Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by Drought, January 1, 1989, through August 31, 1989, and continuing and Excessive rainfall and flooding, high winds and hail, April 29 through May 17, and May 29 through June 15, 1989 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Spur, FmHA County Supervisor Larry J. Clements said today.

Motley County is one of 31 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought and excessive rainfall and flooding, high winds and hail.

Clements said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

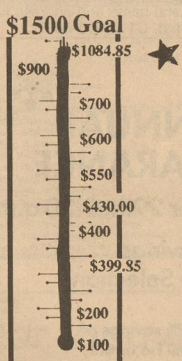
"As a general rule a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an emergency loan," Clements said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 17, 1990 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Clements said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Spur is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Motley County Site of Awareness Program to Enhance Women's Quality of Life

Motley County is the local site participating in a national program designed to increase women's awareness of menopause. Treatments are available that may enhance the quality of life for women entering the menopause. The Awareness Program is featured in this week's Motley County Tribune, one of approximately 100 newspapers in Illinois, Texas and Florida included in the program.

At menopause, a woman's body stops producing estrogen—an important female hormone. The lack of estrogen may cause physiologic and psychological problems. Seventy-five percent of women who are estrogen-deficient are not being treated, leaving them at risk for serious consequences.

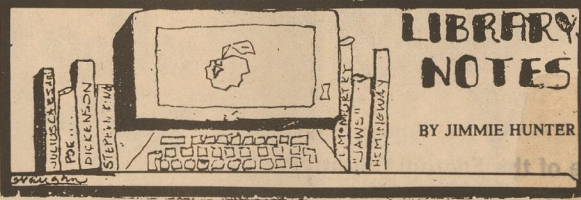

Because the loss of estrogen protection begins early, many women are unaware of the potential risk for them until it is too late. Once bone is lost, it is virtually impossible to rebuild.

Today much more is known about the benefits of estrogen. If the cardiovascular and bone loss protection is added to the relief of common menopausal symptoms, women's quality of life may be significantly enhanced.

Motley County JV Girls Win 1st Place In Motley County Tournament

Brutally cold temperatures on Saturday could not cool off a red hot Motley County girls JV squad as the Lady Matadors won 1st place in hosting their first JV Tournament with wins over Floydada in the morning and Valley in the Championship game. It was their first win over the Valley JV girls in four tries.

Teams from Spur, Valley, Floydada and Motley County participated in the one day tourney. The girls opened the 10:00 a.m. tip off against Floydada with a flurry of points. The Lady Mats outscored the Whirlwinds 10-3 in the first quarter. Each quarter the girls hustled making rebounds, steals, baskets, and free shots. There were many enthusiastic fans that cheered the girls and coach on to a victory. An excellent team effort made the game a success as the Lady Mats won a close game at the buzzer 26-24.

The Championship game against Valley got underway at 6:00 p.m. A fired up Lady Mats team beat Valley 31-28. A tenacious defense was the difference in this game as the JV girls cleared the

boards with critical rebounds and steals.

The first quarter saw 3 straight MC turnovers that resulted in a 6 point advantage for Valley as the game started. However, the JV girls pulled together and came back to outscore the Patriots in the first quarter 12-10. The 2nd quarter had many turnovers but not much scoring with the score at half 16-15 for the Patriots. After intermission and a few words from the coach the girls came out ready to play. The Lady Mats outscored the Valley team in the 2nd half 16-12. When the buzzer sounded and a 31-28 victory sealed, 9 happy players gladly accepted the 1st place trophy. The second game found them matched up with a very strong Idalou team. The Ladies were handed their first loss of the season in a very exciting game that went into overtime, by a score of 61-64. This game saw lots of extra effort by each player. Outstanding offensive effort was shown by Chandra Brown who scored a total of 24 points in this game. She put in three 3 pointers. Outstanding defensive effort by Kathy

Mangram saw her pulling down 10 rebounds and having 4 of her ever-inspiring - "Intercepted Passes" - she just seems to grab off the ceiling. The third game was played against Lorenzo. The Lady Mats got their second of only two losses this year, by a score of 30-40. The absence of Kathy Mangram, who was in Abilene taking her ACT test was felt. The girls put forth good effort. Kathy Mangram (2 games) - 17 rebounds, 8 steals, 4 assists, 4 intercepted passes, 3 blocked shots and scored 36 points; Chandra Brown - 5 rebounds, 4 assists, 7 steals and scored 43 points; Yulanda Campbell - 9 rebounds, 12 assists, 8 steals and 20 points; Brandi Barton - 22 rebounds, 6 steals, 12 assists and 23 points; Paige Williams - 11 rebounds, 6 steals, 12 assists, 6 blocked shots and 14 points; Amy Stephens - 2 rebounds, 5 assists, 1 steal, and 6 points; Natalie Burkes - 7 rebounds, 4 steals, 2 assists and 7 points; Brandee Spray had 2 rebounds and 2 assists; Kammia Pitts had

10 rebounds, 4 steals and 6 points.

