Clay Team Wins Two World Championship Titles

Throng of well-wishers hit the arena floor as Wayde Clay and her mare, Jackie Little Star, were pronounced winners of the World Champion Amateur Trail Horse Class of the American Quarterhorse Show.

The months, even years, of work, practice, trailering, and competing in numerous horse shows all over Texas culminated in that exciting moment when the awards ceremony was delayed by the deluge of friends of family. Four best friends who were also competing circled Wayde with hugs from horseback. But perhaps most excited of all was Debbie Clay Arrington who had accompanied her mother to the finals.

Wayde, the friendly Flomot native, exhibited her sleek sorrel during the World Championship Quarter Horse Show competition held at the Oklahoma State Fairgrounds on November 10-18. In this their second year of world class competition, Wayde brought home the trophy and buckles for the coveted top notch over thirty-six other entries by scoring 360 points, almost 100 above the nearest competitor.

With the five scoring judges finding no fault in their performance, horse and rider executed outstandingly in the closely-packed obstacle course which

included: opening and closing a gate; a box in which the horse must side-step with both front feet, then with front and back feet, then make a 360 degree turn; a zig-zag log course which the horse had to step out with a difficult left lead; an elevated bridge; and backing through an "L" formed by the bridge and bushes.

The rider gives the horse cues by using reins, leg pressure, and hand signals, and must be very careful in giving the horse

the correct information to avoid knocking over the hair-trigger stacks of logs. "My horse was in the best shape ever, both mental and physical," Wayde explained at home near Flomot. "It just all came together at the right time." As we talked, Jackie Little Star, a beautiful quarter horse that has the athletic looks of a thoroughbred racing mare, kicked up her heels in the pasture, relishing the freedom in the fall sunshine.

The invitational meet featured competition for horses and exhibitors which have earned points at Quarter Horse Shows over a year's time, including thirty-four World Championships in the amateur division. The amateur division is limited to those who do not show, train or judge horses, or instruct for pay. Over 2,000 entries competed for 81 events in the elite equestrian affair.

During the second week of competition, Susan Brunner of Odessa, a friend who had worked with the mare and helped "train" Wayde as well as the horse, rode Jackie Little Star to the winner's circle again for the world title in the Senior Trainer Division.

Stressing the comradere and wonderful friendships that develop because of their common interest in horses and showing, Wayde emphasized, it's not the winning, you know, it's the friends you pick up along the way. "But anyone who knows Wayde can tell you, she earned those friends, just as she and her horse earned two world class American Quarter Horse titles, by loyalty, hard work, perseverance, and a positive, giving attitude.

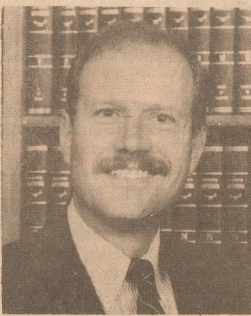

First Thanksgiving in Texas?

Texas is now claiming the first Thanksgiving...in the Panhandle!

According to the 1989-90 Texas Almanac, the first feast of Thanksgiving was celebrated by the expedition of Francisco Vasquez de Coronado in Palo Duro Canyon in May 1541.

In 1959 the Texas Society of Daughters of American Colonists placed a marker, now stolen, just outside of Canyon. The celebration is still held in Texas, but supposedly it is held on one of the forks of the Brazos River instead of the Prairie Dog Fork on the Red.

Still, it doesn't seem likely citizens will give up their turkey and dressing with its New England overtones for grapes, pecans, and frioles.

But, wait. That's not all. Texans over in El Paso also claim the "first" Thanksgiving.

Juan de Onate and his expedition of 500 soldiers, colonist, wives and children set out on a 50 day march through the Chihuahuan Desert. Running out of food

and water, man and animals went mad with thirst. Reaching the Rio Grande was their salvation.

After a ten day rest, they celebrated a day of "thanksgiving" on April 30, 1598. Captain Billagra wrote, "We built a great bonfire and roasted the meat and fish, and then all sat down to a repast the like of which we had never enjoyed before...We were happy our trials were over..."

After the feast, the expedition continued up the Rio Grande and eventually settled near Santa Fe, the oldest European city in what would become the United States, far outdating either Jamestown or Plymouth.

