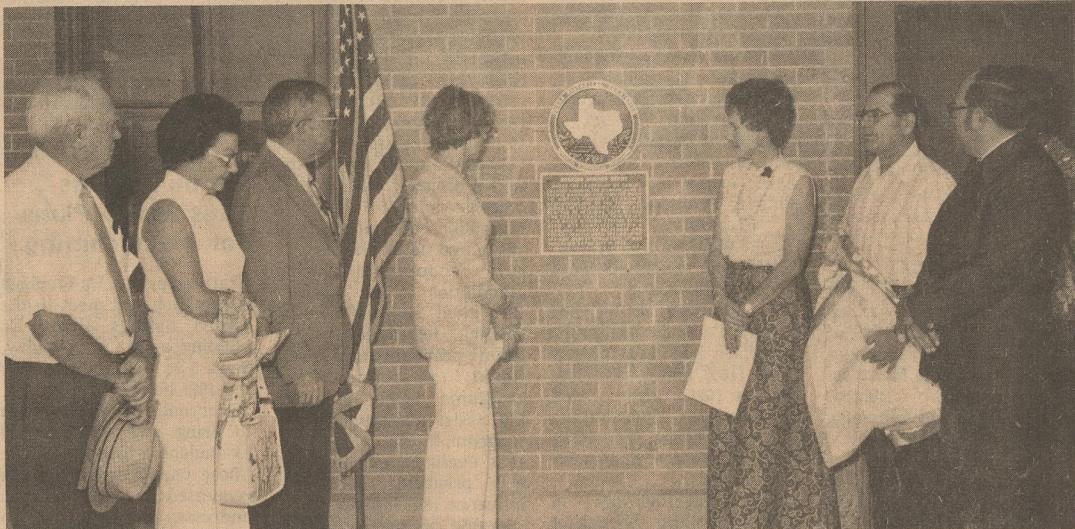

The Motley County Matadors traveled to Forsan Friday, for their second scrimmage of the year. The scrimmage proved a good test for the young Matadors, as neither team was able to score and the contest ended in a defensive stand-off.

Forsan, who some pre-season polls have picked to be in the State play-offs, was strong due to the excellent blocking of All-State guard Hollingsworth. Repeated defensive stands by Matadors Jerry Paul Lee, Jack Bivens, Bryan Timmons and Ricky Turner shut Hollingsworth down in crucial periods.

Depot Marker Unveiled

In impressive ceremonies Thursday afternoon, a historical marker was unveiled at the Roaring Springs depot, oldest structure in the community.

Mrs. J. M. (Buzz) Thacker presided in the absence of Mrs. B. L. Peacock, president of Predicta Study Club and sponsors, with the Roaring Springs Lions Club

and other interested citizens, of the project to retain the depot as a civic center and museum. Mrs. Howard Traweek, Motley County Chairman of the Texas Historical Commission, was instrumental in obtaining the marker.

Mrs. Traweek read a history of the QA&P Railroad and the depot, and introduced Dr. Don L. Hofsommer, Professor of History at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, who made the dedicatory address. He substituted for U.S. Representative Jack Hightower, who had accepted the invitation to speak, but cancelled all engagements at the death early Wednesday, of his mother.

The railroad opened up the country, and the depot became the symbol of the "Window on the World." Dr. Hofsommer told the assembly, and the bay window used in the structures, became symbolic of the depot. He told of the various services which the railroad offered - telegraph, personal delivery of mail, and express. Later uses, he pointed out, included delivery of oil, crops and other commodities.

Recognized among those present were Jim Sowell, Vice-president of the QA&P Railroad, and his wife, of Quanah, and John Huffstutler of Lubbock, who helped lay out the town of Roaring Springs, who was accompanied by his wife. Also present was Mrs. Robert Meacham of Quanah, whose husband was a former station agent, and C. M. Nichols of Quanah, also a former station agent.

Tribune Is Sold

With this issue of the Matador Tribune, the ownership passes into the hands of Diana and Ray Freedman of Earth, publishers of the Earth News-Sun, the Amherst Press and Sudan Beacon News.

The transaction was completed Monday by Mrs. Douglas Meador and Mr. Freedman, bringing to a close, publication of the Tribune by the late Douglas Meador for 42 years, and his wife, the past three years.

