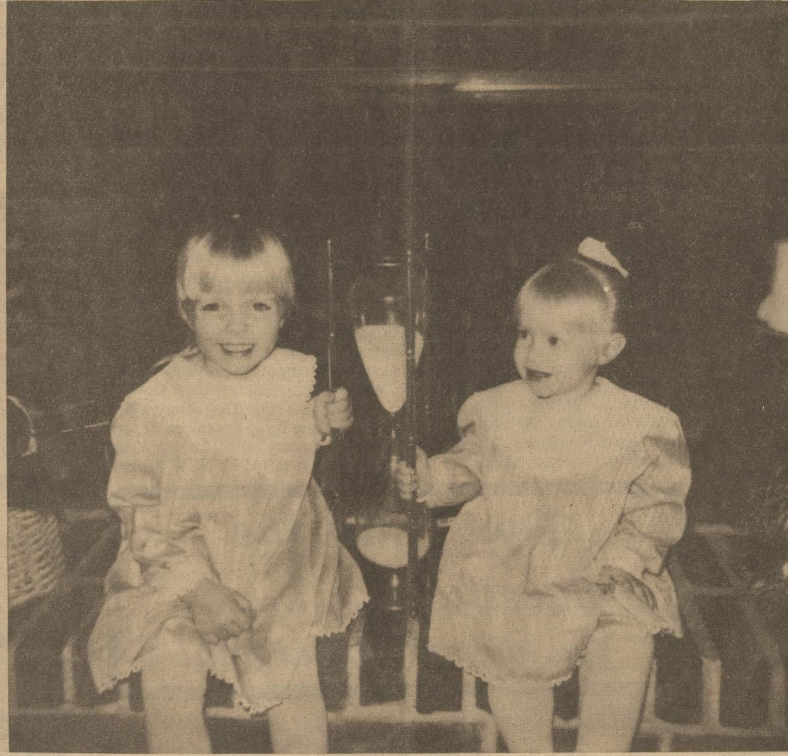


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Happy New Year

4th U.S. Cavalry Invited to Participate In Presidential Inauguration



One of the most unique historical units in the Southwestern United States has accepted an invitation to participate in the inaugural parade in Washington, D.C. on January 20th, according to Ray Thomas, first sergeant of the regiment. The invitation to participate in the parade commemorating the inauguration of President-elect George Bush, came about through the efforts of Congressman Larry Combest, Texas Railroad Commissioner Kent Hance, and United States Senator Phil Gramm. Working with members of the Lubbock-based cavalry, Gramm, Combest and Hance contracted Mr. Bush's Inau-

gural Committee about the unit and secured the invitation. "The 4th U.S. Cavalry Regiment Memorial is an educational organization which reenacts South Plains history for the benefit of schools, community celebrations, and special events," Hance told the committee. "I believe this non-profit military reenactment organization will certainly enhance the day's activities." Sergeant Thomas expressed the groups' excitement when he said this was the biggest thing which has happened to the unit. "We'll have 18 to 20 mounted troops in the parade," he said. "The major hurdle

facing us is funding to get to Washington and back. We also need to know if anyone in the area has some dark colored horses, 14 to 15 hands, which they would loan us for this parade." The 4th Cavalry was organized in 1985 for the purpose of contributing to the education of the people of this area on the Indian Wars period of our history (1869-1876). "We are a reenactment group that is dedicated specifically to the period of time when Colonel Ranald S. Mackenzie and his 4th Cavalry actually operated in this area," said Major Larry Goldston, adjutant/executive officer of the regi-

ment. "All of our uniforms, equipment, weapons and saddle gear are period replicas or authentic antiques. We pride ourselves in recreating the trooper as he actually was and not as he has been portrayed by artists and by the movies." Colonel Mackenzie's cavalry was able to achieve the distinction of being "the most successful regiment" in all of the army during the Indian Wars. "Our unit commemorates this immense victory by heralding to all this part of history, by helping to educate the public through reenactment, displays and discussions at school and public events, Major Goldston said. "We promote historical preservation, research and authentic living history."

Because the group is registered as a non-profit organization, it relies on membership dues and tax-deductible donations of cash as well as horses and equipment. "We need horses," Major Goldston said. "There may be some people who have horses which they are not using they might realize more out of their horses by donating them than they could by selling them; with the assurance that the mounts would be well cared for and would be providing a useful service. We will even come get them."

He also stated the 4th Cavalry will accept donations of wagons, horse drawn ambulances, weapons and saddle equipment. The donors will be given a receipt for their tax purposes.

