Commissioners Hear Report on Special Ed.

Motley County Commissioners Court met Monday, January 8 with Judge Billy J. Whitaker and Commissioners, J.M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Franklin Jameson and Fraiser Watson, taking care of County business. Washington gave the invocation. County Clerk, Lucretia Campbell read the minutes of last month's meeting.

Outstanding bills were read and approved Precinct 1 \$709.31, Precinct 2 \$253.77 Precinct 3 \$460.67, Precinct 4 \$850.71, and General \$4,869.04. The reports were read with the J.P. collecting \$4,902.50 for December.

Judge Whitaker introduced Lindy Stafford and Beverly Marrs, representing the Rolling Plains Special Ed. Co-op. Stafford explained a recent law pertaining to students who cannot pass the TEAMS text needed to receive a high school diploma. These students could be placed by the Special Ed Co-op in a training job under the Co-op in the town or county they attend school. This program attempts to keep students out of institutional setting, which cost \$41,000 a year per person and teaches job skills and work ethic. When the student is paid, they have to save half and set up a budget within a classroom situation.

Stafford is asking the Court for any county, this spring and/or this summer. Stafford explained they had a very successful list of past students graduating under this program and going on to find and hold a job later. The Court could not promise anything as most of the county work was with heavy equipment unless they used them in the courthouse.

Marisue Potts representing the Motley County Historical Commission, gave each Commissioner a map locating all the historical markers in place in Motley County and reported other projects completed in 1989: H. H. Campbell marker

replaced West of Matador, Matador Ranch Marker placed in roadside park South of Matador, the Emmitt Jenkins stories bound in book form. Potts also reported they had found most of the Civil War Medallions marking the Veterans in the East Mound Cemetery were missing so they planned to replace these in the future.

Potts reported on the Library Board meeting in December, and that Wilda Dixon had taken over the Librarian duties as of January 1.

Aaron Alejandro, District Coordinator for Congressman Bill Sarpius's office from the Court. The Court asked if he would look into the possibility of grant money or other funding for the County to receive on the replacement of bridges that the County was ordered to replace by the Texas State Highway Department of Transportation. The reason they asked the office of the Congressman to look into this is because the law was a Federal law requiring the State to mandate this procedure.

Judge Whitaker reported that they could hire Sharon Pigg, Attorney under the title of Special Prosecutor for Motley County. The Court accepted this.

Elaine Hart, Registered Texas Tax Collector came in to show the Court her certificate and thank the Court for sending her to school, so she could pass her Collectors test.

Judge Whitaker reported on a letter from Upton County Judge and Commissioners asking Motley County to join a Coalition of Cities and Counties in rural West Texas to protest the proposed EPA regulations for disposal of solid waste. No action taken.

Meeting adjourned.

WHAT IS HOSPICE?

The word hospice dates from medieval Europe. It originally meant an inn, a place of refuge for weary travelers.

Today, with the establishment of hospices in England in the late 1960's the word has come to mean a way of helping people with terminal illness live actively and well until they die.

Recognizing that the dying and those close to them have special physical, psychological, spiritual, and social needs, the hospice team provides skilled medical, nursing, counseling and practical home care.

WHAT CAN I DO?

Many talents are needed to make a hospice work. Some examples of lay volunteer work are: grocery shopping, visitation, child care, reading, clerical support, publishing newsletters, lawn care, occasional fund raising, handyman jobs.

Each volunteer determines how much time he or she can give and when. Each person who CARES has SOMETHING to offer Hospice.

All volunteers are required to complete a training program. Notice of when classes will be given will be printed in the newspaper and posted at the clinic.

Transforming blank and depressing empty storefront windows into "mini-museums" is the new focus of county museum proponents.

Citing Quitaque's recent public relations campaign, Glenn Woodruff, chairman of the museum committee, is urging townspeople to get involved by sharing items of historical interest to be displayed around town.

The downtown property owner, who has empty buildings himself, has been busy talking up the project to others with similar problems. Several storefronts are lined up and awaiting the items to be displayed. Those willing to share a bit of the county's history should contact

Woodruff or leave word at the Motley County Tribune office.

O.R. Stark, Jr., Quitaque's most vocal promoter, wrote recently in the newsletter of First National Bank there, "The Sidewalk Museum has been attracting the most attention in recent weeks, and all during the holidays visitors stopped to stroll up and down Main Street to view the attractive displays. With the Christmas lights and decorations in each window that had been added for the season, it was almost like delving into the past and viewing holiday scenes from the turn of the century."

Stark sees tourism as a major untapped resource in the economic future of Briscoe County. A Caprock Jamboree, held the first Saturday of each month and

composed of local county, blue grass, and gospel musicians, has attracted much attention lately. The Chamber of Commerce is touting the county's beauty and attractions of their area every chance it gets, the latest at a Trailways Tours Tourama in Amarillo.

In nearly a full page of story and pictures, The Amarillo Daily News showcased the unique Sidewalk Museum and other attractions with the headline "Look not at vacant shop windows, step into the past instead."

