citizens was about a child getting the dreaded strychnine instead of a family Linda White, State Health De-

Linda White, State Health Department Engineer, assured the group of citizens that the Health Department would send information to the Motley County Clinic and the EMS on treating a human who has swallowed the poison.

Dr. John Haliburton, Veterinarian Biochemist of Amarillo, stated that the amount equal to one-fifth the size of an aspirin was fatal to most dogs and the amount equal to one-half an aspirin is fatal to a small child.

The Dr. said that a child will possibly

There is still great concern in Matad- the animal or person to go into seisure quicker. Dr Haliburton suggested the victum be kept as calm and quiet as possible and even cover with a blanket while transporting to medical help.

children to wash their hands with soap and warm water frequently and not to put

Jerry Bynum, Field Investagator for

14 and 15. It will be here or in Plainview Charlie stated that they needed men to help with the field events and the school would appreciate any one that could help.






Strychnine Poisoning" strikes fear in the heart of every parent and grandpar-

ent.
With so many area dogs being deliberately poisoned, it behooves everyone concerned with the welfare of children to be cautious. The best (in fact, the ONLY be cautious. The best (in fact, the ONLY sure) treatment of Strychnine poisoning is PREVENTION. Be sure to parrol the yard or play area EACH TIME before letting children play. Warn them about putting anything in their mouths, and insure good handwashing before eating. Once the poison is ingested there are

no warning signs before the person (or animal) begins convulsing (seizures). At this point immediate medical attention is necessary! We are in contact with the Texas Department of Health, the Poison Life. Be assured that we have the neces

ontrol Center, and St. Mary's Flight for sary equipment to instill detoxifying medicine directly into the stomach, and the sedation medicine that is to be given intravenously, in an effort to stabilize the afflicted person, in preparation for transfer to a major medical center.

In the late 1920's a Tri-Motor Ford Airplane landed in a stubble field, on the

We bargained with them asto how far, and where we would go. Turkey was agreed on. We thought we were to land there, get off, and let people see us. "That would have been just great."

There were fourteen of us who took the ride, Gaddy Freeman, Frank Wright, Gladys Thornton, Hazel McCaghren, Brooks Calloway, Arvil Craven, John Traweek, Algie Groves, Alvin Stearns, Mutt Williams, and myself. There were three others. I cannot call their names. We were not on the ground, more than

We were not on the ground, more than one hundred yards before we were air-

It was quite exciting, as I had never been any higher off the ground, than the windmill tower.

It took about fifteen or twenty minutes to get to Turkey. I began looking around to see where we were going to land, but we kept circling, without losing any alti-

After seeing that we had made a complete circle and were headed back to Matador, we were disappointed, but it wasn't a "big deal," as we were enjoying

I remember sitting on the right side next to the motor. It was noisy, also the body metal was rattling and banging. It reminded me of the Model T Ford (Tin

In that day, if they knew anything about insulators against creaks and rattles,

Back home, we agreed the plane ride was the highlight of our lives.

The plane was basically used to carry mail and freight. However, it was also used by the early airlines. The capacity was about twenty or twenty-five passengers

It hasn't been but a few years since they were still being used in Central and South America, to carry freight.

In the thick forest and mountainous terrains it was so difficult to build run-

ways of any length. The Ford plane was still in demand. It would carry a heavier load and it took less distance for it to take off and land, than any other available

That's the way it was.
