This fact as stated in the original story, was inadvertently omitted. The story should have been as follows, with the bold face type indicating the part that was omitted:

Judge Reeves said the Commissioners Court would meet Thursday, July 1, in special session, to consider an order upon their own motion, calling for an election to be held in the county, Saturday, August 7, Monday, August 9, is regular meeting date for the court at which time the returns will be canvassed.

If the hospital issue is approved, the Commissioners Court will appoint a County Hospital Board. This board will be authorized to proceed to make plans for a hospital building, and to set a date for voting bonds needed in financing.

The omission was overlooked in reading the proof. In the final reading, which is not read by copy, there were no typographical errors and the omission was still not detected.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

These tips may help you keep your tank in good fishing condition, or if just stocking for a longer time. First, if there are any mudcat or other undesirable fish in the tank, kill these out before trying to stock with fingerlings. Second, don't overestimate the size of your tank. A tank is like a range, and will support only so many fish. When you stock more than the tank will handle, it's like overstocking your range. Third, don't dump your minnow bucket in the tank. You may be introducing undesirable fish that will cause trouble later on. The same applies to taking minnows from a nearby pond or stream.

Fourth, stock with the species that you enjoy fishing for. If you fish for cat only, why add the other species. Fifth, if you want forage fish in the tank, use redear, as they spawn only once a year, and don't overpopulate the tank as rapidly as bluegill, which may spawn as much as four times a year, and sixth, always stock with fish of the same size. A few large fish left in the tank will clean up the small fingerlings like a vacuum cleaner.

Add these tips to fishing heavily, fertilizing the pond and see if your fishing pleasure doesn't increase.

Scores of 4-H club boys and girls are helped every day to overcome shyness stage fright, inability to talk before groups and lack of self-confidence through the Public Speaking program.

Adults skilled in the art of public speaking often serve as project leaders, and other resourceful people in the community volunteer to work with the budding orators. Not only are they taught basic steps in researching, writing and delivering a speech, but they also are coached in the use of communication tools such as tape records, microphones, television, radio and print media.

One of the top two 4-H speakers in the nation last spring is continuing his education of public speaking in college, and many others are finding that public speaking aids them in other activities. Presiding at a meeting is easier, and many report that it is even easier to carry on a conversation after training in public speaking has been received.

Each year several boys and girls in the county compete in this program, with one state champion, Jan Barton, being produced. Why not check on this project for the coming year?

Some confusion exists on the use of DSMA and surfactants as a post emergence spray for grass control in cotton. There are two forms of the arsenicals. One is disodium methanesulfonate and the other is monosodium methanesulfonate.

The disodium is a wettable powder and the monosodium is a liquid. Most of the research done with DSMA has been with the disodium form and is fully recommended for use on cotton after it has reached a height of three inches or more.

The monosodium is more toxic than the disodium. It is probably a little more effective on weed control, but a little "hotter" on cotton. Monosodium has caused some leaf burning and plant stunting on young cotton but it seems to recover

and make a normal yield. Both the disodium and monosodium forms have been cleared for use on cotton, both materials are cleared for two applications.

The first application should be after the plants measure three inches in height, and the last application should be made before the first blooms drop. These materials work better during high temperatures, above 85 degrees F., and dry weather.

After cotton reaches 6 inches in height and if soils are moist and grass is in an active stage of growth, Karmex and surfactant give good control. Another, Caprol and surfactant can be applied as a post-emergence treatment when cotton is at least 6 inches high.

wagon "home" during the half of a century it was in use.

The stove cart was brought to the Matador range in later years, but for 40 or 50 years the cooking was done out in the open, with Dutch ovens, a flat pot set over the coals with more coals placed on the iron lid. The only protection was the canvas "fly" which was tied to the back of the wagon and stretched out over two poles, providing some shade and rain protection. It was little protection, however, in the winter.

The Matadors operated two chuck wagons for many years. About 20 years before the ranch was sold, a chuck wagon burned in the Turtle Hole pasture. Pete Coffman was the cook, according to Ed D. Smith. A cook tent and stove were being used. The stove got too hot too close to the tent and set the grass on fire, as well as the tent, chuck wagon, chuck box and harness. There was no water available and no way to put the fire out. The Matadors operated only one range wagon after the incident.

Now the last chuck wagon has gone to the \$2½ million "Valhalla" of chuck wagons, and it has made its last tracks on the great Matador range. The last of thousands of hungry cowboys has long since wiped the steak tallow from his plate and stacked it in the tub for the cook to wash. Another chapter in the history of the ranch country has been completed.
