The City Council, City of Matador met Tuesday night, February 14 at City Hall for their regular meeting.

In the meeting Algie Groves was appointed to fill the vacancy created by a resignation from Councilman Pat Seigler.

Bids were opened for a new City pickup, with the low bid being awarded to Matador Motor and Implement Company. During the meeting the minimum water rates were raised from \$5.25 to \$6.25, beginning with the March 15 billing.

A discussion was held about obtaining a new pump for the City reservoir station and Councilman Lewis Bostick was appointed to investigate prices.

After a discussion about a fire code the matter was tabled until further investigation. With no further business the meeting was adjourned.

Message Challenges Parents And Youth

Personal responsibility to self, to parents and to God was the text of the message Sunday night at the United Methodist Church. Occasion was the Union Service honoring the youth of the community, and speaker was Rev. Philip Hilton, pastor of the Assembly of God Church.

Rev. Hilton directed his remarks to both parents and children, reading from the scriptures, II Samuel, 18:28-33. He stressed parental responsibility as he declared, "We mould the future of our youth," and emphasized love between parents and their children.

"Parental love is strong," he said, "yet there are times when this isn't enough. It wasn't enough for David as he mourned the death of his son, Absalom. David sinned, but he paid for his sin. Sometimes parental fellowship is refused... Absalom rebelled and later paid with his life... sometimes it is too late to establish a relationship."

Rev. Hilton then charged the youth to be responsible for themselves. "When we fail, we must face the fact that we are responsible for our actions... we must make our own decisions, and not blame others... your relationship with God will determine what decisions you make in life."

Following the tradition of the first Union Youth service over 40 years ago when the late Paul Eubank was Scoutmaster, members of Matador Boy Scout Troop were in charge of the service.

Kyle Hardin served as Master of Ceremonies and John Douglas Russell was song leader. Invocation was by Wesley Stafford, and Scripture reading was by Craig Turner, from II Timothy, chapters 3 and 4. A poem, "God's Call" was read by Joe Don Warren and benediction was by Wade Vandiver.

Prélude was played by Nancy Cooper, and postlude by Johnny Hearn. Serving as ushers were Brent Campbell, Kody Hardin, Craig Turner and Joe Don Warren.

Pest Control." Mr. Pallmeyer listed many of the pest controls that are now banned as well as a number of others that are under investigation. He stated that many times an effective control is taken off the market by insufficient study. As a solution to this problem he said, "A thorough study should be made when a product is banned as when it is first tested for the market." Many pest controls are dangerous or ineffective because they are not used according to directions he stated, and urged that directions on the label be read and followed carefully.

this is claimed as a business expense the person can recover the cost of depreciable capital items. Depreciation must be taken the year it is eligible, therefore a good set of farm records is very helpful. Also, there is additional first year depreciation that may be claimed if it is to the individuals advantage, and the property has a useful business life of six or more years. The maximum first year additional depreciation 20 per cent of the cost, up to a maximum of \$20,000 total purchases on joint returns.

Even though the asset is not owned the full year, the first year depreciation may be taken in full, but for the regular depreciation, it must be figured on the number of months owned.

Regular depreciation may be claimed on the straight-line method (cost less salvage value divided by the number of years useful life), declining balance (higher deductions in the early years of the assets life) and sum of the years digits (higher deductions in the earlier years, but less in the later years of the life of the asset). I have copies of the 1978 Farmer's Tax Guide which explain these items in detail, which are available for the asking. While on the subject of income taxes, which are due March 1st for farmers who did not file a declaration on estimated taxes, and April 15th for all others, let me remind you not to forget investment credit, if you made a purchase that qualifies.

If you acquired new or used depreciable property such as machinery, equipment or breeding livestock for use in your farming or ranching operation, this may qualify you for this

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NOTICE OF INTENT TO ABANDON
AB-109 (Sub-No. 1F)
Quannah, Acme and Pacific Railway Company hereby gives notice that on or about March 10, 1978, it intends to file with the Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D. C. 20423, an application for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, permitting the abandonment of a line of railroad extending from Railroad Mile Post G-728, plus 10 poles plus 700 feet, near Acme, Texas, to Railroad Mile Post G-833.2 near Floydada, Texas, a distance of approximately 104 miles, in Hardeman, Cottle, Motley, and Floyd Counties, Texas. The line for which the abandonment application will be filed includes the stations of Paducah, Texas at Mile Post G-766.1 and Floydada, Texas at Mile Post G-833.2.