The Lady Matadors traveled to Petersburg on Tuesday, December 12. Coach Don Ewing received a great birthday gift from his team. This was possibly the best performance from the team all year. The Ladies came out on top 74-48. The girls played hustling and exciting ball all four quarters.

The team pulled down 43 rebounds and stole the ball 14 times. There were 14 assists and 15 credits given for extra hustle. There were only 10 turnovers in the game.

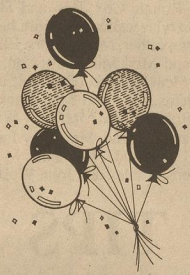

What you choose today they will remember for years.

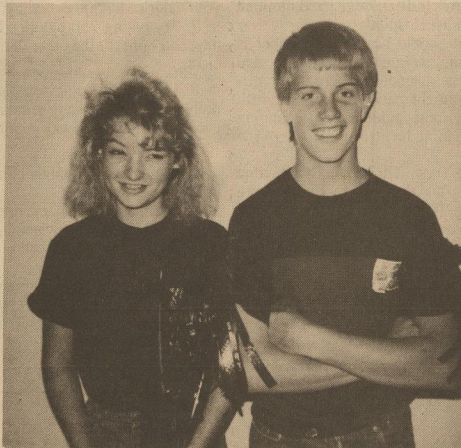

HEALTH TIPS

GETTING THIN..... AND STAYING THAT WAY

With all the weight loss programs and special diets advertised today, it is difficult not to want to jump on the band wagon. "Most adults could stand to lose 10 to 15 pounds, but they want an easy, quick way to do it. And once the weight is gone, they want it to stay gone," said Cindy Rowell, R.D., registered dietitian at Methodist Hospital.

"What people need to remember is that losing weight takes attitude and behavior adjustments. There is no miracle, overnight panacea," said Rowell. Here are some guidelines to changing some fattening habits:

1. Don't rush. Those pounds took time to develop and they aren't coming off in a day.
2. Avoid crash diets. Eating habits must change for the long run - not just for now.
3. Set realistic goals. Decide on a weight that you can live with. Having a Barbie doll figure is not a realistic goal

for everyone. 4. Keep records of what you eat and how much you exercise. Achieving smaller, daily goals is the key to a larger success. These records also can help you discover areas that need improvement.

5. Balance eating and exercise. Weight loss takes a combination of the two.

6. Losing a pound a week requires burning 3,500 calories a week. Decrease your calories by 500 everyday.

7. Try eating 250 calories less each day, and burn off the other 250 by exercising.

8. Try to make exercise a part of your daily routine. Exercising at the same time each day changes the way your body uses food.

9. Remember to eat a diet that is high in fiber and low in fat.

10. Replace sedentary habits with active ones. Instead of watching T.V. in the evenings, take brisk walks.

"Changing unhealthy habits is a slow process," said Rowell. "Don't be too hard on yourself for an occasional mistake."

TAX PAYMENTS

AUSTIN, Tx -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently that sales tax rebates to Texas cities in 1989 topped \$1 billion for the first time in the state's history.

"People are spending more money and that means more tax dollars are going back to communities for fire fighting, police protection and safe roads," Bullock said.

This year's total payments to cities reached \$1.04 billion, 9 percent more than last year's total of \$956 million at this time, Bullock said. Payments to cities this month totaled \$72 million, over 13 percent more than last December's payments of \$64 million.

Houston received a check for \$12 million, which is 12 percent more than last December's payment. Dallas received the second largest payment at \$8.2 million.

Payments to counties totaled \$7.1 million, compared to \$6.4 million last December. Bullock noted that this year's total payments to counties show an increase of 40 percent over last year's because more counties collect the tax this year than last year.

This month's checks to cities and counties reflect taxes collected in October by businesses that file monthly tax returns.

Also included with this month's checks were quarterly payments totaling \$130

million for the state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit authority and one city transit department. The payments to MTAs reflect taxes collected in August, September and October.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 percent share and returns the local sales taxes each month to local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to 2 percent above the state's sales tax, Bullock said.

County Totals: Net payment this period, \$2,365.88; Comparable payment prior year, \$2,725.81; % change, -13.20%; % change, -13.20%; 1989 payments to date, \$45,190.10; 1988 payments to date, \$39,029.36; % change, 15.78%.
