STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

Christ proved that He is from God by demonstrating His power over death. Let's look at Mark's record as found in Chapter Fifteen

And when the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome, brought spices, that they might come and anoint Him. And very early on the first day of the week, they came to the tomb when the sun had risen

.. And he said to them, "Do not be amazed; you are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who has been crucified. He has risen; He is not here; behold, here is the place where they laid Him. But go, tell His disciples and Peter, 'He is going before you into Galilee; there you will see Him, just as He said to Mk. 15:1-2.6-7.

Mark wrote the above account several years after Christ's resurrection. By the time Mark recorded this, some apostles and many others had lost their lives because they were teaching the "resurrection of Christ." All apostles continued this teaching until death. The apostles must have been eyewitnesses of the resurrection to face death rather than deny the teaching. Let us hear John.

What was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we beheld and our hands handled, concerning the Word of life . . . what we have seen and heard we proclaim to you also, that you also may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ. 1 John 1, 3.
