STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

Unity of Thought by Forty Men. 2. Not only were the Bible authors unusually varied in culture and status, but they lived in widely separated geographical areas - Egypt, Palestine, Babylon, Greece, Turkey, Rome, etc.

Imagine forty present-day men, without modern communication, from this list of nations, writing materials on any subject and enjoying unity of thought, unless they had done extensive planning together beforehand. Their observations and experiences would be so varied that unity would be impossible. At this time the "wise men" of the Middle East can't even agree on how to make their several political systems work to their own good.

3. The Unity of Thought idea is made more dramatic when we realize the great time span covered by the Bible writers. Not only were their cultural and geographical backgrounds different, but there was a wide-spread time span - from Moses to John the apostle or from about 1400 B.C. to 100 A.D. Forty men, each living a short period from the beginning to the end of a 1500 year era. Possibly, never more than eight were contemporaries during any one generation. The eight New Testament writers were all personally acquainted and learned together the great mysteries of the Christ.

Forty men who lived under greatly varied social conditions, who resided in widely separated nations, and who were often unknown personally to their co-authors, wrote the Book of books - the Bible. Yet, there is perfect harmony from Genesis to Revelation. Sixty-six books that blend together as one book. The co-ordinator of thought was God.

God gave His Bible to the world and the world refuses to receive it wholeheartedly. Are you included in this statement?

Six egg whites, 2 Cp. sugar, 1 T. vinegar, 1 T. vanilla. Fresh fruit or preserves (I used strawberry) About 2 pints whipping cream, add a little sugar when whipping.

FOR SHELLS: Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually beat in sugar, fold in vinegar and vanilla.

Pour into greased & floured 9" layer cake pans. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees) for 1 hour. When cool remove from pan, run knife around edge.

Cover first layer with fruit, spread with whipped cream. Second layer, fruit cover with rest of whipping cream. Layers may crumble, that is o.k.