The reasons for the proposed abandonment are the public convenience and necessity no longer require the continued operation of the line and the continued operation of the line would be a burden upon applicant. The line of railroad has appeared on the System Diagram Map in Category 1 (§ 1121.20) (b) (1) since November 3, 1977. The interests of railroad employees will be protected by appropriate conditions as set forth in Chicago, B. & O. R. Co., Abandonment, 257 I.C.C. 700 and the applicable provisions of the Rail Passenger Service Act. Any interested person, in response to this notice, is entitled to take either of the following actions:

- File with the Interstate Commerce Commission written comments containing:
 - exact name and address of the commenting party;
 - brief statement of interest in the abandonment or discontinuance proceeding;
 - specific statement of position and summary of evidence with regard to any or all of the following:
 - intent to offer financial assistance;
 - environmental impact;
 - impact on rural and community development;
 - suitability of the properties for other public purposes; and
 - recommended provisions for protection of the interests of employees.

Written comments will be considered by the Commission in all proceedings in developing conditions and in determining whether to conduct an investigation on its own motion. In the event an investigation is conducted, then the commenting party may participate in the proceeding as its interests may appear.

2. File with the Interstate Commerce Commission a petition requesting that the application and proposed abandonment be investigated. The petition to investigate shall be in the form of a verified statement, and at minimum, contain:

- identification of petitioner including its name, address and business;
- statement of petitioner's interest in the abandonment or discontinuance proceeding; whether petitioner uses the involved service; and if it does not, information with respect to the group or public interest it represents;
- specific reason(s) for requesting the institution of an investigation, including information with respect to petitioner's reliance on the involved service, with allegations of fact supported by an affidavit of personal knowledge of the facts;
- any rebuttal of information or material submitted by applicant; and
- request for oral hearing and reasons therefor if desired.

Upon receipt of a petition to investigate, the Commission shall determine the extent of the investigation to be instituted. Those parties filing petitions to investigate should be prepared to participate actively in either oral hearings or via the submission of additional material in the form of verified statements. Parties seeking information concerning the filing of petitions should refer to 49 CFR 1121.36. Petitions to investigate and written comments should indicate the proceeding designation No. AB-109 (Sub-No. 1F) and should be filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D. C. 20423 no later than April 14, 1978. Interested persons may file either a written comment or a petition to investigate with the Commission to become a party to this abandonment proceeding. A copy of each petition to investigate or written comment shall be served upon the representative of the applicant, D. E. Engle, Vice-President-General Counsel, St. Louis-San Francisco Railway Company, 906 Olive Street - Suite 1023, St. Louis, Missouri 63101. Replies to comments or petitions, the latter shall be in the form of a verified statement, shall be filed with the Commission no later than April 24, 1978 and shall be served on all commenting parties and petitioners. 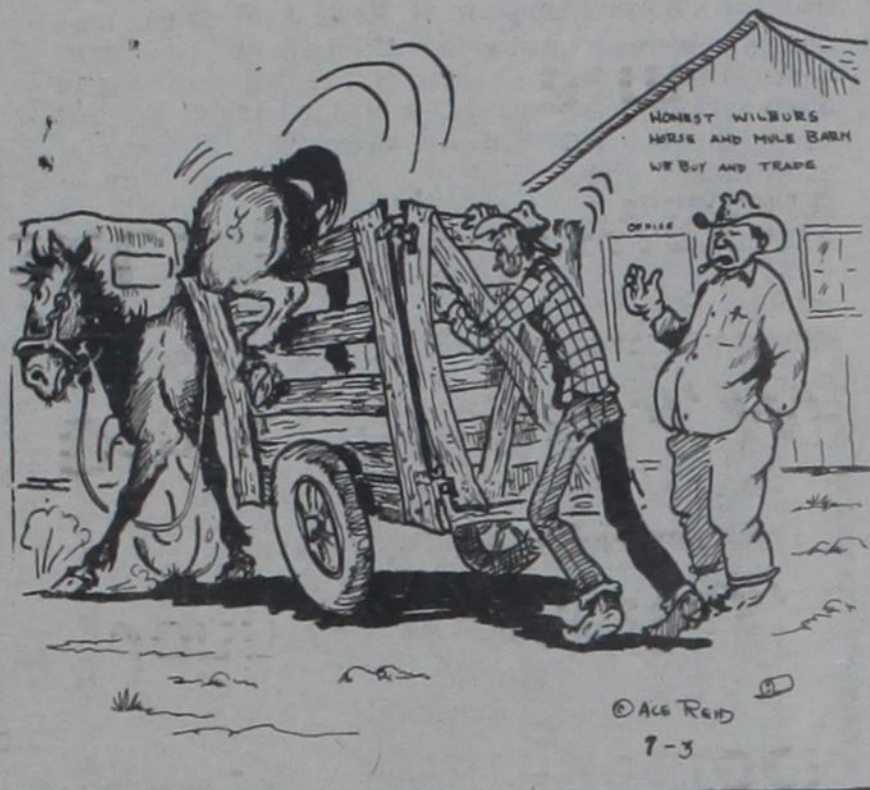
