State Rep. Mike McKinney, D-CenLerville, knows firsthand the problems
facing rural health care providers and hopes to convince his colleagues in the Texas Legislature to help small town hospials kecp their doors open.

Medicaid or other government programs to be designated an "agent of the state." With that designation, the doctor's liability would be limited to $\$ 100,000$.
McKinncy's bill also would change the standard of proof in malpractice suits involving emergency treatment. A plaintiff would have to prove gross negligence Although not an obstetrician, McKin Although not an obstetrician, McKin-
ey said he frequently must deliver baney said he frequently must deliver ba-
bies when he is the only physician in the emergency room at Leon Memorial Hospital in Buffalo.

When someone shows up with a head injury, chest injury or having a baby...I'm it," McKinney said, adding that a physician should not be penalized for profiding the best care he can.
McKinney is also proposing that the
insurance industry be required to deal insurance industry be required to deal wit industrywide basis rather than company by company. He hopes to eliminate the consent to rate waiver that insurers force physicians to sign, thereby allowing the insurance company to sell the liability coverage at a rate higher than approv
ance.
