

Historic Steel Issue Up Before High Court

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—Arguments on the legality of President Truman's seizure of the steel mills began before the Supreme Court at 10:22 a. m. (CST) today.

John W. Davis, speaking for six major steel companies, led off for the industry in its efforts to have the high tribunal uphold District Judge David A. Pine's ruling last month that the seizure was unlawful.

Philip B. Perlman, solicitor general and acting attorney general, waited his turn to present a reversal of Pine's decision.

Reds Use Truce Talks For 'Lies'

By ROBERT EUNSON MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—The United Nations Command today sharply accused the Communists of using the Korean armistice talks for a propaganda sounding board.

UNC communists said the Reds fired "their most vicious propaganda attack of the 10-month armistice negotiations" in a 34-minute "tirade, obviously prepared in advance" and "filled with invective, distortions and palpable lies."

North Korea Rail Network Blasted By UN

SEOUL, Korea, May 12 (AP)—United Nations warplanes today blasted the North Korean rail network with another of their new saturation bombings designed to make track repairs as tough as possible for the Reds.

The U. S. Fifth Air Force said fighter-bombers made 28 cuts in a short stretch on the vital Kanggye-Snanju line near Hulchon in the northwest. Nine U. S. B-29s hit the Hulchon rail bridge yesterday with 90 tons of bombs.

Clark said the reply to the prisoners "was made under duress at a time when the life of General Dodd was at stake. Any commitments made... as a result of such demands should be interpreted accordingly."

## DESIGNING WOMAN Edward Stone Designs Graceful Oak Furniture

Watch for a new trend toward high style furniture in oak. Oak is the kind of sturdy, long wearing, easy-to-care-for material that crisp contemporary design calls for. It lagged a long time in furniture fashion because much of it was massive and rustic rather than light and living-room smart, and then because the first modern oak furniture was all so monotonously alike. That oak can take on the grace and style and variety of top furniture fashions is well illustrated by an eye-catching new grouping of living room and dining room furniture designed by the well known architect Edward D. Stone, sketched in part here. Note the bent legs, unusual for oak, the combination of black lacquer and natural finish, the slat tops, the trim upholstery, the lightness of all pieces. For the woven back and seat of the chair and the door fronts of the cabinet Mr. Stone adapts products of an historic American handicraft. Strips are hand-split oak wythes laced in basket weave by craftsmen of the Ozark hills who have practiced this skill for many generations.

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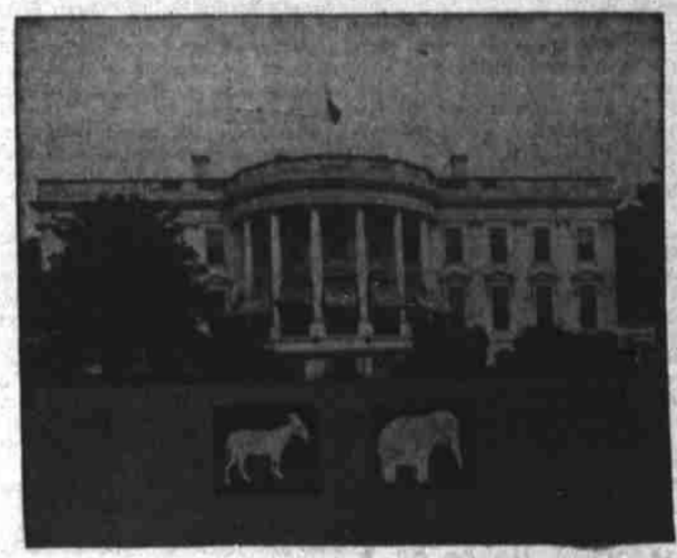

Russian Catch Lot Of Herring For Home Folks

LONDON, (AP)—A stern-faced delegation of Russians, barred by the West from any military strategic purchases here, came up today with 50,000 barrels of solace for the folks back home.

London newspapers said the big herring catch, result of quiet conferences going on here for days, would be announced next week in the House of Commons.

