## Hazel Soltwisch to have Poem Published in Poetry Book

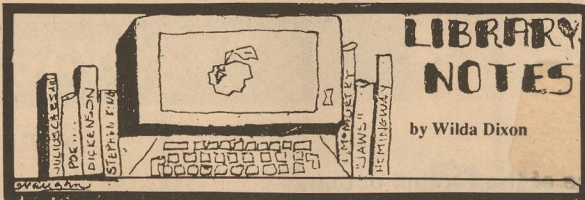

## Census to Begin Soon

Very soon the 1990 Census will begin - the counting of every man, woman and child living in the entire United States. The count determines congressional representation as well as the allocation of billions of dollars of Federal, state and local funds for many programs, including health, welfare, housing and education. The Census is the foundation for economic planning at every level: many businesses use census statistics for research, advertising, and marketing. Counting people dates back to colonial

days, when the need for a census was soon discovered. The Constitution (Art. 1, Sec. 2) states, "The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of Ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct."

Because representation in Congress is vitally affected by the Census count, battles have already begun in an effort to influence the procedure. More than one attempt has been made on the floor of the House of Representatives to exclude undocumented aliens from the Census count, even though they use local and state services, just like anyone else.

APRIL 1ST IS CENSUS DAY: The 1990 count will be a "do-it-yourself" census taken largely by mail. Every household will receive a census questionnaire through the mail shortly before Sunday, April 1 - Census Day. After a couple of weeks, residents will be further contacted, if their forms have not been returned.

Processing and tabulation of the more than 106 million questionnaires will occur in seven processing centers between April and October of 1990 in order to report the count for each state to the President by December 31, 1990, as required by law.

Then, by April 1, 1991, just a year after Census Day, the Census Bureau will make available to state officials the small-area counts needed to carry out redrawing state and local election districts and legislative boundaries.

Texas is expected to gain three members of the U.S. House of Representatives, which will further increase our state's influence in Congress during the next decade.

## DA Becky McPherson Appointed to State Committee

Floyd County District Attorney, Becky McPherson, has been appointed to the Local Government Records Committee. The state committee serves as the principal advisory body to the director and librarian and the Texas State Library and Archives Commission on matters concerning the management and preservation of local government records and the administration of the Texas Local Government Records Act which came into effect in 1989.

The committee will consider several procedures and techniques for micro-filing, electronic storage and retention schedules for local government records management. Rules adopted by the

committee will become part of the Texas Administrative Code.

Mrs. McPherson is a graduate of Lockney High School and West Texas State University. She received her law degree from Texas Tech University. She is the daughter of Don and Verajo Bybee of Lockney. She and her husband, Steve, have two sons, Matt, 5, and J.W., 2.

Before being elected to her post as district attorney for Briscoe, Dickens, Motley and Floyd counties in 1988, she was assistant district attorney in Hale County for four years.

Mrs. McPherson was nominated for a seat on the committee by the Texas District and County Attorney's Association.

come up with planning tools such as hand books... that at least give commissioners knowledge of how to go about implementing an addressing system."

The cost of Montgomery County's rural addressing and mapping system was about \$80,000, Blanton said. This was shared by the groups cooperating in the project, which included several utility companies serving the county as well as the appraisal district, other groups and the commissioners court.

Challenges also exist for those in very remote areas who cannot afford a 24-hour answering service that is required of the 911 system, Boyd told county officials at the annual County Judges and

Commissioners Conference here Jan. 23-25.

"911 is such a catalyst in bringing public safety groups together. Typically, the fire station, police and ambulance service have their own phone numbers and their own territory," Boyd said. "911 brings them under one umbrella and they begin to communicate."

The educational course work offered during the County Judges and Commissioners Association Conference was coordinated by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the county officials. Judges and commissioners who attended all sessions earned continuing educational credits, also mandated by the state legislature.
