Waybourn is one of the youngest News Editors of a metropolitan daily newspaper in the nation.

Last year Waybourn was named by United Press International to direct a committee of Texas editors to evaluate the effectiveness of UPI's state coverage. Waybourn received his education at Matador Public

Annual Stock Show Slated Next Week

The 33rd annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show for 4-H and FFA members will be held at the Matador FFA building, Saturday, March 17, according to Ronald Clay, President of the Motley County Livestock Association, sponsors.

All animals must be in place by 9:00 a.m. with steers and market hogs weighed and tagged.

Market hogs must weigh 190 to 250 pounds, and can be either barrows or gilts. Steers must weigh 700 pounds or more, and must not show any permanent teeth at time of weighing. All animals must have been owned by the exhibitor prior to Dec. 1, 1972.

The show opens at 9:30 a.m.

and proceed as follows: Open gilts, minimum weight of 150 lb.; bred gilts, minimum weight, 150 lbs.; sows, Grand Champion breeding hog; light market hogs, 190-210 lbs.; medium market hogs, 211-230 lbs.; heavy market hogs, 231-250 lbs.; Grand Champion market hog; Rabbit bucks; rabbit does; Champion rabbit. (Limit of two rabbits per exhibitor.)

Afternoon judging starts at 1:30 p.m. for heifers, 12-18 months, limit of two per owner, open to anyone living in Motley County or owning land in Motley County; light steers; medium steers, heavy steers, Grand Champion steer. Sale: Top five animals in steer and market hog classes only.

Billy Roach, Scurry County Agent, Snyder, will again judge the beef classes; Milton Mann, Vo-Ag instructor, Clarendon, will again judge the swine classes and Jerry Slaton, Vo-Ag instructor, Patton Springs, will again judge rabbits and showmanship.

Showmanship Prizes

Showmanship prizes in beef and swine classes will again be provided by the Rolling Plains Production Credit Association, and rosettes and additional prize money for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place animals will be provided by the Motley County Farm Bureau. Trophies are furnished by the VFW, American Legion, Eternas Junior Study Club, Stanley Pharmacy, Matador Auto Company, Motley County Abstract Company, Matador, Wylie Petroleum and Floydada Seed & Delinting Co., Floydada.

The rate of gain trophy for steer classes will be provided by Farmers and Ranchers Commission Co. (Billy Leese), Lubbock; Ken Bozeman, Lubbock, will serve as auctioneer and J. C. Cross, Matador, as announcer.

In addition to the president, other officers and directors of the association are: Vann Francis, Matador, Vice Pres.; James Taylor, Matador, Secretary; Bill Dean Washington, Flomot, Recorder; Corky Marshall and Boyd Long, Roaring Springs, directors. Directors whose terms expire in 1973 are Washington, Taylor and Marshall.

Show advisors are Bill Moss, Matador Vo-Ag instructor and Bill Pallmeyer, Motley County Extension Agent.

A concession stand will be operated by the Motley County 4-H Clubs.

An exact count of entries is not available. However, 18 steers, 55 hogs and 15 rabbits are expected, according to County Agent Pallmeyer.
