Montfort Savings Becomes First Texas Bank, F.S.B.

Effective Wednesday, December 28, Montfort Savings became First Texas Bank, FSB.

Sam Hart, spokesman for the new entity, said he foresees "little if any changes in the Paducah office." He also remarked that "all accounts are fully insured up to \$100,000." Service at the institution continued Wednesday without interruptions.

A private group committed \$315 million to acquire Montfort and four other thrift institutions, Gibraltar Savings Association and Home Savings and Loan

Association, both located in Houston; First Texas Savings Association, Dallas; and Killeen Savings and Loan Association in Killeen.

Investors in the federally assisted transaction are CEO Gerald J. Ford, who is also chairman of Fort Bank Group in Dallas, and Ronald O. Perelman, chairman of MacAndrews and Forbes Holdings, Inc. in New York. Perelman also serves as chairman of Revlon, Inc.

The five thrift institutions have combined assets of \$12.2 billion on liabilities of \$12.8 billion.

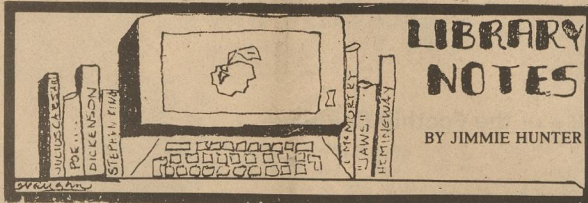

realistic assessment of one's financial goals and resources. Start each new year by preparing a net worth statement. That's a statement of what you own (savings accounts, cars, stereo equipment, home, jewelry) and what you owe (credit card bills, loans, medical bills, school loans). The difference between what you own and what you owe is your "net worth." Don't worry if it's small or even negative. Remember, you are just starting out and you'll probably see many positive changes over the years.

Decide how much credit will be affordable for you. Most experts advise committing no more than 15 to 20 percent of take-home pay to credit payments, not counting a mortgage payment. If your credit payments are too high you may need to postpone further purchases or save the money until you can afford the purchase.

Also consider that the tax advantages of buying on credit are limited to just 20 percent of the total finance charges you pay in 1989. Try to keep your finance charges low, especially on high interest credit cards you may use.

Finally, set realistic savings goals. Many newlywed couples believe they have too little money to save. However, even if you can save only a few dollars each month, set it aside in an interest-bearing account where you won't spend it as readily. Over time, as your income increases, you can increase the amount of money you save. Before long, your nest egg will be substantial.

W.E. "Bill" Briscoe, 73, died Tuesday, December 27, 1988.
