

In addition to the cultivation of wild flowers along roadsides and the beautification of roadside parks, Jameson cares for the Virginia Walton Park south of Matador on Texas 70 across from the old ranch headquarters. Donated by Virginia Walton Wilie. the park has a large variety of trees, wild flowers, and grass, all carefully tended by Jameson and his men. He constantly strives to improve its beauty so it will be a welcome place for travelers and area residents alike.

The Lady Bird Johnson Award was established in 1970 by Mrs. Lyndon B Johnson to recognize the department maintenance highway beautification in his areas. A selection committee appointed by Mrs. Johnson judged finalists' entries on August 25 in Lubbock. The committee, headed by Professor Elo Urbanovsky, chairman of the Department of Park Administration, Horticulture and Entomology at Texas Tech, includes Roy White, Glen Briggs, Mrs. William Hobby and Mrs. Marshall Stevens.

Maintenance supervisors are responsible for taking care of all state-maintained highway facilities in their areas. In addition to highways, these include roadsides and the 1.100 roadside parks, safety rest areas, and scenic turnouts on the Texas highway system.



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS OF Proposed

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the pow ers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legis-

lature, is amended to: Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and days in evennumbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of threefifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.

Article IV. The Executive, is amended to:

Continue the present status of the governor and all other statewide officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to sta'e sgencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governorelect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years un-less extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report

No state funds may be used to remove surface water from the river basin of origin if the surface water is necessary to supply the reasonably forseeable water requirements of the basin for the ensuing 50 years. unless the removal of water is sufficiently replaced to the point of removal from outside the state or is on a temporary, interim basis. The seaward beaches of the Gulf of Mexico and coastal submerged lands belonging to the state are held by the state in perpetual trust for the people, and subject to reasonable limitations prescribed by law, the public has the free and unrestricted right of use and benefit of the beaches. The provision is continued that, except as otherwise provided by law, a rate of interest in excess of ten percent a year is usurious, and that if a contract does not specify a rate of interest. the rate under the contract may not exceed six percent a year. If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 8** ON THE BALLOT

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the

State, is amended to: Establish a procedure constitutional for amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The calling of a limited or unlimited constitutional convention with voter approval is provided. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will apear on the ballot is as ollows:

The constitutional amendment revising MODE AMENDING PROVI-SIONS of the Texas Constitution.

If adopted by the voters. will become effective September 1, 1976.

#### County Agent Pallmeyer Says

Improved Triumph was the leading wheat producing variety in the 1975 test conducted by Susie Marshall and I, and Tascosa produced the most grazing. Balboa rye produced the most grain and Elk produced the most grazing. Will barley produced the most grain and Era the most grazing. Ora oats produced the most grain and Cimarron the most grazing. There was not much difference in the two triticale varieties, 6TA131 and

Agent wheat planted on Oct. 12th outyielded the same variety planted on Nov. 16th by 7.27 bu. per ac.

Four varieties of wheat were treated with Vitavax -200. Results of treated and untreated seed of the same variety were: Treated Wichita produced 2.40 bu. per ac. more than the untreated seed; treated Caddo produced .78 bu. per ac. more and treated Agent produced .40 bu. per ac. more. Untreated Triumph made 1.99 bu. per ac. more than the treated Triumph.

Complete test results will be given later.

I have wondered, and know you have wondered how the yields of the test plot compare with field yields. I know they are a little high because to compare the varieties, you have to find a place where all stands are solid, and we know that this is not true in fields.

This year Peck Thompson - Here and I cut strips in two fields, October 2 and the following results were obtained. Actual yield of Tascosa in one field, 17.3 bu. per ac., and strip yield, 14.2 bu. per ac. Actual yield of Tascosa in another field, 22.2 bu. per ac., and strip yield, 24.6 bu. per ac. From this I think you can see that the strip yields are close enough to determine the producing abilities of the grains in the test.
