## Farm Payments to Cushion County Economy

**IF THE DROUGHT** continues, Motley County farmers may look to the local ASCS office to cushion the blow to the tune of more than \$700,000 (perhaps more). Federal farm practice payments will definitely relieve the county's economy.

At present the county has 33,507 acres cotton allotment. Cotton farmers have until the 15th of August to enter the domestic cotton program and reduce their acreage by one-third. On the remaining two-thirds they will be paid a price in the neighborhood of \$10 per acre. This could mean approximately \$200,000 to Motley County farmers in addition to what they might produce from two-thirds of their present crop.

The former Nellie Keltz was born at Brandon, Hill County, Texas December 1, 1881 and died August 1, 1964 at the age of 82 years and eight months. She had been a member of the Baptist Church since girlhood. She moved to Wilbarger County with her parents in 1890, at the age of nine years. She was married to Thomas J. Darsey, May 7, 1905 at Lockett, Texas and they lived for a short time in New Mexico before moving to Motley County in 1909. They made their home first in the Whiteflat community and later in the White Star community, where they made their home until Mr. Darsey's death on May 27, 1952.

Mrs. Darsey moved to Matador several years ago, but due to her ill health spent several months last year in Lubbock with her daughter. She returned to her home here in May. She is survived by two sons, Robert Darsey, Matador, and Allen family at Harrison, Tenn. near Chattanooga.

## Farmers Alerted to Boll Weevil Danger

FARMERS are alerted to the danger of the boll weevil which may soon put them out of the cotton producing business, as has been the fate of East Texas. In a meeting here Friday in the District Courtroom approximately 60 farmers attended and plans were mapped to wage war on the weevil. It is known as the Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program, under the auspices of the Plains Cotton Growers Association.

Four meetings are scheduled this week in the county to organize the program. The first was held here Tuesday night. The second meeting, was held at Northfield last night. A meeting will be held at the Flomot school house tonight and another at Roaring Springs school Friday night. All meetings were scheduled to start at 8 p. m.

The drive, which will include four sprayings at 10-day intervals in September, will probably include 150,000 acres of cotton in five counties. The government is matching half the costs. The cost to farmers is 50¢ per bale of cotton which is delivered at the compress.

**Youth Council Plan Proposed**  
A YOUTH COUNCIL in Motley County is the hope of Tommy Green, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Green Jr. of Matador, who was a member of Attorney General Waggoner Carr's Youth Conference in Austin recently. The youth, who provided an outstanding program at the regular luncheon-meeting of the Matador Lions Club held Tuesday in the basement of the Methodist Church, said there has been an 88% increase in crime in the past ten years and that much of it is committed by juveniles.

He said it was pointed out at the conference that the school "drop out" is one of the big problems. Only 1% of juvenile crime is committed by students, according to statistics.

Boas Leon Freddie Welling complimented the committee that contacted the State Highway Department regarding a "bouncing ball" four way stop sign at the intersection of Highway 70 and Main Street, and also the installation of stop signs at Main and Dundee Streets.

Leon Forrest Campbell said the baseball season was about completed with the exception of a few "mopping up" games. He said between 65 and 70 boys here had participated in the program and that about 35 adults had given time and efforts to make the successful season possible.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the name, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Western Stormproof was the leading variety, accounting for 30% of the acreage in the county. Other varieties were Lankart-23%; Parrott-17%; Northern Star-15%; Paymaster-5%; Lockett-3%; Ricot-3%; Qualla-1%; Antone-1%; Gregg-1%; and all others-1%.

Caldwell Smith, Roaring Springs, was elected President of the group. Wayne Hunter, Flomot was named Group Representative.

representative, and Bennie Keltz, Matador was named alternate representative.

The cotton variety test planted three years by Sam Ross, Flomot, was planted this year by Frank Montgomery, Matador. Varieties included are the same as 1963, except Paymaster 111 was substituted for Paymaster 101A. Other varieties are West-ern Stormproof, Lankart 99, Parrott, Qualla 10, Antone 97, DeKalb 302, Ricot 90 and Lockett 88A. All seed were furnished by the breeders with cotton farmers of the county urged to watch the plot for growth and yield.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10** proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.
