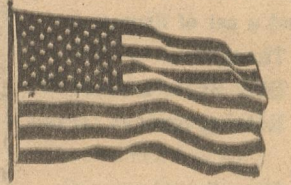

## A Second Glance

I ran across this article in an issue of "American Agriculture News". It is titled "What happened to American Agriculture?" by Micki Nellis.

What has happened to American Agriculture?

AP reports that the farm strike has lost momentum, that wheat has overgrown the strike signs.

AP says the leaders are at odds with each other, and quotes Gene Schroder and Bud Bitner as saying things that seem contradictory.

The Denver Post copyrights a story saying that emerging political conservatism (in other words, the economic talks and Trilateral Commission talks) in American Agriculture is disturbing.

At the national meeting in St. Louis, the United Farm Press reporter runs downstairs before the meeting is over and calls in a press release to UPI (written by AAM) in hopes that United Farm Press will get a byline on the story.

Funted Farm Press discovers a difference of opinion among AAM supporters and moves in with a monthly giveaway publication purporting to be the voice of American Agriculture, and quoting some as saying we don't need parity prices and attacking the Nolan Bill at a time when American Agriculture is actively lobbying for the Nolan Bill in Washington. National companies decide to back this publication by advertising in it. (Olin company's Ammo Phos fertilizer. Olin's fertilizer profits are down, we learn from another story.)

Public Relations companies think American Agriculture can afford a sophisticated, expensive PR campaign.

Engineering firms want to do business with AAM to manufacture gasohol.

Wire services burn with reports that American Agriculture is joining labor.

Wire services burn with reports that the AAM-AFL-CIO coalition is off.

The USDA issues a report that production is down, but American Agriculture can't take the credit.

Auto manufacturers caution the public that it might cost them \$35 to \$75 to modify their carburetors to burn gasohol, all the while readying plans to have a manufacturing plant ready when and if gasohol breaks.

The USDA issues press releases saying gasohol will never go, and says besides, the farmer couldn't grow enough crops to fuel it.

A hopper car shortage materializes, and try as they may, nobody can seem to get grain transported. Meanwhile prices stay down and foreign markets wither.

Bob Bergland assures the world that Russia will have enough grain this year, and there is no world demand for a lot of US grain.

Local sheriffs come out and tell American Agriculture that if we do this or that, they will call out the National Guard.

Spies infiltrate meetings and release slanted reports of that American Agriculture is up to, including verbatim remarks made by leaders as jokes, quoted out of context.

Farm Bureau attacks American Agriculture, labor, and the consumers, blaming them for all the nation's economic woes.

The USDA harps on sharply rising food prices. Barry Bosworth and Robert Strauss vow to keep the lid on.

President Carter starts a campaign to get the American Cattleman to rebuild his herd, only weeks after opening up beef imports.

USDA reassures farmers that prices are higher than last fall, and tells them they are doing fine.

Oil companies start a PR blitz that they can make alcohol cheaper out of coal than grain. (They own the coal mines.; the government vows to "study" gasohol, apparently forgetting they made it during the war.)

AAM leaders' remarks fly over the wires, many times before internal communication is complete, leaving the impression that information is being withheld. The leaders' every move is scrutinized, analyzed, speculated upon, much as a Hollywood columnist speculates on the love life of the stars.

When you wear your strike cap, people stand away and eye you in silence. You don't know if it is disgust, disbelief, or awe.

Questions are raised about where all the money goes, and AAM is criticised for spending their money lobbying.

A sordid picture is painted of American Agriculture. It has been falling apart or dead for several months, according to the major press. Yet, if it is dead, why do they have to keep reassuring themselves that it is dead?

What has happened to American Agriculture?

Simply this. American Agriculture has become famous.

American Agriculture is having an impact. American Agriculture is hurting those who have been hurting American Agriculture.

