## Delay Results In Deal For Springs

THE TRANSACTION about a month ago whereby two California women, Jeanie Bassett and Mrs. Marian Jones, purchased 1425 acres of land, on which historic Roaring Springs is located, will have a delay.

The purchase is being made from "Chuck" Stewart, Lubbock financier.

The delay in the transaction resulted from the California buyers' Lubbock escrow attorneys wishing a change in the escrow contract. The deal was in the hands of Mr. Stewart's land agent and only lately has Mr. Stewart been located to sign the new contract.

Mrs. Jones is the daughter of J. D. Mitchell of Roaring Springs, and was born and raised in Roaring Springs.

Her husband has been Missing in Action for eight years.

Mrs. Bassett is the widow of an astronaut who was killed in an automobile accident following his trip to the moon. The two women first became acquainted after the husbands became friends in Army camp.

The delay will probably mean that the pool will not be opened this season. The escrow contract usually means that 90 days must pass before the property goes to the new owner.

"Lubbock is kind of like home to me," said the Texas Tech graduate. Other factors in his decision is the university, where his son, Randy, will be a third year pre-medical student, and where his daughter, Robin, can attend upon graduation from high school.

Mr. and Mrs. Amonett and their children came here 7 years ago from Crowell, when he was elected head coach and athletic director. A year later he was given the added duties of elementary school principal. He was assistant superintendent one-half year before becoming superintendent three and one-half years ago.

In this period, three major objectives have been achieved, consolidation of the Dodson and Wellington school districts, introduction of Plan A Special Education, and the addition of Kindergarten.

"I feel the school has progressed, especially in view of the declining scholastic population," said Mr. Amonett.

The family belongs to First Baptist Church. Mr. Amonett is now on leave of absence from the Kiwanis Club and belongs to Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Amonett, who grew up at Crowell, who has given most of her time to her home, was co-chairman of last year's highly successful Cancer Crusade.

Mr. Amonett grew up at Flomot, received a B.S. degree from Texas Tech and MEd from Midwestern University, Wichita Falls. He began his coaching career with one year in Matador, followed by a year at Ralls. He was in the Crowell Schools 18 years, and entered administrative work with three years as high school principal before coming to Wellington.

He is a member of Texas State Teachers Association and the Administrator's Association of Texas.

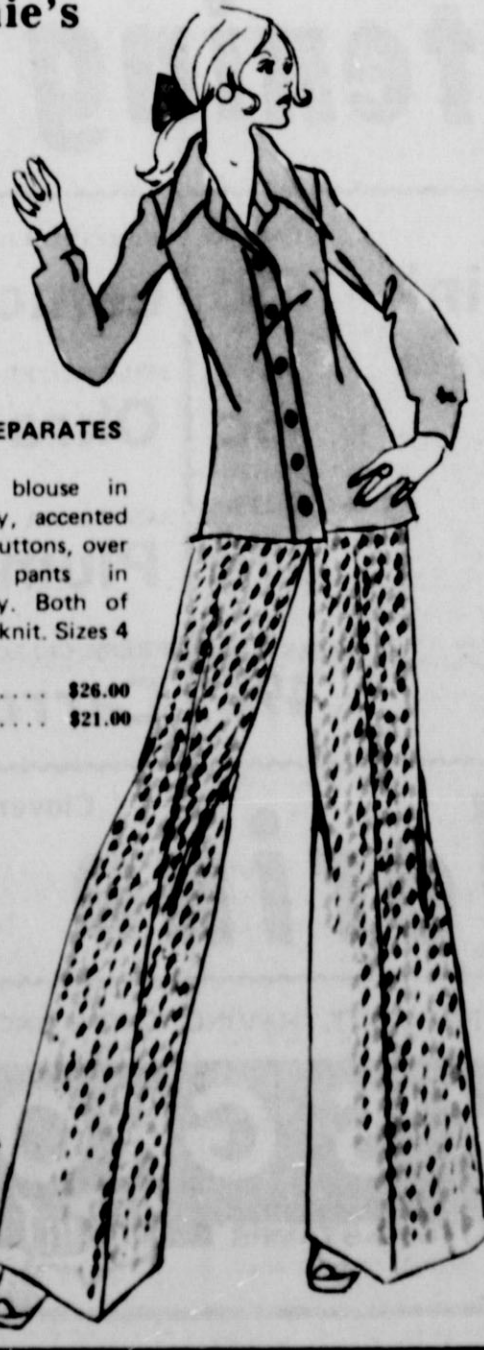

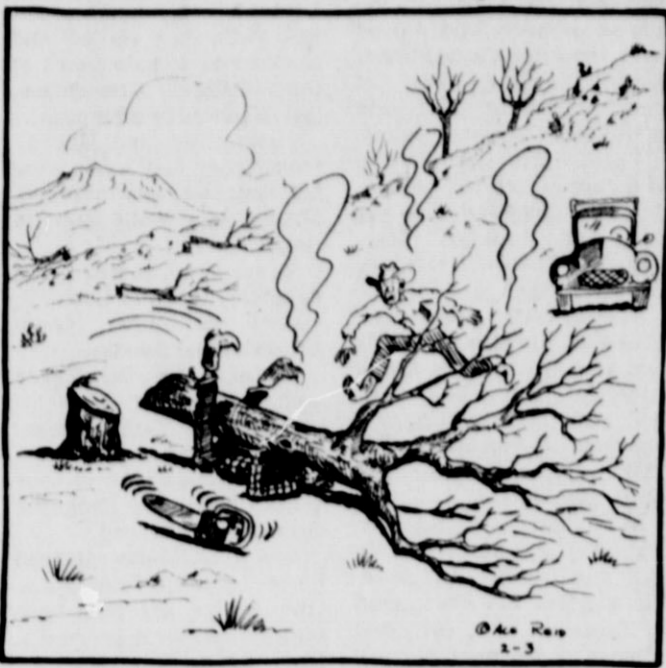

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**Landowners Win Victory**

American landowners have won a major victory in Congress with regard to the Land Use Planning Act of 1973, according to Harold Campbell, president of the Motley County Farm Bureau. On June 11, the proposed legislation, H. R. 10294, was prevented from coming up for House consideration by a vote of 211 to 204. President Campbell said American Farm Bureau Federation legislative representatives in Washington, D.C., said this defeat of the rule to bring up the bill had the effect of killing it for this session.

President Campbell and the Motley County Farm Bureau commended Congressman Bob Price of Pampa for his vote that helped defeat the rule to bring H. R. 10294 up for consideration by the House. President Campbell said that H. R. 10294 was similar to S. 268 which was passed by the U.S. Senate in June of last year. Both bills provide for federal grants to states which designate an agency of the state to conduct a comprehensive study on the "highest and best use" of each acre of land, and then authorize some agency of government to implement the recommendations of the study, he said.
