



Electric Cooperatives express reservation about Electric Utility Restructuring

"We are skeptical of the benefits Dickens, and Bill Harbin, Lighthouse, of restructuring for our co-op customers," Mike Williams President and meeting. "We want to do what's right CEO of Texas Electric Cooperatives, Inc. (TEC), told state lawmakers last Cooperative members; that's the way week. TEC is the statewide association that represents Texas' 85 electric cooperatives with a combined membership of nearly 3 million Texans.

Williams was speaking to the state Senate Interim Committee on Electric Utility Restructuring meeting in Grapevine, Texas last week. Lt. Governor Bob Bullock authorized the committee in the wake of legislative efforts last year to restructure the state's electric utility industry, an effor that ultimately failed. The issue is expected to be on the legislative agenda in 1999.

"Co-ops are unique; our customers are our owners," Williams emphasized. "We want to make sure that restructuring is the right path for our customers and all of Texas."

"We don't hear our members talking a lot about competition and restructuring," Libby Linebarger, a director of the Pedernales Electric Cooperative and a former state representative from Manchaca, told the committee, "and we have not seen any restructuring plans that would benefit

Time In Texas

Texas will be cleaner and greener on April 4, when more than 82,000 volunteers scour state highways, count y roads and city steets and parks in the 13th annual Great Texas Trash-Off.

Statewide, 1,840 Adopt-a-Highway groups will pick up litter on state roadways. Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers in 100 communities will concentrate their cleanups on city streets and parks. Altogether, the volunteers expect to collect more than 6.8 million gallons of litter.

One of the nation's largest singleday litter pick-up events, the Trash-Off is organized by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Keep Texas Beautiful (KTP). The one-day event reminds people of the state's natural beauty by providing cleaner, safer roads, streets and parks.

"Thousands of Texans are turning their convictions into action by giving their Saturday to clean up their communities," said Doris Howdeshell, dirictor of TxDOT's Travel Division. "These volunteers are role models. We hope the sense of pride they foster will cause their neighbors and visitors to stop and think before they litter." The Great Texas Trash-Off is part of the TxDOT's "Don't Mess with Texas" public awareness campain. The litter prevention program, which includes Don't Mess with Texas, Adopt-a -Highway, and a grassroots partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., works to change the attitudes - and the be havior - of would - be litterers. History records that when Gen. Douglas McArthur left the Philippines during World War II, he promised that he would some day return and liberate those whom he left behind. He kept that promise. He did not give up, even in what looked like defeat. We cannot escape the fact that in life there are circumstances over which we have no power, which seem at times to defeat our purposes in life. Ill health, lack of finances, opposition of relatives, inability to convince others of the worth of our plans, and many other things may stand in our way. Some people succumb to circumstances, but others have the will to win, and generally do win in the end, though it may take a long hard struggle.

As William S. Deal points out, if this can be done by sheer will power and human stamina, what more can be done by those who have Christ as their Captain and His will as their goal in life? Christian personality must have in it the "never give up" factor. Jesus said, "Be faithful unto death" (Rev. 2:10). Paul shouted triumphantly, "None of these things move me." (Acts 20:24).

day you feel exhausted, frustrated, and overwhelmed at the prospect at what lies before you.

Much of our time is spent the way - reacting; responding to chance events or the requests of others. When you react you are not recognizing you have choices. You could remove the cobweb immediately, choose to get it at a future time or ignore it altogether. People who spend their days reacting get a lot of tasks done, however many of them are insignificant and the result is a feeling of aimlessness.

Acting on the other hand, that is, setting goals and making decisions based on them results in feelings of control, satisfaction and meaning of life. If, for example, you had a goal to sit down and relax at least 15 minutes each evening, when you saw the cobweb you would remind yourself that this was your fifteen minutes to relax and you could decide about the future of the cobweb after that time.

Conscious decisions making requires thought on who or what is important in your life. To start you will need some index cards. On the top of each card list a role you will fill. Our roles describe our relationships with people in different settings. Some examples of roles include spouse, parent, homemaker, friend, child (to our parents), employee, volunteer, etc. Label one card personal/individual to list what you want for yourself. On each card answer the following questions.

1. What are my current commitments?

2. Am I reacting or do I have some goals in place directing my actions? 3. What do I want?







Reminiscing of early water conservation days in Whiteflat



Cistern outside back door of house

"The inner strength of these early day residents came from the simple quiet farm life they knew, like a well of cool water springing from within."

Recalling earlier days, Whiteflat residents were conservative with water long before districts were advocatobjective was to never waste water when it could be used again.

Once flowers, gardens and trees were planted, they used the same water that washed clothes, behind ears and Saturday night baths to irrigate these plants. The same galvanized tub that served on washing day doubled as a bathtub later in the week. The hot water for baths was taken from the reservoir on the side of a kitchen stove. The windmill was used in many ways. Beside water for livestock and chickens, in the warm summer months they headed for the windmill tank that provided a nice bath before bedtime. This certainly beat the old weekly

In the March 24 Federal Register notice annoucing these requests EPA made no mention of FQPA risk analysis. The Agency did, however, return attention to bird mortality concerns with carbofuran. The concerns are similar to those of previous years from use in cotton.

EPA is soliciting public comment on this issue before making a decision on whether to grant exemptions. Comments must be received on or before April 9.




