the old apartment buildings, 8) Purchase and use of computer equipment for finan-cial records and water billings, and 9) The use of dumpsters maintained by the City instead of burning barrels main-tained by each resident. Most importantly, these items were accomplished without incurring any debt, and in fact, increasing cash reserves over 100%."





The El Progresso Club met April 27, 1990 in the home of Mrs. Harold (Grace) Campbell where Springtime was show-ing it's colors to all who attended. She prepared the audience by playing an excerpt of a tape of beauti-ful religious music, then, after her decla-ration of what Christian music and poetry is, one of George Beverly Shea's to set the mood of the afternoon. Mrs. Dickson told of a meeting in Portsmouth, VA in 1957 of the Ministerial Association of the Methodist Church which began its meet-eng with a Hymr Festival. The director, Ernest K. Emunian, who wrote a book entitled "Forty True Stories of Famous Gospel Songs" chose the topic for the festival "Hynns of All Churches." During a retreat at Mon-treat a famous evangelist spoke on the forty-fifth Psalm believing it a prophetic one which speaks of the relationship of Christ, the bridegoom, to His bride, the Church. The pianist, for the conference, a Britisher, Henry Barraclough, while driv-ing with friends one evening during the meeting thought about the four short phrases of a refrain that were taking shape phrases of a refrain that were taking shape in his mind. 



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
