

### **Hightower Seeks** Re-Election

Vernon. Texas - Congressman Jack Hightower announced today that he has filed tor re-election to Congress. His statement follows:

Today I am announcing my candidacy for re-election to Congress from the 13th District.

"It has been a high honor to have served this area of Texas for the past three years. I will continue to do my best to represent each of you with diligence, determination and plain

"I will continue to communicate closely with citizens in all parts of this large district, to be constantly aware of your interests

"I will continue to communicate closely with other members of Congress, to try to make them aware that our interests, and the national interests, are one. Members of Congress from urban areas, who are the majority, must be made aware that agricultural and energy producers from our area and the consumers of our products from their areas are dependent upon one another. They must be made aware that the costs of producing the food we eat, the fiber for the clothes we wear and the energy to sustain all production must be paid. and must be shared.

Throughout the past three years much of my time and effort has been devoted to the House Agriculture Committee. No more serious problem faces our country than the plight of agriculture. The cost-price squeeze on farmers and ranchers threatens to grow steadily worse. The problem demands the full attention of the Congress and the Administration. A strong national economy is impossible without a strong agricultural economy.

"During the past three years I have spoken and voted for energy proposals that would increase our energy supplies and thereby protect the interests of producers and consumers. I have spoken and voted against programs that would increase federal involvement in energy production and that would promote energy conservation through the artificial means of taxation.

'I will continue to consider myself a steward of taxpayers' money, to support expenditures only when I believe there will be a positive return of the investment. I will continue to press for greater accountability by those agencies and departments that absorb the federal budget and to curtail or eliminate those who have outlived their usefulness.

"I appreciate the support you have given me. I will try to merit your continuing support in the future."

### District Judge Is Lions Club Speaker

A brief history of the 110th Judicial District was given Tuesday at regular meeting of Matador Lions Club in the United Methodist Church. Speaker was District Judge George Miller of Floydada, who was introduced by Motley County Judge and Lions club member. Forrest Campbell. Announcements by Boss Lion Emilio Aguilar concerned coming activities of the club. These include the annual Father-Son banquet in February, a magic show in March. and volleyball tournaments in March and April.

In the absence of Lion Tamer Bob Stanley, guests were welcomed by Lion Mike Hoyle. They were Joe Bowden, and Charles Duncan. Mr. Duncan joined the club and was presented with credentials by Lion J. B. Cooper.

Interesting data compiled by Judge Miller revealed that the 17th Texas Legislature in 1881 placed Motley County in the 34th Judicial District, together with 26 other counties Archer, Bailey, Baylor, Clay, Cochran, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens. Garza. Hale, Hardeman. Haskell. Hockley. Kent. King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Stonewall, Terry Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger, Yoakum and Young, In 1891, when Motley County was organized, Motley, Floyd and several other counties were placed in the 39th Judicial District and J. C. Cockrell was District Judge.

In 1903, the 23rd Legislature placed Motley County in the 50th District composed of Baylor. Knox. King. Dickens. Crosby, Lubbock, Hale, Floyd, Motley and Cottle counties. The 29th Legislature in 1905 placed Floyd, Castro. Swisher. Briscoe, Hale, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry, Hockley, Lamb and Bailey in the 64th Judicial District and left Motley and Dickens with other counties in the 50th.

They remained in the 50th District until the 41st Legislature in session from January 8, 1929 until March 14, 1929, enacted legislation creating the 110th Judicial District, bringing in Briscoe and Floyd counties from the 64th and Dickens and Motley counties from the 50th. The boundaries have remained unchanged since that time.

Judge Miller's interesting resume revealed that Kenneth Bain Sr. was the first District Judge of the 110th, and the first District Attorney was A. J. Folley, who later defeated Judge Bain for the office. In the runoff with Folley was H. A. C.

'The District Attorney who followed A. J. Folley was Alton B. Chapman. When Folley was appointed to the Appellate Court (He later served as a Justice on the Texas Supreme Court). Alton Chapman succeeded him and served as District Judge for nearly 20 years.

