Mr. Lancaster was born September 12, 1897 near Matador, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Lon Lancaster, pioneers who came here in 1891 from Erath County. He was a retired rancher and a member o. the Methodist Church. He was married in 1919 to the former Ollie Lawrence and they made their home here until 1973, when they moved to Hobbs. Much of the success of the completed project is due to the efforts of L. B. Campbell, serving as City Consultant to the water board, a spokesman for the city declared. "He gave not only his time, but made several trips to Austin at his own expense to negotiate with the Water Development Board, who had purchased the water bonds when they were voted in May of 1975."

The issuance of \$284,000 in bonds was voted for a new water system after Mayor Kirby Campbell received a letter from the State Health Department, warning that nitrate levels in the water system then in use were slightly over the acceptable mark and could be harmful to infants. In December of 1975, the city received a \$100,000 grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to be used with the \$284,000 in bonds. The grant had been approved in August, but the following months were required for legal procedures before clearance could be granted.

Bids were accepted May 5, 1977 at a meeting of the Matador Water District and a contract let for construction of the new water line. Of a total of five bids received, low bid was submitted by Potter Bowles Construction of Burkburnett in the amount of \$269,026.01 for the construction of line, pumps, pump station reservoir and other necessary facilities.

Earlier, the Water District had purchased 121 acres for the new well site, from Mancie King of Texarkana, Tex., in order to obtain the water rights.

A work order was issued in early August of last year to begin construction on the new water system and the first deliveryof pipe arrived August 30. Water Board members earlier hacanticipated that the new water system would be in operation by Sept. 1. However, construction was delayed when. engineers had to comply with further requirements by HUD, and a new deadline was set for December 1.

The work was completed December 28 and now awaits final approvement by the State Health Department, Water Development Board and engineering firm of Biggs-Matthews

Former Co. Clerk **Pat Sheridan Dies**

Pat Sheridan, who held the office of County Clerk of Motley County longer than any other official, died January 5 in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, where he had undergone major surgery. He was 77.

Funeral services were held Saturday, Jan. 7 in the United Methodist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Lloyd Hearn and Dick Marear, Minister of the Central Church of Christ in Amarillo, officiating. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery.

Seigler Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements. Edmond Patton Sheridan was born November 26, 1900 at Stephenville, and came to Motley County as a small child with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John H. Sheridan. He grew to manhood here and was married July 9, 1924 to the former Ethel Jackson, in Roaring Springs. They had made their home here since that time.

He was a barber for 25 years, and also engaged in farming and ranching. He ran for the office of County Clerk in 1946, was elected, and took office in January, 1947. He was the eighth clerk for the county following its organization in 1891, and the second to hold office for 20 years. He retired in 1975, after serving for 28 years. The county's first clerk, W. A.

Walton had served 20 years at the time of his death. Mr. Sheridan was a member of the Masonic Lodge, the I.O.O.F. Lodge, and Order of the Eastern Star. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Pat Sheridan Jr., of Lubbock; two sisters, Mrs. Ann Gaines and Miss Beulah Sheridan, both of Amarillo, and three grandchildren.

Govenor Briscoe Approves Criminal Justice Grant

AUSTIN -- Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved a crimina. justice grant for radio equipment in the South Plains Association of Governments region, including the Motley County Sheriff's Office.

The grant, for \$55,982, was among 83 approved statewide by Governor Dolph Briscoe from Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) funds under the Crime Control Act

"You expect us to pay a seven times greater share of the Local Fund Assignment with only half the income. And we think that is a very unfair arrangement," Campbell said. The bove mentioned inequity was corrected in Senate Bill No. 1 during the 1977 Special Session.

Cotton Report

Trading was again moderate this week as growers continue to accept bids on about 25 percent of their offerings. Prices were generally steady with mixed lots containing mostly 32 and shorter staple cotton selling for 43.00 to 44.00 cents per pound. Lots predominating in 33 and longer staples brought 46.00 to 47.00 cents. Growers continued to receive 62.00 to 67.00 dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

About 31,000 samples were classed at Memphis this week, bringing the season's total to 291,000. The office closed on January 6 last year with a total of 203,000 classed.

Light spotted grades made up 72 percent of the total, while white accounted for 22 percent and spotted grades made up six percent. The predominant grades were 32 with 40 percent and 42 with 28 percent. About two-thirds stapled 32 and one-third stapled 31. Micronaire readings were in the desirable range of 3.5 - 4.9 on 85 percent of the total tested. Nine percent miked 3.4 and lower and six percent miked 5.0 and higher. Average pressley for the week was 83,000 pounds per square inch.

On Thursday, Jan. 19, the morning session will cover field crop pest control and the test. The afternoon session covers fruit and vegetable pest control, and the test, plus predatory animal control and the test.

Friday sessions consist of farm storage pest control and the test in the morning and ornamental and turf pest control and the test, plus right-of-way pest control and the test in the afternoon. No meetings will be held the nights of the 18th and 19th.
