The winners are now qualified for the state contests which will be held in connection with the 4-H Roundup at College Station on June 7-9, County Agent Bill Pallmeyer announced.

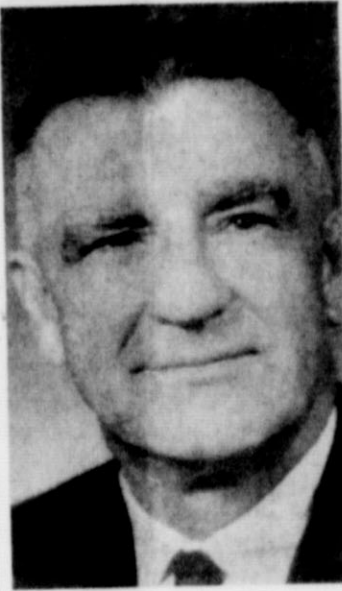

These will be joined in the state contest by an alternate for the Grass Judging team, and the Livestock Judging team that placed first in the District Contest held in February. Members are Dan Brandon and Eddy Osborn, Roaring Springs, and Larry Bostick, Matador.

An alternate will be selected for this team also, making the county total for the state contest, 17 members in eight contests.

Junior Stock Show Is Slated Saturday

Approximately 20 beef animals, and 35 swine are scheduled for exhibition here Saturday at the 26th Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show. The exhibition will be held at the Matador High School FFA building, by FFA and 4-H members.

Roy McClung, Baylor County Agent from Seymour, will start judging at 1:00 p.m. Scales will be available at the show barn, and all entries must be in place by 11:00 a.m.

All market animals (steers, market hogs) must be weighed and ear tagged to be eligible for the auction sale which will start immediately after the selection of the Grand Champion Steer.

To be eligible for the auction sale, which will be by the dollar premium rather than cents per lb., the animal must place 1st through 5th in the light, medium or heavy steer classes, or 1st through 1st through the light (190-210), medium (211-230) or heavy (231-250) market hog classes (either barrows or gilts). Steer class weights are 700-800, 801-900, and 901 and up.

Classes are also provided for heifers 9 to 18 months of age of any beef breed or mixture that are shown at halter, open gilts, bred gilts and sows. Minimum weight in the breeding hog classes is 150 lbs.

Rule sheets have been given to all those with animals for exhibition, and additional sheets will be available at the show. Prize list will be the same as in 1965.

Showmanship prizes will be given in the beef and swine divisions by the Rolling Plains Production Credit Assn., with owner-exhibitors eligible.

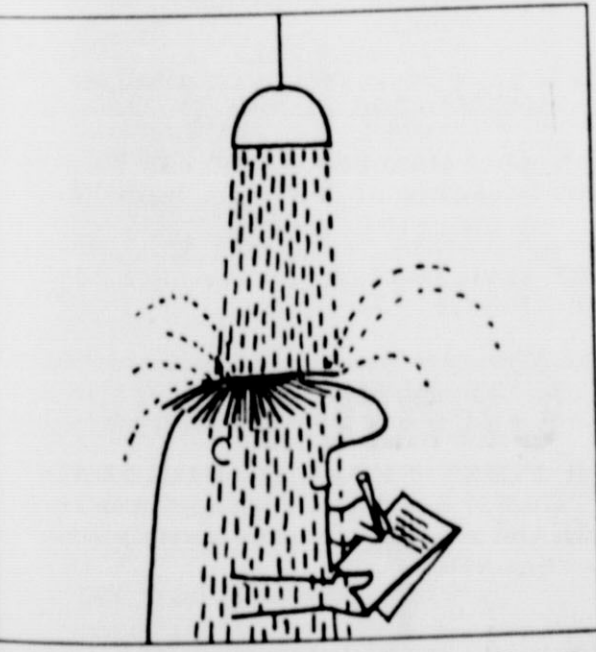
