Soil Surveys Are Available

The soil survey of Motley County prepared by the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station is now available to any person requesting a copy. The survey can be obtained at the Soil Conservation Service office, from any Upper Pease SWCD director or from County Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

The soil survey book includes detailed surveys for all land in the county plus a general soils map for the county. Some of the information that can be found in the survey are soil slopes, range site descriptions, engineering interpretations, capability of production for different crops, predicted yields for each soil, recreation uses and wildlife value. The soil survey book can prove to be valuable to not only farmers and ranchers but to anyone interested in Motley County history and resources. Mr. Seigler and his wife, the former Ann Henry of Paducah, have owned and operated the local mortuary and Matador Floral shop since June, 1963, which they purchased from Bill Seale when he moved to Snyder. Pat had been associated with the Eudy-Seale Funeral Home since September, 1961.

To Celebrate 45 Years In Business

In January of 1933, the late W. F. Jacobs purchased the present Matador Variety Store from Dick Speer of Spur. It was then operated as Speer's Variety Store.

Mr. Jacobs came to Matador in 1932 in order to close out Hanna Brothers Dry Goods Store, which operated in the present location of Bob Stanley Pharmacy.

When he came to Matador, Mr. Jacobs was told it would require approximately six months to close out the Hanna Brothers Store. He was to spend the remainder of his life, 28 years, here.

Mr. Jacobs had previously had experience in the dry goods business and combined the Variety Store with a line of apparel.

Following her husband's death in 1961, Mrs. Jacobs (Vivian), has continued to operate the business. Thus, the Matador Variety has continued operation in one location, under the same name and ownership for 45 years.

GPCP Funds Are Now Available

Motley County has received funds for carrying out the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) for the coming year. The GPCP is funded through and administered by the Soil Conservation Service, located in the Motley County Courthouse.

The GPCP provides assistance to farmers and ranchers by providing technical and financial assistance. Cost share assistance is available for carrying out conservation practices such as: grass seeding, waterways, terraces, diversions, irrigation pipelines, livestock water wells, ponds, livestock water pipelines, brush control, fences, treatment of critical areas and water storage facilities for livestock.

