Shooting Ends
in Arm Injury



The pattern of western movies and now late television shows have all had a similarity which required cowboys, chuck wagons and especially scenery. The locations are not as plentiful as in early days, because of telephone poles, car tracks, paved roads and other symbols of modern time. Some scenes have been photographed so frequently that it is difficult to disassociate them from former pictures. Some cattle have been chased before the cameras so many times that they appear especially trained. Frequently it is the same herd that fits the description of early-day cattle and often they resemble modern stock. The chuck wagons are often very real and look like they had rolled out of the past onto a fitting stage.

When my father hauled water I was too small to be of any help to him but he allowed me the pleasure of the trip. He would drive to the side of the tank which was made of boxing planks, separated one foot apart, held by two by fours, wired securely and filled with compact Oklahoma soil. The bottom was also of soil. A great Star windmill seemed always to be turning and it kept the tank to overflowing. My father would put a plank from the step on the side of the wagon to the top of the tank, then he would remove the top hoop from one of the three barrels and the weathered piece of heavy canvas. With a galvanized bucket he would proceed to fill the barrel, and repeat the process on the two other barrels. When we arrived at the house he would get another bucket and carry the two brimming containers into the kitchen. My mother had already gathered a sack of cowchips and had a fire going in the kitchen range. By the time my father had unhitched the team and fed them some bundled cane, supper would be ready. Fuel and water were the first requirements on a homestead, but my father worked most of the time on the railroad, receiving \$25 per month as a section hand.

True poverty is the inability to be content with what we possess and use it to the best advantage.

The pollution scouts would have had a field day at our farm especially during rainy weather when the cowlot was ankle deep. We often went down to the windmill and washed our shoes before going to the house. We tried to be reasonably clean but never overdid sanitation.

PS Troopers To Enforce Speed Limit

AUSTIN (Special) - Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today he is disturbed by many complaints by Texas motorists about drivers refusing to obey the 55-mile-per-hour speed limit, and has directed DPS troopers to intensify their enforcement efforts.

When the new law went into effect January 20 of this year," he said, "our surveys indicated a high degree of voluntary compliance on the part of Texas drivers.

But since that time, we have noticed that motorists, or at least many of them, have been gradually 'inching' up their speeds on Texas highways. Consequently, our troopers have been increasing their volume of speeding citations, and will have to continue to intensify their efforts until a more reasonable degree of voluntary compliance is achieved.'

Speir said he has received numerous reports by motorists who are complying with the new law who are frightened and angered by others who pass them at speeds dangerously above the legal limit, and still others who "tailgate" them when they can't pass for one reason or another.

'We commend those drivers who are cooperating in the state and national effort to reduce accidents, save lives, and at the same time conserve fuel by driving within the legal limits,' Speir said.

And we solicit the cooperation of those who would forget or ignore the dangers posed to themselves and others by dangerous and illegal speeds on the highways of our state.

We would remind everyone that consistently through the years, excessive speed is involved in more fatal accidents than any other single factor.

McCaghren was leader for the afternoon and introduced the program with the yearbook quotation from Adali Stevenson, August 27, 1952: "What do we mean by patriotism in the context of our times: - A patriotism that puts country ahead of self; a patriotism which is not short, frenzied outbursts of emotion, but the tranquil and steady dedication of a lifetime. There are words easy to utter, but this is a mighty assignment. For it is often easier to fight for principles than to live up to them

Mrs. McCaghren then presented Mrs. Robert Darsey, who gave sketches of wives of three United States Presidents, Mary Todd Lincoln, Mamie Eisenhower and Lady Bird Johnson.

In her interesting manner. Mrs. Darsey quoted, "Behind every great man is a great woman," and in her reading, found this true of the three women she reviewed. 'Mary Todd Lincoln was not Abraham Lincoln's first love

that was Anne Rutledge." she stated. "Mary Todd grew up in Kentucky of a good family. She was a well educated girl for that time and said before she ever met Lincoln, that she was going to marry a man who would be President of the United States. Poverty hung around the door most of the time, and with four children, it was a difficult time, but she

Abe became President.