It will make up the largest British shipment of herring to the Russians since before the Bolshevik revolution. Before World War I, the Russians used to get 900,000 barrels of British herring a year.

For their fish, the British this time expect canned salmon from the Russians.

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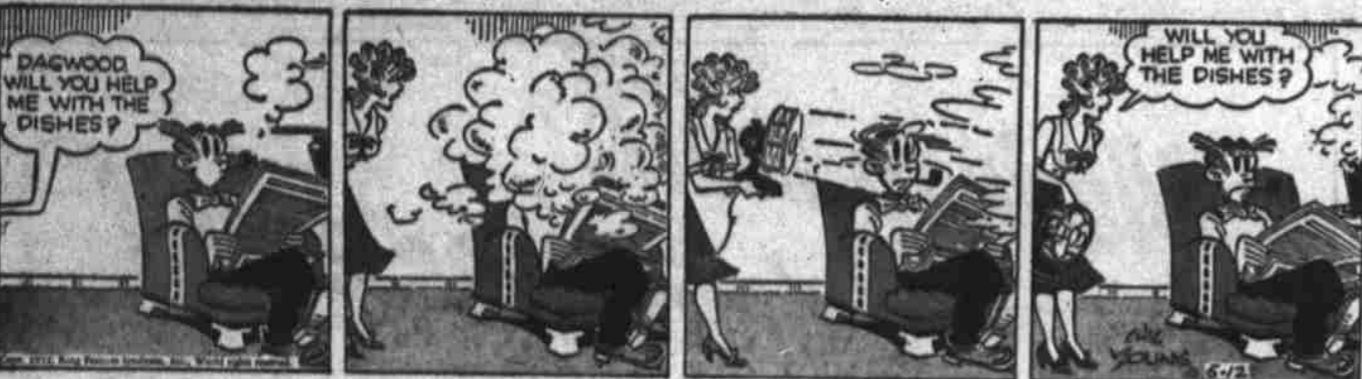

WASHINGTON (D-L) - Sen. Ellender (D-La.) said today he hopes "some people who are too doggone suspicious" won't try to prevent a scheduled windup of his investigation.
Ellender heads the Senate Agriculture Committee now in the fifth month of an inquiry into alleged wrongdoings in the department's farm aid program of price supports and crop storage.
"I just hope some people who are too doggone suspicious aren't going to try to drag this thing out beyond the point where it serves a useful purpose, and we have about reached that point now," Ellender said today in public hearings Thursday with testimony by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan, who has asked for a chance to answer charges of a "cover-up job" voiced by Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.).

## BY AIR FORCE PARTY More Secrets Of Arctic Revealed

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — The daring North Pole Air Force plane-landing party has uncovered more of the arctic's secrets.

One, a cache left by the Rear Adm. Robert E. Peary expeditions in the early 1900s, had lain hidden nearly a half century. Others, scientific secrets, are as old as the arctic itself.

The Air Force told today of more of the work done by scientists and observers on the historic flight May 4 in which Lt. Col. William P. Benedict, of Paradise, Calif., landed a C-47 and took off three hours and 10 minutes later from the geographic North Pole.

These were some of the results: The depth of the ocean below the ice was determined by a selenograph echo sounding at 14,150 feet. Dr. Albert P. Cray and his assistant, Robert Cottell, of the Cambridge Research Center, Cambridge, Mass., bored a 10-foot hole in a thick ice floe and dropped two pounds of TNT and exploded it in the experiment.

The annual spring thaw was opening great cracks in the pack ice forming the polar ice cap. M. Sgt. Edison Blair, Los Angeles, said new leads varying from a few feet to several hundred feet in

width were opening on every side of the ice flow upon which the C-47 sat.

It was only by sheer coincidence, Sgt. Blair reported, that such an area, roughly a half mile in size, was free from the pressure ridges at the geographical pole.

The Adm. Peary cache was found on one of the plane's flights and landings over the region. The plane was traveling at low altitude over Cape Columbia, Ellesmere Island, where the Peary expeditions left the last land to start a 500-mile trek over the ice.