Miss Swim reported VIP treatment by the Hotel, receiving

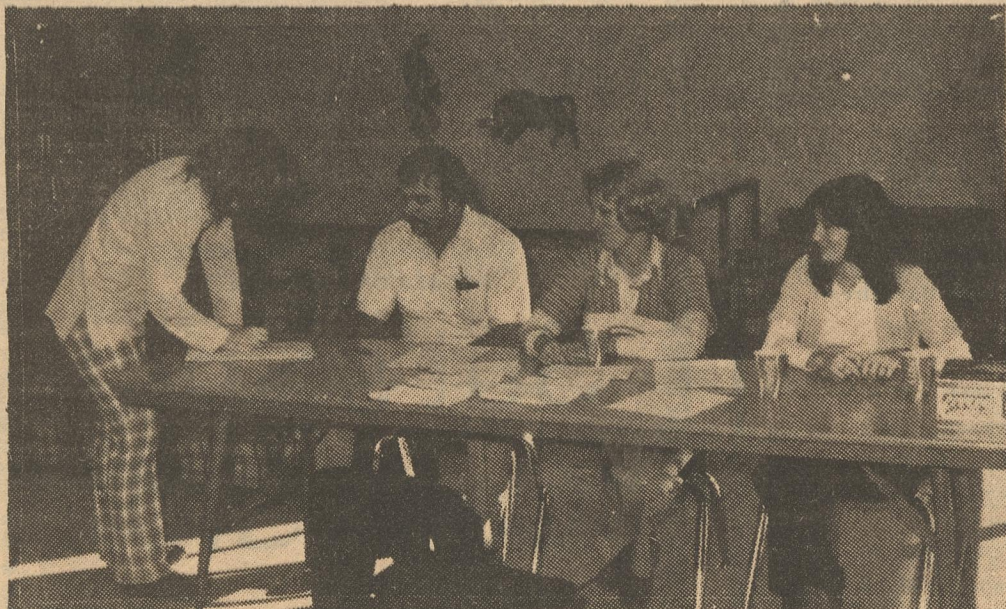
baskets of fruit, orchids, and an interview with the hotel manager.

## Contract Awarded To Health Agency

The office of Representative George Mahon notified Land D. Wall, President of MBFA Foundation, the H.E.W. has awarded a contract in the amount of \$90,000 for Home Health expansion in the Seymour and Abilene Provider areas.

The counties involved in the Seymour Provider and Young, Dickens, Motley, Haskell and Throckmorton. The three counties in the Abilene Provider are Coke, Runnels and Callahan.

The grant will provide RN's and LVN's to explain home health services to the public and to referral professionals such as physicians, ministers and agency staff serving the elderly and disabled. They will also work out procedures and agreements with local hospitals for an orderly transfer of patients to and from home settings. The grant will also expand the type of health services to be offered in these provider areas and will open up unserved and underserved areas to home health services.

## Public Hearing Set For December 12

The South Plains Health Systems, Inc. directors met Thursday night at the George Mahon Library in Lubbock and approved plans that would outline agency's functions and basic goals for 1979. A public hearing to review this area's Health Systems Plan and Annual Implementation Plan will be held Tuesday, December 12, 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Plainview High School auditorium, 1501 Quincy in Plainview. Gordon Russell, Administrator of Hale Center Hospital and Secretary of SOHS executive board, will be the Coordinator. Ronald D. Warner, Chief Executive Officer, will represent the SPSH staff.

These plans will influence significantly the direction and shape of our rural health care system over the years, stated Mrs. H. R. Jameson, Motley County SOHS representative. Your public comments expressing dissatisfaction with health guidelines and those you want implemented or drafted will be appreciated and submitted to the South Plains Health Systems board and State Legislature.