'In marrying Abe, Mary Todd chose the right man to get her into the White House and together, they were in turn happy and unhappy, in poverty and out. She was extremely extravagant in her clothing, and she had many enemies, as the people in Washington thought she was a southern spy, as her brothers were fighting for the

Mamie Eisenhower was born Marie Geneva Doud, of affluent parents who had a home in Denver and later, San Antonio. In contrast to Mary Todd Lincoln, Mamie was a very pretty girl who loved people and gaiety. She met "Ike" at Ft. Sam Houston and his "air" indicated he still had a touch of West Point in him. "That, she liked," re-

counted Mrs. Darsey. "They met in Oct. 1915, became engaged on Valentine's day, 1916 and were married that summer, July 1, in Denver. Colo. They moved all over the world and wherever they were she made a home with the pictures and mementos of their travels. Her living room was always yellow and her bedroom was always pink and green. During World War II she stayed secluded in her Washington apartment. She charmed everyone she met. young and old alike, and she loved to care for her grand-

children. Concluding with a short sketch of Mrs. Lyndon Johnson, whose husband was the 36th President of the United States, Mrs. Darsey found these facts of interest: Lady Bird was born Dec. 22, 1912, with the name Claudie Alta Taylor. The name Lady Bird was given her by her nursemaid, who said she was "As pretty as a ladybird." Her mother died when Lady

Bird was five years old. Her aunt came to care for her until such time that she could do for herself. Her mother left her 3800 acres of land in Alabama when she died, so Lady Bird was not raised in poverty. LBJ said of her that she had great understanding, an enduring and great character, and she was the most interesting woman he ever knew. Her children were brought up with the concept to think of others before self 'She faced three major

crises: (1), when Lyndon went to war: (2), during the Senate campaign in 1948 when he won by 87 votes and (3), in Los Angeles when he accepted the vice presidential nomination. Lady Bird's outstanding contribution during her husband's presidential career was her 'America The Beautiful



STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

Christians at Corinth divided themselves into four groups, and the spirit of division forbid them to worship together, including the Lord's supper. Paul gave them the cure for their sin. "Speak the same thing," and "no divisions." "No divisions" leaves little room for partyism in the church. These Christians had perverted the gospel of Christ to the extent that division among Christ's followers was the result. If all do not speak the same thing (gospel), sin is taking over.

I: the first century of Christianity, a common problem was a certain element of Jewish converts who insisted that all Christians (even gentiles) must keep certain parts of the Old Law. Much of the books of Hebrews and Galatians is designed to correct the influence of these false teachers. Therefore, many scriptures in these two books are explicit about there being two separate covenants, and that the two covenants are not in force

Early in the Book of Hebrews, Paul reasons, aided by the Holy Spirit, that the Levitical priesthood has been abrogated. He states that we now have a "new high priest." 3:1, 4:14. This new priest was NOT after the order of Aaron, but after the order of Melchizedek. Heb. 7:11. And this new high priest is Jesus the Christ, the Son

Then Paul declares, Heb. 7:12. For when the priesthood is changed, of necessity there takes place a change of laws also.

By use of the word "necessity" we understand that the law of Moses has been fulfulled. Col. 2:14. When the priesthood was changed from Aaron to Christ, the law was changed from that of God through Moses to the law of God through Christ. Both laws were from God, but were to serve different dispensations and different purposes. Gal. 3:23-25. But before faith came, we were kept in custody under the law, being shut up to the faith which was later to be revealed. Therefore the law has become our tutor (schoolmaster, KJ) to lead us to Christ, that we may be justified by faith. But now that faith has come, we are no longer under the tutor.

We are no longer under God's first law by Moses, but we are under God's second law, which is by Christ. L. E. O'Neal (Cor, inued)

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
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