Mrs. Meador assumed management of the county newspaper upon the death Sept. 27, 1974 of her husband, who started his career in the newspaper business in October, 1932 when he assumed the position as editor of the hand-set Roaring Springs News. In a transaction with the owner, M. S. Thacker, Meador acquired the plant and moved it to the county seat town of Matador in 1933. He formed a partnership the following year with Howard Hamilton, and in 1935, bought Hamilton's interest, to become sole owner.

Mrs. Meador was associated in the business on a part time schedule until 1954, when she resigned a position with the First State Bank and entered the publishing business with her husband as Woman's Page editor.

During the almost half century of ownership by the couple, many young people were introduced to the graphic arts of the printing industry and journalism, several of whom established businesses for themselves while others became known by their by-lines in metropolitan areas of the news media.

With no immediate plans for the future, Mrs. Meador will assist the new owners for the next few weeks, as they become acquainted with their customers and readers in this area.

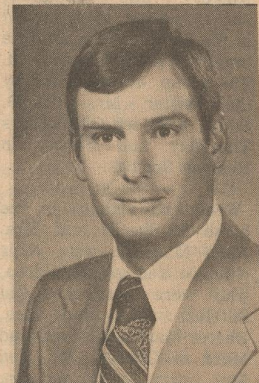
"It will take quite a while to clear out the personal clutter which has accumulated through the years," she said, "then I should like to just rest and relax."

Old Settlers Celebrate

Motley and Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association celebrated its 54th annual reunion Thursday, Friday and Saturday in customary style with something for everyone.

Things did not go exactly as planned however, and last minute changes had to be made. Raymond Akin, Plainview businessman, who was scheduled to speak at the pavilion following the memorial service, was unable to attend because of illness. Rev. Con Davis, pastor of Extension, Trinity Church, Lubbock filled in with a timely address following the memorial service, which he also conducted. Names of deceased from both counties during the past year, were read.

Sam Ross, Flomot, president of the association, opened the program, and Welcome address was by Charlie Long, Roaring Springs Mayor. A tribute to the late Jinks Wilson, written by Mrs. Allen Bosh, was read by Algie Groves, secretary of the association.

"May it be a dedication for the living . . . Jinks Wilson was a man we could all emulate," said Rev. Davis as he led in a memorial prayer.

In his short talk, Rev. Davis stressed that "We are one of the last frontiers . . . early settlers were in California before they came to this territory." He pointed out

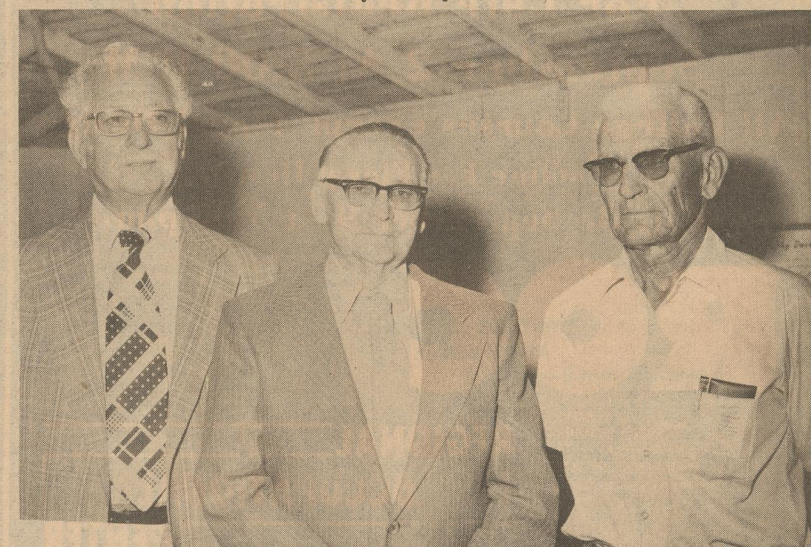
that railroads played an important part in establishing the towns and ranches of West Texas, and cited the Matador Ranch in Motley County and Espuela Cattle Co., in Dickens County. He also pointed out that it was the churches and schools, not the saloons and dance halls, that formed the foundation for the early communities. "Moral standards were high," he declared, "people loved each other and helped one another . . . homes were left open and the stranger was always welcome."

Bob Morris of Plainview led the assembly in singing "Fill My Cup, Lord," to conclude the morning program.