Lieutenant Colonel Robert Marlett, commander of the regiment, said the 4th Cavalry has a place for everyone. "We realize that nothing worthwhile ever gets accomplished by limiting participation to a few," he said. "We welcome all to come join and share in the thrill."

LTC Marlett said it is not mandatory to own a horse, and a member will be advised by the board of standards the method of obtaining the correct items.

No 45 Day Extension For Farmers

Lubbock - Farmers may be in for a shock if they are expecting an extension on the 45-day deadline for submitting their loan restructuring applications to the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Bill Stewart, the Lubbock County District Supervisor of FmHA, told area attorneys and accountants Tuesday (Dec. 20) that the 45-day deadline was specified in the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987 and that he does not expect an extension of time to be granted by Congress.

The Agricultural Credit Act of 1987 is legislation that requires the FmHA, the Federal Land Bank Associations and the Production Credit Association to restructure distressed loans if restructuring is a less costly alternative than foreclosure.

FmHA has sent notices to borrowers who are more than 180 days late on their payments. These notices inform the borrowers that they have 45 days to decide whether they wish to try to restructure their debt and to prepare all necessary paperwork or to prepare for foreclosure. "The 45-day period begins on the day continued on page 3

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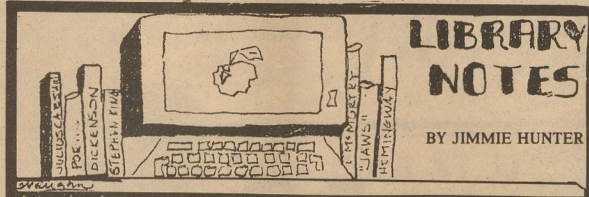

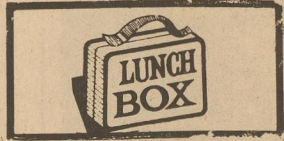

Home Economically Speaking

WEEDING OUT THE RECORDS
 Winter is a good time to re-assess your financial habits because a year has just ended. Like most people, your financial papers and records could probably stand a little overhauling.
 But before you begin a reorganizing, consider what you really need and what you can prune out. Most of us save more paperwork than necessary and it just takes up a lot of space.
 Start by setting out boxes and files to hold three types of records: those you can toss, those you need to keep six or more years, and those you need to keep for the rest of your life.
 THOSE YOU CAN TOSS. If you don't need the record for tax purposes or if you are sure it can easily be replaced, don't save it.
 Receipts for small daily purchases do not have to be saved, especially if they have no tax consequences. But keep receipts for expensive items to settle insurance claims in the case of loss, theft or damage.
 It isn't necessary to keep monthly mutual fund and brokerage statements once a comprehensive year-end statement is issued. However, you should save trade confirmations and dividend-reinvestment statements. This information is needed to determine your cost basis when you sell a security. Without it, you may overpay taxes when you sell the security.
 You can safely discard most business receipts for less than \$25 and your credit card bills after your bank returns the cancelled check verifying that you paid the bill. However, if you need your credit card statement for analyzing itemized deductions at tax time, keep those statements with your tax records.
RECORDS TO KEEP SIX OR MORE YEARS. Plan to keep tax records for as long as they are important for an Internal Revenue law. Keep records that support an item of income or a deduction appearing on a return until the statute of limitations for the return runs out. Usually this is 3 years from the date the return was due or filed, or 2 years from the date the tax was paid, whichever date is later.
 Sometimes you may have to keep tax records for a longer period, such as in property transactions, when the basis for the new or replacement property depends on the old property's basis. Keep those records for as long as they are important in figuring your property's basis.
RECORDS TO KEEP FOREVER. These records include birth and death certificates, list of financial assets, medical records, powers of attorney, trust agreements, wills and W-2 statements. Also keep divorce decrees and custody agreements, military papers, naturalization papers and prenuptial agreements.
 Getting a handle on your paper trail will take a little time and effort, but will be worth it. Once you've accomplished this task, you'll be able to find every paper you need.

Social Security Tips

The most common reason for failure to receive a Social Security check is not reporting a change of address. A change of address may be reported to any Social Security office by phone or mail.
 Some people apparently think that's all they have to do to report a change of address to the post office. However, the post office will forward mail to the new address for only 1 year, after which any mail that does not contain the new address is returned to the sender.
 People who have their checks sent directly to their bank and fail to report a change of address, also risk having their checks interrupted. Social Security periodically checks to see if the proper person is receiving the checks and if there is no response to the mailed inquiry, the checks may be stopped.
 In addition, direct depositors who fail to report a change of address may miss receiving important information mailed to beneficiaries that may affect their checks.
 If you have any questions about reporting your new address, or if you wish to file a claim call 1-800-2345-SSA.

