Quoting his record in office, Cave stated, "During my first three ycars, we had a great amount of work to do in disposing of a vast number of old cases." Cave addded that many of these cases were secking jury trials and have now been

through his court have been upheld on appeal to higher courts in Texas. Says Cave, "I have made certain that proper

Cave has maintained a perfect record
in returning defendants released to court for trial. He pledges to continue examining bond requests carefully and set bonds at a level which will ensure the presence of defendants for trials.
"In criminal cases under my jurisdic-