"John Hamilton of Matador succeeded Judge Chapman as District Attorney. Judge Chapman left the Bench in 1957 to become one of the outstanling Judges of the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo. He retired from that court after 12 years' service and currently resides near Gatesville, Texas." "Judge L. D. Ratliff of Spur succeeded Alton Chapman. serving as District Judge for more than 19 years from Jan. 1, 1957 until Jan. 24, 1976. He died suddenly while presiding over a jury trial in Motley County in an unusual Saturday Court Session." Miller recounted.

Miller was one of the attorneys in the case and five days later was appointed and qualified as District Judge. According to the Clerk's record, the Court convened in February, 1943, without a District Attorney.

In late 1943 or early 1944, Richard Stovall was appointed by the Governor as District Attorney and ran in 1944. He served as such until unseated by John Stapleton in Jan. 1947. Stapleton served until Dec. 31, 1969, when he resigned and retired, at which time, Miller succeeded him, serving as District Attorney until Jan. 29, 1976 when Randy Hollums

"We appreciate the cooperation we have had from the citizens of this District," Judge Miller declared. "District Court is held each third Monday. Response to jury duty has been very gratifying. At the last call, 39 out of 40 who were called, responded. We have had excellent cooperation from Motley County officials, and enjoy working with them."

The program followed a meal prepared and served by Lion Walter Jones, which was lauded by the members, led by Boss Lion Aguilar. The menu included braised beef, brown gravy. mashed potatoes, green beans and peach cobbler.

I plan to see each voter in the county personally, and will extend every effort to serve the people to the best of my abilities if elected.'

### **Cotton Report**

Moderate trading was reported again this week as growers accepted bids on about 25 to 30 percent of their offerings. Prices increased slightly with mixed lots containing mostly 32 and shorter staple cotton selling for 43.50 to 44.00 cents per pound. Lots predominating in 33 and longer staples brought 45.00 to 47.50 cents. Growers continued to receive 62.00 to 67.00 dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

About 35,000 samples were classed at Memphis this week. bringing the season's total to 326,000. This is the largest number of samples ever classed at the Memphis office. The previous record was 2/8,000, set in 1973.

Staple 32 was the predominant length with 71 per cent while staple 31 made up 24 per cent. Micronaire readings were in the desirable range of 3.5 - 4.9 on 82 per cent of the samples tested. Four per cent miked 5.0 and higher and 14 per cent miked 3.4 and lower. Average pressley was 85,000 pounds per

### Mail-a-Book Service

The West Texas Library System, Lubbock, announced today that a new catalog supplement to the free lending by mail service will be sent to eligible boxholders the week of January 23. The catalog, which contains 100 new titles, it to be mailed to residents of Motley, Glasscock, King, Borden and Loving counties.

Known as "Mail-a-Book", the service provides over 800 paperback books that are available for checkout by mail. Best-sellers, westerns, humor and children's books are a few of the many types of books offered through the Mail-a-Book

The Mail-a-Book service may be used by all persons residing in Motley, Borden, Glasscock, King and Loving counties. A library card is not required. Requests for books are mailed to the West Texas Library System, 1306 9th Street. Lubbock. Texas 79401, and the books are shipped back and forth between the library and the patron by mail. All costs of mailing are paid by the library.

According to Steve Cottrell. Coordinator of the West Texas Library System, the Mail-a-Book Service was funded by the U.S. Office of Education. Dept. of Health. Education and Welfare and the Texas State Library under the Library Systems Act of 1969.

Experiments by libraries in book check-out by mail have been tried for years, but it wasn't until the low-price paperback book was available in a good selection of popular titles, that the plan became feasible. Paperback book mail order libraries were successfully tried in the United States as early as 1968, and the idea has gained popularity ever since. Mr. Cottrell said that the nationwide surge of interest in the

mail order library concept was caused by several factors. The increased cost of books, of operating libraries and of buying and operating bookmobiles together with growing demands for library service by all segments of the population, including rural families -- all this has caused libraries to seek new and innovative ways to serve their patrons. Mail-a-Book Service fills the demands and does so at cost levels that can be met by libraries.

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