The cache was spotted and upon landing the party found it contained names and dates between 1900 and 1909. There were four metal and wood boxes.

In other work, the expedition left at the North Pole six watertight glass jars, wrapped in eye-catching luminescent red silk. The jars contained notes about the expedition and any finders were asked to record the date and position found and report to the Air Force Research Center. Such information may supply information on the speed and direction of little-known Arctic Ocean currents.

The position of the floe as the geographic North Pole was verified by the navigator, 1st Lt. Herbert Thompson, Allenwood, Kan., by training his sextant on the sun.

Lt. Col. Benedict and Lt. Col. Joseph Fletcher, of Shawnee, Okla., said they stacked four empty oil drums into a cairn, topped by an American flag. They also thrust an Air Force flag into the top of another barrel.

## Hearings On Sen. McCarthy To Open Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate Rules Subcommittee begins public hearings today on a resolution by Sen. Benton (D-Conn.) looking toward the expulsion of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) from the Senate.

The starting point of the inquiry is a Benton charge that McCarthy "grossly violated" senatorial ethics in accepting \$10,000 in 1948 from the now-defunct Lustron corporation for an article on housing.

McCarthy says his acceptance of the fee was entirely proper and that he performed a public service in writing the article and getting it published.

Sen. Gillette (D-Ia), chairman of the subcommittee, contended in a radio interview last night, however, that McCarthy "sold" information coming to him as a government official to the Lustron people "for the purpose of their advertising."

Gillette also told CBS television interviewers that McCarthy's income tax returns have been under study.

## Expect Decision In Few Weeks On Easing Housing Restriction

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sentiment is growing in some government circles for an easing of down payment requirements on houses in the medium and upper price brackets, which have not been selling too well.

Several members of the Federal Reserve Board, which administers Regulation X over housing credit, favor the move, it was learned today.

The board is surveying the prospects and will talk things over with Raymond Foley, housing and home finance administrator, who would have to concur. The housing agency was reported cooler toward the proposal than some reserve board members.

A final decision is expected in the next few weeks.

Regulation X now requires a sliding scale of down payments starting at \$1,550 for conventional loans on \$5,000 house and zooming to 50 per cent down on all houses above \$24,500.

Loans guaranteed by the government for veterans carry smaller down payments, from \$750 for an \$8,000 house to 45 per cent for houses above \$24,500.

Some board members think the present scale has some lumps in it, with down payments increasing out of proportion to the price on homes of \$15,000 and above.

These members say one-third down would be an adequate requirement for the highest-priced homes. Starting downward from this point, they would install a lower and more even scale of down payment requirements until they approached the present scale at about the \$15,000 class.

Under the present regulation, for an \$18,000 house, on conventional loans the down payment jumps to \$6,700 and on G.I. loans to \$5,800. Thus a house costing \$10,000 more than the \$8,000 class carries more than half of the difference—more than \$5,000—included in the down payment.

The housing market as a whole is booming, but surveys by the reserve board show that sales of houses costing \$15,000 and more are relatively slow.

There were almost 100,000 housing starts in March, the second highest mark on record. Original estimates of 800,000 starts this year are being revised upward to more than one million.

Because of this tendency toward a boom situation, the board will examine the prospects carefully and any changes probably will be considered moderate by the board.

Spokesmen for realtors and builders, however, say the proposed changes would be a big help to them in selling medium and high-priced homes.

## Small A-Bombs Can Destroy Entire City Because Of Quantity

NEW YORK (AP) — The development of small atomic bombs now makes it possible for a single enemy air attack to destroy almost all the city of New York, Civil Defense Director Arthur W. Wallender says.

Wallender said yesterday in a report to Mayor Vincent R. Impellitteri that this danger stems from the "capability of a single plane to carry a dozen of the new bombs. He said new bombs are as powerful as the old ones, which were so large that a bomber could only carry one."

One plane, Wallender said, could scatter a string of the small bombs in a single run over the Bronx and Manhattan.