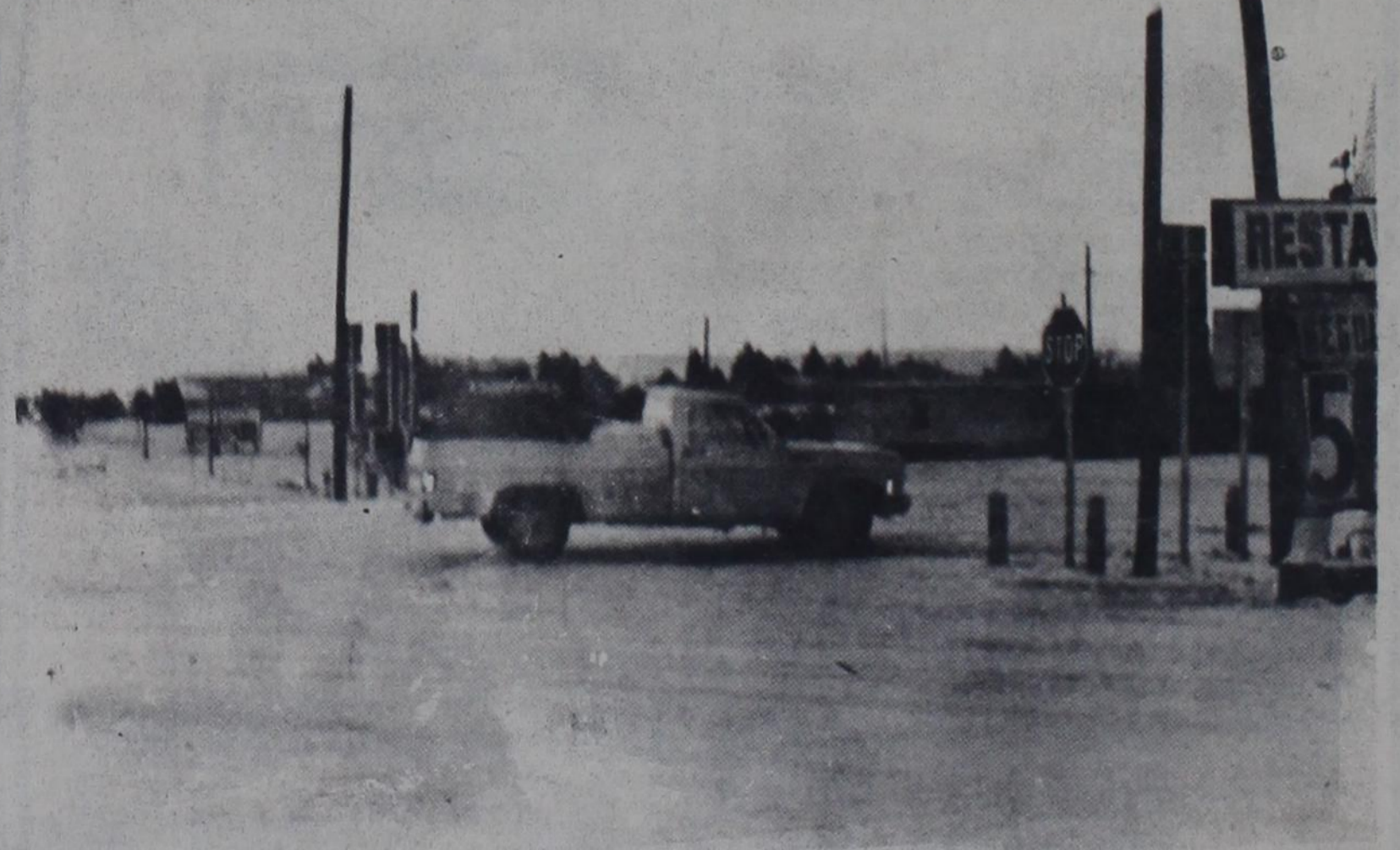

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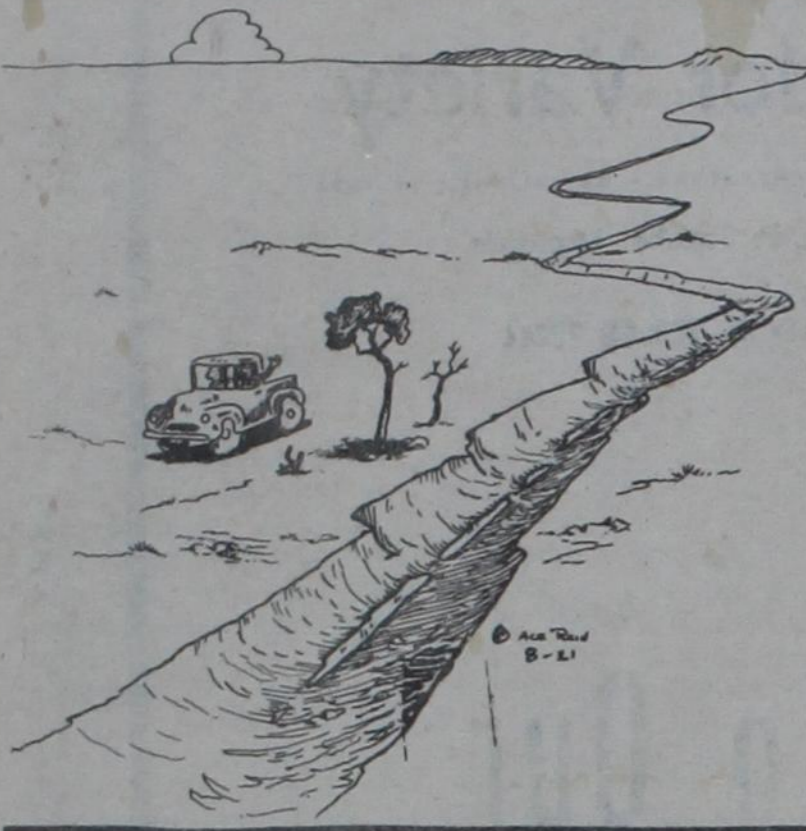
