IT WAS THE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY of the Motley Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association, and it was the greatest.

The only thing that could have reduced the crowds, was lack of space to park automobiles or stand. The crowds came to enjoy the rodeo, the dances, and the young folks came to enjoy the carnival.

The massive crowds were jovial, meeting friends and relatives and enjoying themselves. Less than usual incidents marred the three days and three nights of good times. Many who had attended almost every reunion, said the 50th reunion was the best by any measure.

THE RODEO at the 50th Annual Old Settlers reunion was a success without comparison in this area. Three evenings of excitement were in store for the rodeo fans. In addition the gracious, beautiful and talented Miss Ford Country (Miss Sandy Lankford of Graham,) appeared at each performance.

Miss Lankford's appearance at Old Settlers was attained through Glenn Woodruff, local Ford dealer, whose firm observed its 60th anniversary, Friday, with "Miss Ford Country" as featured attraction, visiting and signing autographs for youngsters (and older folks.)

The saddle which was given away at the Saturday evening performance was won by Victor Arrington of Spur. The saddle in the calf roping was won by Jimmy Brazier of Gruver for the best time on one steer and one calf. His time was 20.18 on two head.

The saddle in the old men's roping was won by Rufus Hart of Snyder with time of 55.52 (on four head) Second place (spurs) went to Jack Strickland of Abilene with time of 56.70. Third place went to Morris Sandifer (bits - on three head) with time of 44.35. Fourth place went to Doug McCraw (a blanket donated by Floyd Hardin). Time was 48.19 on three head.

Prizes were presented by Miss Ford Country. First place in the calf roping went to Tom Walker of Norman, Okla., who won the bits and \$495.90 jackpot money. His time was 8.80. Terry Riddle of Iowa Park won second and jackpot money of \$393.30 with time of 9.04. Third place was won by Ed Workman of Mineral Wells (\$307.80 jackpot money) with time of 9.35. A young man, Fritz Pasquet, a senior in the University of Texas, is enthusiastic about the Motley Hospital and its potentials. He is specializing in the Rural Health Nursing elective at the University and plans to devote his life to the needs of small communities.

His plans are to bring a complete staff to the hospital here. His first and greatest problem will be to obtain a hospital administrator. "It is greater than the need for doctors," he said Saturday in a session with the Motley County Hospital board.

The enthusiastic young man is the son-in-law of Mrs. C. L. Rainbolt of Roaring Springs. He is sold on the Foothill Country and sees great possibilities in this area. "I will either settle here or in this section," he declared.

He is confident he can bring an entire staff, including doctors to get the hospital "off the ground."

Mr. Pasquet is practical. He knows the requirements of the government to qualify a hospital for Medicare. "The only way we can possibly succeed is with Medicare," he said.

It will not be quick, Mr. Pasquet estimates that it will require at least 12 months, he told the board Saturday afternoon. "There will be a great amount of frustration before we can hope to get started," he said. It can be overcome, if the proper groundwork is laid.

Mr. Pasquet is going to survey Matador, other towns in the county and adjoining counties. He wants to know exactly what he can tell his friends who may come here. He wants to know exactly what potential exists. He wants to show his friends the hospital facility and survey the available housing facilities.

Same Project at Granbury Mr. Pasquet has the same type of a project at Granbury and expects to accomplish the same aims. Recently the Ft. Worth Star Telegram devoted an entire page to the young man and his aims for Matador.

First Baptist Church, Roaring Springs will hold a Lay Witness Mission during the week end, starting Friday and concluding Sunday, Sept. 2.

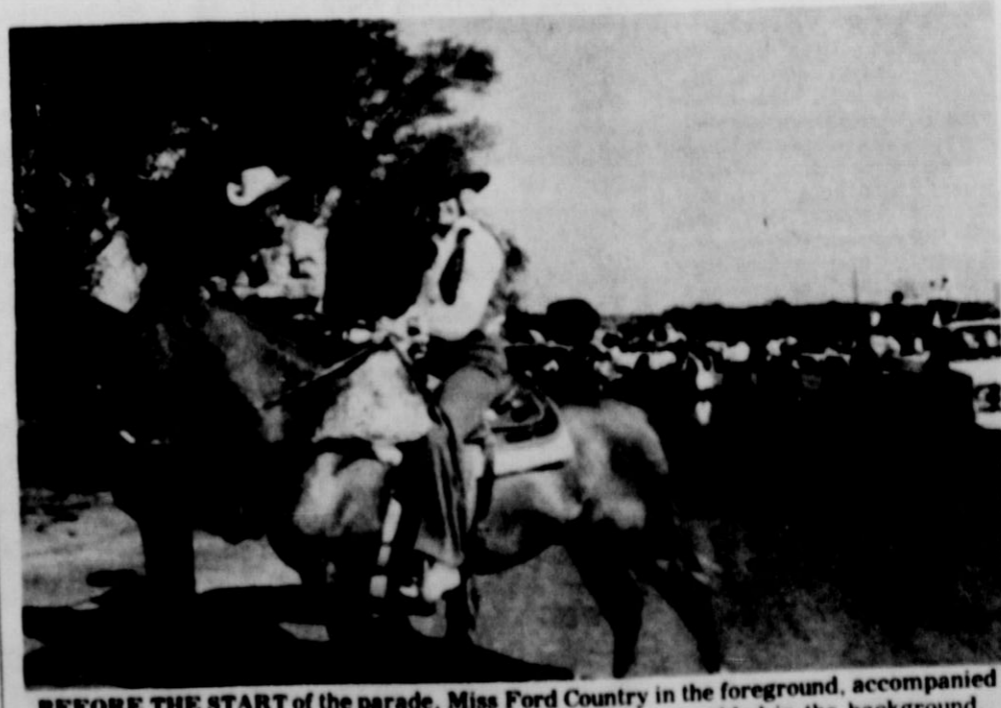

Carts were decorated as the train - a black engine with Jeff Thacker the engineer; light blue box cars, red caboose and fancy "Queen's Coach." Lillian Thacker riding in it - with drivers of the cars being Nell, LaVoe, Frances, and Jane Thacker of Corpus Christi.

THE CARS, joined by paper chains, stopped during the parade - then part of the "train" went on - breaking the chain. When he realized what had happened, the engineer backed up the first cars to pick up the rest of the train. 