Though not wishing to copy Quitaque's success, the Storefront Mini-Museum project seems a step in the right direction with the county's centennial coming up in 1991 and could definitely be developed into something special.

Just as the Eternas Study Club's thrust at decorating downtown Matador during the Christmas holidays cheered the spirits and warmed the souls of shoppers, encouraging them to shop at home first, so can full storefront windows improve the looks of downtown, making it a neat place to be.

Reading the Tribune article in December about the proposed county museum, Frances Ellis of Paris, Texas, sent a very welcomed donation to show her support of the idea. Treasurer Hazel Donavan is keeping detailed records of all incoming donations. The committee is currently seeking non-profit tax exempt status and incorporation.

Judge Billy J. Whitaker announced his candidacy for re-election for County Judge to the Tribune this week.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the voters of Motley County for their support and pledge my talents to continue to serve to the best of my ability."

Judge David Cave Seeking Re-Election

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for permitting me to serve as your District Judge for the past three years," said David Cave. "I would also like to ask for your support in my campaign for a second term."

Cave, who moved to Floydada last July, has been the serving District Judge for the 110th Judicial District since his election in 1987 for a term which began January 1, 1987. He serves the counties of Floyd, Briscoe, Motley and Dickens.

Quoting his record in office, Cave stated, "During my first three years, we had a great amount of work to do in disposing of a vast number of old cases." Cave added that many of these cases were seeking jury trials and have now been "promptly disposed after I took office."

Judgements on civil cases passing through his court have been upheld on appeal to higher courts in Texas. Says Cave, "I have made certain that proper preparation has been done prior to and during the trial. This allows litigants to have careful and correct jury trials which are free of error. I have had no reversible errors in civil cases."

Cave has maintained a perfect record in returning defendants released on bond to court for trial. He pledges to continue examining bond requests carefully and set bonds at a level which will ensure the presence of defendants for trials.

"In criminal cases under my jurisdiction," adds Cave, "I have refused to go along with some of the plea bargains. Since Mrs. McPherson has taken office, I have found all of the recommended plea bargains acceptable. I will continue to

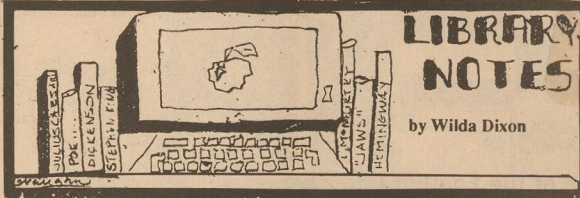

Hoyle informed the board that as of January 1, 1990, Kirby Campbell retired as Director of the EMS and Ambulance service. They commended Kirby for his years of dedicated service to the people of Motley County. Hoyle stated Kirby and his wife, Joyce, had been a great part of keeping the Ambulance in service in the early years as well as now. Joyce will continue to be Secretary to the EMS until the next audit.

Hoyle announced that Tony Rose will be the new Director of the EMS and Lisa Rose (wife of Kenny Rose) will be assistant director. Rose stated, "I plan to strive to do the best job and keep everything running as smooth as possible and I welcome any suggestions from any of you." Rose also informed the Board he had recently passed his instructors training for EMS.

Rose informed the Board the EMS was working on building up their ambulance attendants. They can now use drivers who only have ECA Emergency and have one to two EMTs in the ambulance.

Hoyle reported Bob Davis had been appointed to the SPHPO Board from Motley County to replace Lillie Crouch. The Board elected to send the same fee of \$3,000 to SPEMS for 1990.

Hoyle reported the Appraisal Board met Monday, January 8 and set up the cost share for the Hospital District for 1990 of \$1,920.00.

Rep. Chisum Announces Bid for Re-Election to Texas House

Representative Warren Chisum (D) of Pampa announced today that he has filed for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives, subject to the Democratic primary March 13. He is unopposed for the office. Rep. Chisum was elected to the House in 1988.

As a freshman legislator, Rep. Chisum co-authored two of the major bills of the session: HB18, the Rural Health bill, and HB 1, the Workers' Comp bill. He served on two of the most active committees of the house: the Committee on County Affairs, and the Committee on Corrections which was responsible for adding 18,000 new beds to the Texas prison system and for helping change the crimi-

nal justice system through HB 2335. He was the first freshman in the House to pass a bill during the regular session. "The next session of the Texas legislature will be very important for the people of the 84th District," he said, "because the House and Senate will redistrict in 1991. We must have strong leadership from the Panhandle to protect our representation." Rep. Chisum also pledged to continue his fight against a state income tax during the next session.

A native of the Pampa area, Rep. Chisum was an active civic leader in Pampa, and the owner of several businesses related to oil and gas when he decided to seek public office in 1988.

Sarpalius Announces Candidacy for Re-Election

AMARILLO - Congressman Bill Sarpalius today formally filed for re-election to the U.S. House of Representatives, saying he wants to do all he can to help the 13th Congressional District meet the many challenges it will face during the 1990s.

Sarpalius, who was elected to the U.S. House last year after serving eight years in the Texas Senate, said he believes his proven experience and effectiveness - combined with the inherent strengths of the district - can help turn those challenges into opportunities for new jobs and economic growth.