In a business session when the association reconvened following lunch, Don Warren of Motley County and Robert Forbis, Dickens County were elected as two new directors to fill unexpired terms of Guy Campbell and Johnny Koonsman. Bill Peacock was re-elected and Gary Bridge elected as directors for 3-year terms.

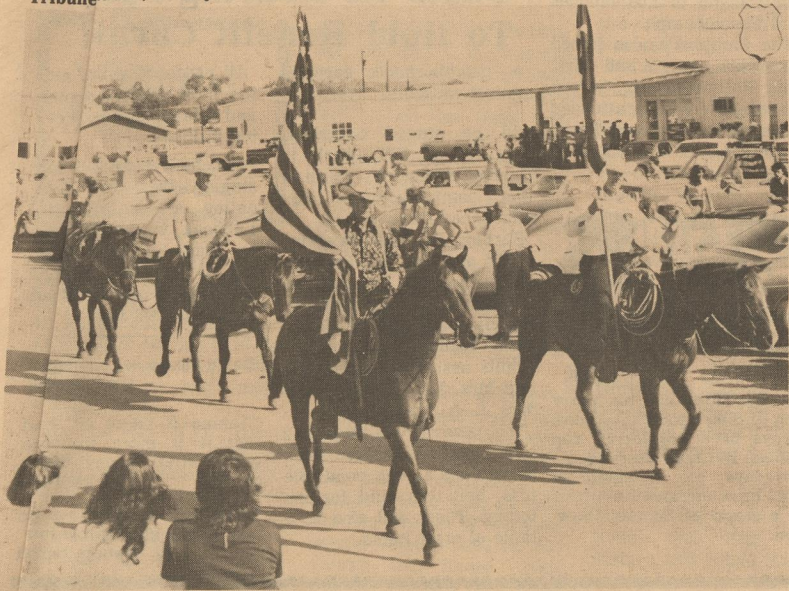

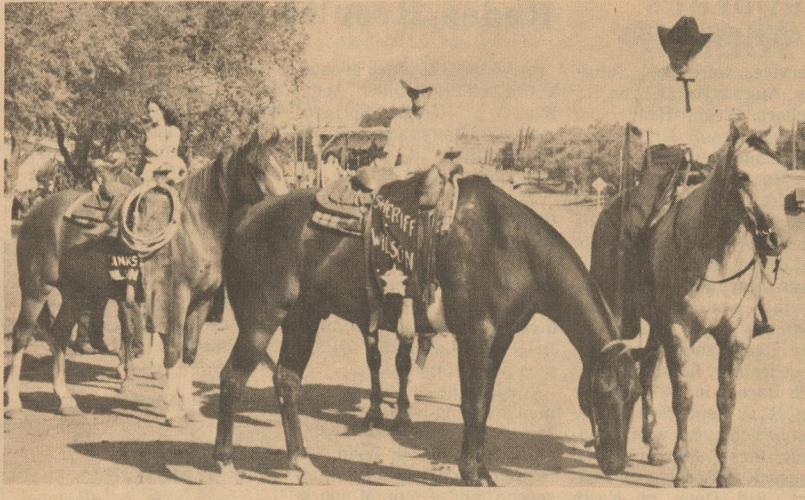
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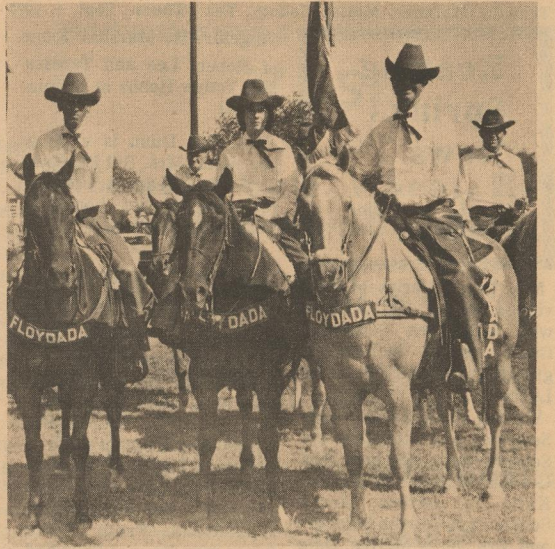