The claims do not stop there. As well as Texas with its two assertions, Connecticut, Florida, Maine, and Virginia claim the "first" thanksgiving celebration or religious observance.

Nothing is certain any more, if even our traditional Thanksgiving Day is challenged. Besides who wants to cook turkey and eat cranberries on Bob Wills' Day in the spring!

Keltz duo's ornaments to be displayed at Governor's Mansion

The work of artists June Keltz and Terry Keltz, a mother and son duo with Motley County roots, will hang on the Governor's Mansion tree this Christmas in Austin. By invitation of Mrs. Bill Clements, First Lady of Texas, to County Historical Commissions, each of Texas 254 counties may be represented on the tree.

On a four inch plastic Christmas ball, Mrs. Keltz painted scenes of Motley County, including a lone horseman traversing the caprock country, while Terry chose to represent neighboring Floyd County, now his home, with agricultural scenes featuring primary crops grown there.

Mrs. Keltz is owner of The Windmill, a frame and gift shop featuring art and hand crafts. Though she enjoys painting cowboys, cattle, and horses, June is making a name for herself with unusual Southwest baskets with hand painted, laquered scenes.

Her first formal instructor was Lonnie Mason. She attended Texas Tech's School of Art in Taos, New Mexico. Other teachers were Glenna Goodacre, Ben Konis,

Connie Martin, Mac Carow, Jan Herring, Mike McCollum and Dr. Cabalero of West Texas State. She has taught art in public school for 5 years and gave private lessons to children for 25 years.

Her work has been exhibited in banks, hospitals, galleries and Roy Roger's Museum in Apple Valley, CA.

As administrator of the Lockney Hospital and part-time artist, Terry Keltz has drawn on his home territory in his paintings and the domain of the Southwest Indian for many of his sensitive renderings.

He has a B.S. and Master's degree from Wayland Baptist University with a Minor in Art.

Many private collectors collect Terry's artwork and he has had many paintings exhibited in banks, hospitals and galleries.

A special reception, which the Keltzs hope to attend together, will be held at the Governor's Mansion in December for the artists and county chairmen to see the Mansion decorated for Christmas. Each special and unique ornament will be hanging on the tree, a labor of love from the grassroots of Texas.

Thursday the bus went to Plainview and 5 people went. Everybody seemed to have a good time.

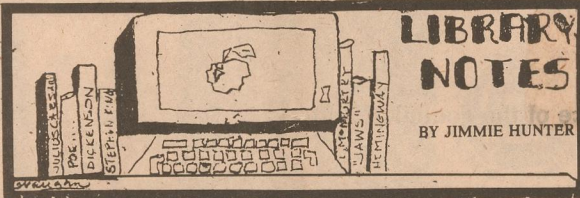

Dennis prefaced his readings with remarks giving tribute to Carla Jones of the Motley County Tribune for her contribution to Motley County by her continuous input into the paper, making it something we can all be proud of. The poetry Dennis read was a combination of contemporary poetry and some he had written. She had several letters written by Mr. Collinson to Mr. Campbell relating how, in 1936 when the letter was written, his trip to this area driving in a Model T Ford going past the "F" ranch seeking the meteor he had seen fall while riding the range many years before. He was certain it had fallen east of the East Quitaque Peak.

Mr. Collinson was born in Yorkshire, England in 1855 and began his American Odyssey in September 1872 when he went to work for Will Noonan on his ranch near Castorville, Texas. Collinson was a tall, heavy-set man who always wore his belt below the curve of his stomach, standing erect with his figure commanding attention. He wore a big white hat at a cocky angle, this giving him additional height. His flowing white mustache was fifteen inches from top to tip. Frank Collinson is portrayed in paintings of Harold D. Bugbee, artist of Clarendon, Texas. Mr. Bugbee says Frank Collinson, "He taught me much that I know about the Old West. He died in 1943, and I still miss him. I like to think that I started him in the writing game when he was seventy-nine years of age."

Mrs. Campbell related many of Frank Collinson's stories as written in his de-

lightful book. She told of "Chick", a negro on the Noonan ranch, who Collinson befriended, the trip Collinson made to Texas from England on the ship hauling salt to Galveston. He took the train from Galveston for Houston, then to Seguin and San Antonio where he stayed at the Menger Hotel.

