

Roots of mesquites are feeding on the soil that was once a field and all signs of the last furrows have vanished beneath a carpet of native grass. The hills are the same and a view of the turn in the river is unchanged after three score years. All evidence of the clumps of Johnson grass has been lost to time but memories of that long ago spring are sharp. My father plowed with a walking middle buster and my mother, with the aid of my brother and myself picked the upturned Johnson grass roots and placed them in a wash tub. It was back-breaking work but the grass must be eliminated from our newly acquired farm. We worked diligently until sundown, plowing and replowing the earth as we gathered the thick, jointed roots. We fed them to the hogs, unharnessed the team, fed the cows and horses, gathered up the eggs, milked four cows and went to the house for supper of cornbread and milk, butter and a few slices of home-cured bacon that had been left over from dinner. ++



DILLY BREAD

By Willie C. Russell Two pkg. dry yeast dissolved in ¾ cup warm water. Two cups small curd Cottage Cheese (lukewarm) 4 tbsp. sugar, 2 tbsp instant minced onion, 4 tsp. dill seed, 2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. soda 1 egg. Approximately 6 cups flour.

Mix all together and use enough flour to make dough of right consistency. Allow to rise until double in bulk. Work down and put in two oven proof casseroles or in loaf pans. Let rise again and bake in 350 degree oven for 45 minutes

(longer if necessary). Remove from oven and butter crust. Delicious!