"Challenges are nothing new to those of us who live in Northwest Texas," he said after filing re-election papers in Austin. "We've met many problems head-on over the years and, working together, we have solved most of them."

When we saw that many of our cities and almost all our rural areas were lacking adequate emergency medical care, we passed the law that opened the 9-1-1 emergency system to the whole state of Texas, and we passed the bill that improved rural ambulance services statewide.

When we learned that Texas ranked 50th in the nation in the fight against substance abuse, we created the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. When we saw the startling number of lives being claimed by drunken drivers, we passed the toughest DWI law in Texas history. And, when the Department of Energy said it wanted to store and transport high-level nuclear waste in our part of the state, we authored legislation to slow its efforts.

Sarpalius said teamwork and leadership have been the keys to these successes and will be critical to future accomplishments for the district.

"Government works best when government is responsive to the needs of the people: when everyone works together in a partnership," he said. "From the first day I represented the people in Austin, we sent a mobile office traveling throughout the district and held regular town hall

meetings. We've continued this tradition in Washington. It's brought government to the people, made it responsive and it's a system that has worked well."

"Combine this responsiveness with leadership and you have an unbeatable combination. When I first arrived in the Texas Senate, I was appointed chairman of the Agriculture Committee. That was a first for a Senate freshman. In Washington I was elected president of my freshman class, and I earned critical appointments to the Agriculture and Small Business committees.

"All these factors have played a key role in bringing projects home to the district and passing important measures like the Agriculture Disaster Relief Act of 1989. None of my prospective opponents have ever held any kind of leadership position, and I think that's significant," Sarpalius said.

He pledged to continue this unique brand of leadership and teamwork in the upcoming decade. "I learned early in life that we accomplish much more if we work for each other rather than just for ourselves," Sarpalius said. "I think everyone in the district feels the same way: you can see a spirit building and growing throughout the district, creating a momentum to keep us and our economy moving forward in the 1990s. We'll need that kind of 100-percent effort, because during the next 10 years, we are going to have to solve many problems."

"We'll need to find solutions to our rural health care problems, to the war against drugs, to the economic problems that plague our agriculture and energy industries. We'll need to reduce the deficit and stop wasteful spending. We must improve our educational system and competitiveness in the world market. And we must fight off efforts to raid the Social Security Trust Fund.

"If the people of the 13th District are concerned about these same problems and I'm sure they are," Sarpalius said. "Then I know they'll support me and together, we'll get the job done."

NEW PROGRAM FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

A new program for special education students has been implemented in the Motley County and Patton Springs school systems. It is a work program entitled VAC and will insure that a student has saleable work skills upon graduation from high school.

Rolling Plains Special Education Cooperative Transition department has as its goal to prepare students with moderate to profound developmental disabilities to live, work, and play in their communities and be a contributing, productive member of that community through the teaching of academic skills and functional life skills in a community based curriculum and through the teaching of job skills through real work experience.

Students involved in the VAC program will begin working in a job in their community during the second semester of their junior year. With the help of local businesses, jobs will be found for students so that they may work from four to eight hours daily and have an opportunity to attend academic classes regularly. Students will receive stipends for their work, enabling them to learn budgeting and appropriate use of their money.

Ed Co-op. Some of these students work in the school systems; others work in local businesses within a particular community. All of them are learning skills which will enable them to apply for and to succeed in the world of work after high school graduation.

Texas Education Agency rules have mandated that as of next fall, school systems will have in place plans for students which will prepare these youths for life after school. Everything that we do to give these students a chance at meaningful employment comes back to use two-fold. We've bettered our community by saving tax dollars and by integrating a new, productive member, but we have also given an individual a chance to succeed.

At the present time, approximately 12 students are enrolled in VAC programs at the six schools in Rolling Plains Special

The JV girls take on the Spur Bulldogs January 16. See you there!

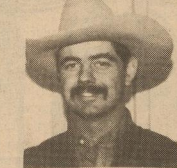
JV Boys Win In Close Game With Childress

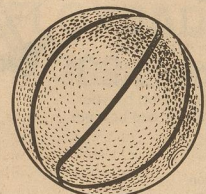

pointed to propane prices in Texas which jumped from 48 cents per gallon on Thanksgiving Day to \$1.00 on New Year's Day. "When the price of heating oil increases over 200 percent in a month, we need to find out why and how it can be avoided in the future," he said.

Ironically, even as propane and other heating fuel prices skyrocketed, service stations in Waco, Texas were engaged in a price war, with gasoline prices at the pumps reported as low as 79.9 cents per gallon.

"What all this points to is the lack of a coordinated national energy policy," said the farm leader. "Cold temperatures in the Northeast shouldn't have drained all the available heating fuel supplies from the rest of the country. Surely the government and the nation's giant refineries can plan ahead better than that."

The Farmers Union advocates a national energy policy which would include: Distribution of available energy that assures farmers adequate supplies for food production; adequate heating fuel reserves in case of emergencies; incentives for domestic energy development; attention to environmental impacts; and greater development of renewable energy sources.