The first big cattle drive was a great adventure - 98% work! Here he witnessed his first stampede and observed, too, the Sioux Indians noting what a handsome people they were and also, noticing there were many more women in the camp

than men. After the cattle drive he joined the buffalo hunters, meeting Jim White at Ft Griffin. Mr. White, whose real name was Wilson, was hiding from the law as he had killed several men in New Mexico. Collinson asked to go with White and his partner, Russell, on a buffalo hunt offering to go as skinner. They followed the Mackenzie Trail toward the Plains country.

Mr. Collinson relates many stories of his experiences in the area of Motley, Dickens, Crosby, Briscoe and other counties of the area. He tells of being in Motley for the "last kill, being at two buffalo camps, one, Los Lingos and the other the Quitaque. After the winter of 1877-78 the Mexicans stopped coming into this area. The hide-hunters were the

reasons the buffaloes were killed out. He relates coming upon Hank Smith's rock house, the Jingle-bob cattle and Matador Land and Cattle Company, the lush grass and plentiful water of Motley County. He lived in a dugout in Roaring Springs in 1879.

For the Inspirational Thought, Mrs. Hamilton read a poem about the Matador Cowboys written by Linda McKleskey, a niece of Mrs. Joe Campbell.

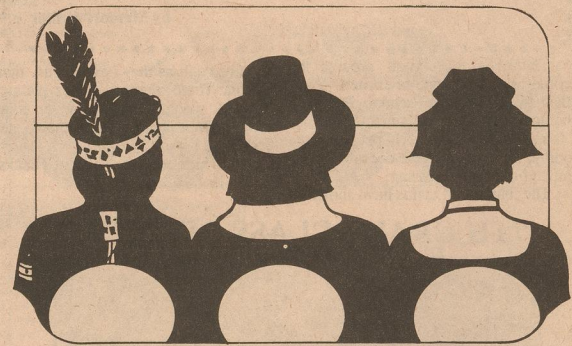

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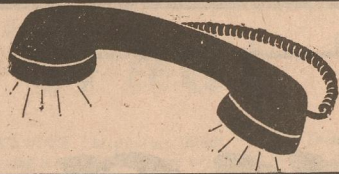

WTU Puts Lower Winter Rates Into Effect

Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will see approximately a 10 percent drop in their rates beginning this month (November). The reduction is the result of using the lower winter rates which will be in effect for six months. Using higher summer and lower winter rates is part of the States' plan to encourage energy conservation during the summer when air conditioning creates the peak demand on electricity use.

According to WTU Local Manager, Jesse Turner, "a residential customer using 478 kilowatt hours (KWH) of electricity a month, the average for November 1988, will see his bill go from \$45.29 to \$40.88." Other customer groups will see similar reductions, Turner said.

Since mild fall weather has reduced many customers' cooling and heating use, the actual decrease in the electric bill from September, when average use was 959 KWHs, to November will probably be around 51.5 percent. That decrease includes the combined impact of lower winter rates and lower use resulting from mild weather. The actual size of a customer's bill is determined by their use.

While the higher summer rates are intended to encourage conservation, lower winter rates benefit the customer two ways Turner said. First is lower cost to heat homes and businesses. Second, winter usage makes more efficient use of WTU's facilities and helps spread the costs more evenly throughout the year.

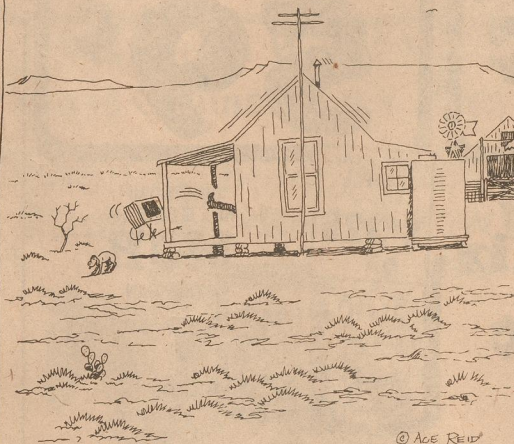
