Also, the same things that might be a victim of occult-related child abuse are basically the same as in any other abuse
situation, with some additions. In some situation, with some additions. In some
cases, the abusers have dressed up as policemen, clowns, Mr. Rogers, or even Ronald McDonald. This greatly confused the children and terrified them even more
than usual, since these represented the
basic authority figures that their parents basic authority figures that their parents
had taught them to rely on. This extra had taught them to rely on. This extra

chill is in the air, and it's time Americans to get outside and enjoy the Abel weather. Soon the colors of autumn will decorate the streets as the trees begin to shed their leaves. There couldn't be better time to start a walking program.
Walking has become an increasingly popular way to exercise - and for good reason. It can help you improve the eff iciency of your heart and lungs, relieve stress, promote weight loss and enhance
muscle tone, according to Cyndi Gaul muscle one, according to Cyndi Gaul
director of The Centre for Cardiac Rena bilitation and fitness at Methodist Hospi tall, here are some tips for starting a good walking program:
DEFINE YOUR
DEFINE YOUR GOALS: Getting
started is the hardest part of any exercise started is the hardest part of any exercise
program. Start with a firm commitment. Then set realistic goals and stick with them. BUY GOOD SHOES: essential to walking. Major shoe shoes are essential to walking.Major shoe compa-
nies now offer shoes specifically designed mes now offer shoes specifically designed
for walking. A good shoe will have substantial arch support, a wide "toe box", a firm heel, a well-cushioned heel and midsole and a durable outersole with good traction.
DRESS RIGHT: Let the weather dic tate your attire. On a warm day, wear light-weight, loose-fitting clothing made of fabrics that breathe. When it's cool and
windy, a windbreaker can protect you

## cold weather, wear layers of clothing.

 This provides added insulation, and you can shed layers if you get too warm. protect your head, ears and hands. Socks your feet dry and prevent blisters. If you walk at night along a road, walk facing raffic and wear light-colored clothing rimmed with reflective fabric or tape. STRETCH BEFORE AND AFTER: A safe, effective workout consists of five basic steps: warm-up, flexibility exer-sises, main activity, cool-down and postexercise flexibility stretches. Stench for at east five minutes prior to your workout. After each workout, cool down by walking slowly. Then complete your workout with five more minutes of stretching.
START SLOWLY: Begin by walking 15 to 20 minutes at a comfortable pace. You should be able to carry on a normal conversation while walking. Remember hat the frequency of walking is more important than the pace.

OTHER TIPS: Drink plenty of water, exercise at the same time each day so that actor regularly to ensure maximum benefit from your walking program.

Social Security Tips
For Motley County

Self－employed farmers have been
earning social security credits since 1955 ． earning social security credits since 1955 ．
Under the law，a farm operator is a person who farms for profit，whe ther an owner－ operator，partner，renter，or share farmer．
Although all members of a farm fam－ Although all members of a farm fam－
ily may contribute to the operation of the farm，the person principally responsible
for the farm operation is considered to be for the farmoperation is considered to be
self－employed，and all income realized from the operation of the farm is credited to that person．In some cases，however，
where members of a family，operate the where members of a family operate the
farm as a partnership，all can earn social farm as a partnership，all can earn social
security credits based on the farm in－ security credits based on the farm in－
come．The actual arrangement for social security purposes is determined by the facts in each case．
Farmers with net earnings of at least $\$ 400$ a year receive social security credit
for all net earnings up to $\$ 48,000$ for 1989；this is the maximum amount of which social seucity taxes are paid．The tax rate for self－employed persons for
1989 is 15.02 percent a percent credit 1989 is 15.02 percent；a percent credit
makes the effective tax rate 13.02 per－ makes the effective tax rate 13.02 per－
cent．If a farmer eams wages from a iob in
addition to self－employment income，the
wages are considered first in determining wages are considered first in determining
payment of social security taxes．For payment of social security taxes．For
example，if heor she has wages of $\$ 48,000$ or more，there would be no tax payable on earnings from self－employemnt．How－ ever，if the total wages are less than the