Older Consumers Beware Of Telephone Solicitors

DALLAS, "Older consumers should beware of telephone solicitors and door-to-door salesmen claiming to represent the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP)," reports AARP Texas State Director and chief volunteer, Jim Bergen.
 Telephone solicitors claiming to be representatives of AARP are operating throughout Texas. They usually do not mention that they are hired by the Allied Association of Retired Persons of Beaumont, Texas, not the 30 million member American Association of Retired Persons.
 The telephone solicitors, claiming to represent AARP, will discuss "funeral insurance benefits" and if the older consumer responds positively, the telephone caller arranges an appointment for a salesman to visit the individual.
 "AARP does not offer any insurance products by telephone solicitation or through local agents. We have no salesmen of any kind who call on members in their homes," states Bergen.
 Bergen suggests that anyone contacted by telephone or by salesmen claiming to represent AARP or the Social Security Administration should contact the Texas Attorney General's office, the Texas State Board of Insurance, of their local law enforcement agency. Project to Aid Rural Revitalization Efforts

COLLEGE STATION - The Agricultural Extension Service in partnership with the Texas Bankers Association is launching a three-year economic "self-help" project to help revitalize rural communities.

The project is supported by a \$300,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Mich. It is aimed at helping rural communities with policy options and strategies for adjusting to poor economic conditions brought on by the depressed energy and agricultural industries.

"Many of our Texas communities have undergone severe economic stress in recent years, and there is major concern about their long-term growth and, in some cases, survival," said Dr. Ron Knutson, an economist in marketing and policy with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Yet these communities can offer economic opportunity and an attractive quality of life for Texans."

"That's why we want to look at various government policies and programs that can play a key role in helping rural communities adjust to their future role and realize their potential," said Knutson, who is coordinating the project along with Dr. Dennis Fisher, an Extension Service economist in business development.

"Various levels of government have a

role in helping rural communities adjust to change, and we will be examining those roles and the consequences of various policy options. We will also be identifying policy and program needs as well as specific community problems that should be addressed," Knutson said.

He said that while past development programs have focused mainly on urban areas, there has been relatively little study on rural development policy options.

"We will be preparing a handbook of policy 'tools' to explain and evaluate policy initiatives that might be pursued by rural communities," Knutson said. "In addition, we will be developing a planning and analysis framework to help rural community leaders with their decision-making."

The W.K. Kellogg Foundation, established in 1930 to "help people help themselves," has distributed more than \$1 billion in support of programs in agriculture, education and health. Areas of emphasis within those broad fields include adult continuing education; community-based, problem-focused health services; a wholesome food supply; and broadening leadership capacity of individuals.

The Foundation is among the largest private philanthropic organizations in the world, supporting programs in the United States, Latin America, the Caribbean, and southern African countries.

Students Urged to Apply for Private Grants, Scholarships

Graduate, Undergraduate, and College-bound Students in need of supplemental funding for college are urged to write to the Scholarship Bank for information on private scholarship sources.

The Scholarship Bank is a non-profit foundation which works with private foundations, the U.S. Department of Education, and financial aid offices to assure that high school and college students already attending college receive information on private aid sources. Funds are normally awarded on such basis as academic standing, major, financial need, and even on a student's willingness to consider a special research project.

It is estimated that over 500 million dollars in private aid money will be dis-

tributed next year, or roughly one-fourth of all available aid. Funds for Undergraduate students range from \$1,000 to \$20,000 per student, with most scholarships renewable yearly. Graduate level grants are also available with values up to \$25,000.

National Organizations are funding women 25 and older who are returning to school to continue their education. Older Female awards range from \$500 to \$20,000.

the borrower signs the certified mail receipt attached to his package," said Stewart. "That date is entered into a computer program and it can't be changed."

Stewart said Congress designed the loan restructuring program with rigid rules and procedures to hamper any kind of manipulation by borrowers or lenders.

Stewart said one of the speakers at the FmHA Loan Restructuring Process Seminar. The workshop was presented to attorneys and accountants with clients who have received FmHA letters. Texas Tech University Division of Continuing Education and the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program co-sponsored the workshop Tuesday at the Lubbock Plaza Hotel.

Director of the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program Gary Condra also emphasized the importance of immediate action by borrowers after they received their letters from FmHA.

"The 45-day deadline is about to run out on a lot of borrowers. We want to assist borrowers in preparing their applications, but we can't help if they wait until the last minute," he said.

Condra, also a professor of agricul-

tural economics at Texas Tech, said borrowers should telephone (806) 742-1949 immediately if they want help.

In November, the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program at Texas Tech was designated by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture as the state agency to mediate between delinquent farm borrowers and their lenders.