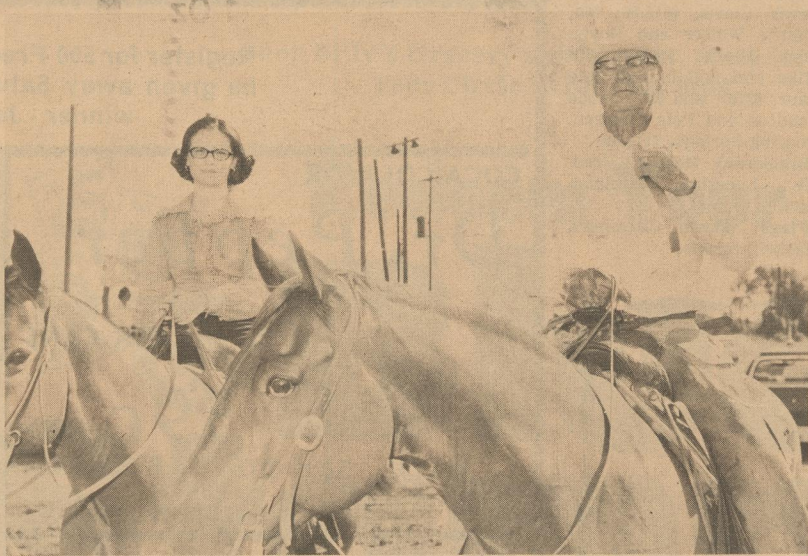

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

Parents or guardians may apply at any time during the year for free meals and milk or reduced-prices for their children. Forms are available from teachers or principal Arnold Parker.

After the application is reviewed, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible for the free or reduced lunches. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Supt. Charles N. Johnson, Drawer 310, phone 347-2676.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

School Days

Motley County School started the 1977-78 term Monday, with an enrollment of approximately 330 students. Final tabulations had not been made Tuesday, according to Principal Arnold Parker. However, he estimated that 120 were enrolled in high school, 60 in junior high, (7th and 8th grades) and 150 in elementary grades.

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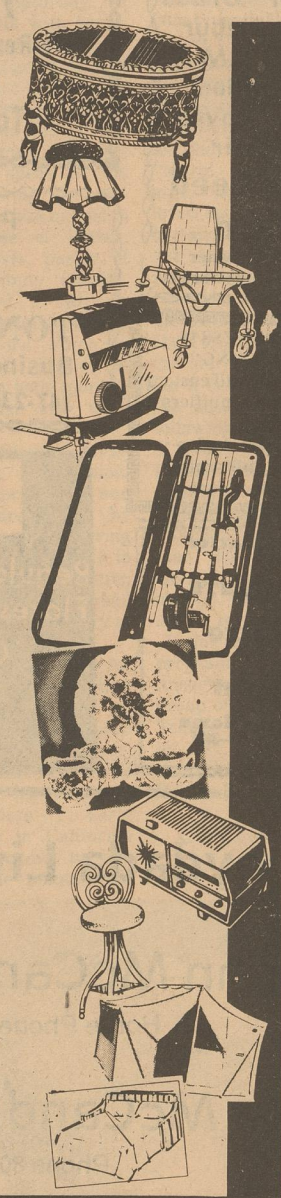

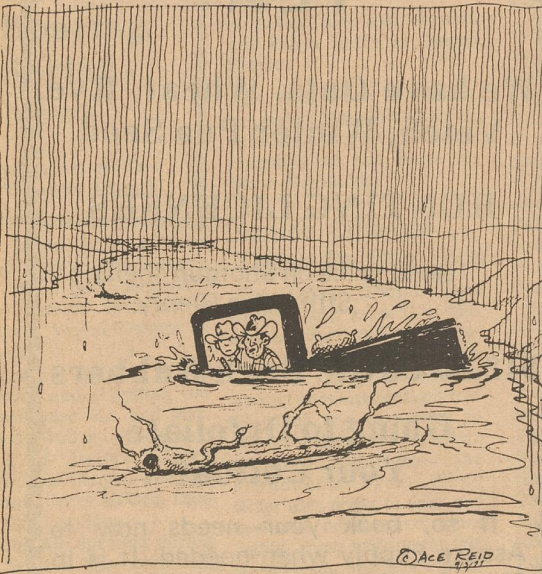

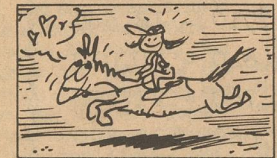