In other business, Ron Warner gave a report on Rural Health Care Services hearing in El Paso. Ella Herriage, R.N., and chairperson of Nursing Practice Committee at Health Science Center Hospital in Lubbock, told the board that in order for rural patients in Texas to receive full benefits there would have to be a change in state law concerning the supervision of nurses and doctor's assistants by Texas physicians. Under present Texas laws, physician assistants and nurses may function only under the direct over-the-shoulder supervision of a physician due to very restrictive state laws governing the practice of medicine. Because of the limitations the Rural Health Clinic Service Act largely has not been realized in Texas. There is a great need for the clinics with a total of 173 counties classified as "fully medically under-served areas." Citizens in these areas need to contact their state representatives before the Senate group makes its recommendations to the 1979 Legislature.

## Arsenic Acid May Be Banned

Cotton farmers in Motley County are urged to respond immediately to a survey regarding the use of arsenic acid as a harvest-aid chemical, points out Bill Pallmeyer, Motley County Agent.

The survey is being conducted by the manufacturer of arsenic acid to obtain opinions from farmers regarding the benefits of the chemical for continued profitable cotton production. The basis for the

survey comes from an Oct. 18 decision by EPA to place all uses of inorganic arsenicals including arsenic acid on the RPAR list. This does not mean automatic removal of arsenic acid from the market, but EPA will now demand more evidence that benefits of this compound outweigh risks before further registration is permitted. An assessment team has until Dec. 11 to respond with benefit comments concern-

ing the value of arsenic acid to the cotton industry.

The EPA decision to require further evaluation of the benefits vs. risks of arsenic acid as a cotton desiccant could have far-reaching effects on cotton producers, as more than 2 million acres of cotton in the Southwest are treated annually with arsenic acid, and it is the leading desiccant used in Motley County. The chemical dries the leaves for stripper harvest, allowing for earlier harvest.

If arsenic acid is banned, what can be sued in its place? How would this affect operations and expenses. Producers are requested to express their opinions, as those who use this material are the ones who will be affected.

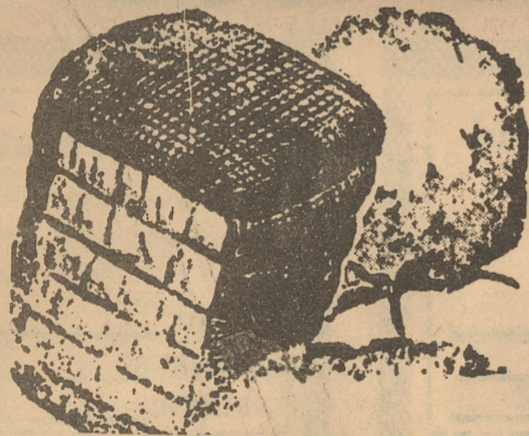

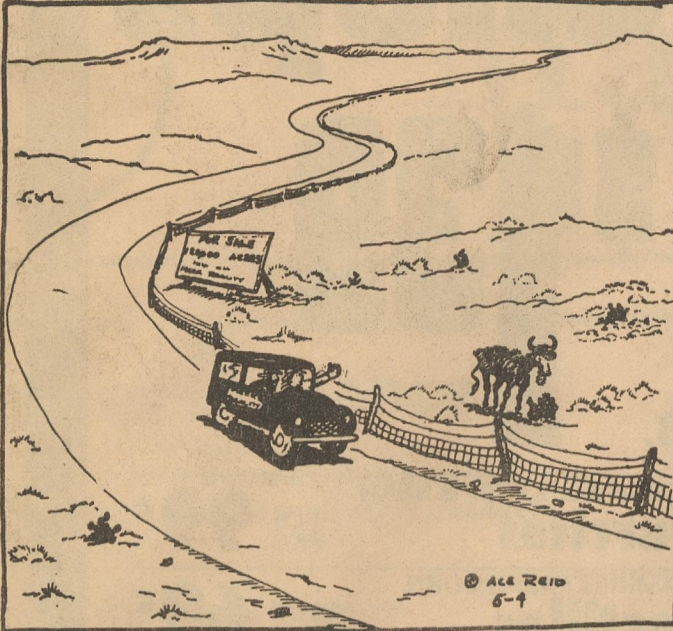
