

# County Sets New Record with Eight Wells

## Lease Terminations Spark Drilling Boom

**ANOTHER SNYDER?** The oil outlook in Motley County is extremely good and it is getting better with eight new wells now active. It is the first time in the county's two-year-old oil history that eight prospectors have been in progress at once. Observers say the cause stems from the fact that most of the leases in the Roaring Springs area expire next month.

New people brought here by the oil activity are "begging" for places to stay in Roaring Springs and Matador. A large group of workers engaged in construction of the new FM highway west of Roaring Springs are bringing further tension to the situation. One estimate is that 50 families would come to Matador and Roaring Springs if housing were available.

The newest well in the Roaring Springs West Field was announced Tuesday for the Brooks Callaway land. The following three-column excerpt is from the Tuesday Lubbock Avalanche:

"Exploration and development activity continued brisk in southern Motley County as a wildcat and field offset were staked Monday. Two miles north of Roaring Springs and three and one-half miles northwest of the recently expanded four-well West Roaring Springs field, O. E. Meadows of Dallas staked an 8,000-foot Mississippian wildcat, No. 1 Hunsucker (J. R. Moore estate at northwest corner of Air Port Golf Course, just east of State Highway 70).

"The venture is to test for possible subsidiary reef detrital and granite wash production. "Nearest deep dry hole is about one mile southeast Hunsucker's No. 1-K Matador, a 9,500-foot granite failure.

"It will be dug 330 feet from south and west lines of Sec. 3, Block 0-4, A. M. Bourland survey. (Water is being piped from Dutchman Creek to the location)

"One-quarter mile or one location north of Perkins-Prothro's one mile east extension of the West Roaring Springs field, Perkins-Prothro and Pan American Pet. Corp. have staked an offset, No. 1, C. Brooks. The test will be drilled to 4,400 feet to test the four-well field's Permo-Penn pay zone.

Survivors are two brothers, Web Cammack of Lubbock and Dr. Bragg Cammack of Hollywood, Calif., and three sisters, Mrs. Vashti Teal of Dallas, Mrs. J. W. Kleinschmidt of Canyon and Mrs. Ben W. Rhodes of Houston.

Eudy-Seale Funeral Home, Matador, was in charge of arrangements, and the body was brought here overland, by them. Burial was in the family plot in East Mound Cemetery.

Pallbearers were T. J. Daffern, Billy Wason, Ward Rattan, D. P. Keith, Alvin Stearns and J. B. Cooper.

Mr. Cammack was born in Tyler County, Texas, March 7, 1881 and died August 10, 1959 at the age of 78 years, 5 months and three days.

He came with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. T. N. Cammack, to Motley County in 1891, and grew to manhood here.

When he was about 25 years old he went to Stratford, and later to Amarillo, where he practiced law, until moving to Denver. He was converted as a young man, and joined the Matador Baptist Church, of which his parents were charter members.

## Showers Bring Relief From Tension Of Heat

A SERIES of thunder showers that swept a wide area of the Panhandle early Saturday morning, brought welcome relief from the tension of heat prevailing for three weeks. The precipitation here was 2.09 inches. At Roaring Springs 1.26 inches was recorded. Flomot reported one-half inch while some sections of the Hornica area recorded 3.50 inches.

While the rains were not general, they provided badly needed moisture to sustain the growth of crops. Farmer say prospects have never been more promising. Exceptionally cool nights during the entire summer have been a factor in enhancing the outlook.

The storm here Saturday morning was accompanied by severe lightning which caused damage to power transmission lines and disrupted television service. Several bolts of lightning struck in town and resulted in minor damage but no one was injured. No hail or wind damage was reported.

According to Bob Stanley's records the rainfall brought the year's total to 19.62 inches. During the first seven months of this year the rainfall in Matador was 17.53 inches as compared with 15.84 inches during the same period last year.

Precipitation here for the first seven months of 1957 was 22.59 inches and for the same period in 1956 only 3.81 inches were recorded. During 1955 the rainfall recorded here for the first seven months was 13.12 inches and for the same period in 1954 the total was 11.16 inches.

## RANCHERS APPROVE AREA FOR CONTROL

A group of Motley County ranchers meeting last week in the courthouse here approved a plan to create a Plan II Brucellosis (Bangs disease) control area. The vote was almost unanimous.

At present four ranchers, D. I. W. Birnie, W. D. Lipscomb, J. C. (Doc) Burleson and Elbert Reeves are circulating petitions. A total of 204 signatures of cattle (or cow) owners will be necessary to create the control area.

The Livestock Sanitary Commission requires 75% of the cattle (or cow) owners sign the petition. The county has 272 livestock owners.

Cattle that will be tested at no cost to the owner, if the program is approved, are all dairy cattle, all purebred beef cattle, and 20% of all other range cattle over three years of age. Animals excluded from the test are steers, spayed heifers and officially vaccinated (brucellosis) animals under 30 months of age.

Testing will be scheduled so as to disturb animals as little as possible. Any animal shown to be a reactor may be scheduled for a re-test if application is made within 10 days of original test. Animals can be tested at any time, irrespective of stage of pregnancy or calving.

Springs the venture will be drilled to 330 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of Sec. 48, Blk. J, A. M. Bourland survey. Drilling will begin immediately as rotary tools are being moved on location.

The wildcat and offset bring the total projects in the area to six, five projects near or around the West Roaring Springs field, and the wildcat north of town to mark Motley County's biggest oil play, even larger than when the hash, but small Roaring Springs field was brought in March 10, 1957.

Also being watched closely is General Crude Oil Co's wildcat No. 1-A Birnie, in the western part of the county.

The Lubbock Avalanche said Wednesday that McKinney and Leonard, Midland, staked the No. 1 C. G. Callaway on the north side of the field, 3,300 feet east-northeast of the field's discovery well and 3,600 feet west-northwest of the recent mile extension of the field.

It is also 3,600 west of the Perkins-Prothro and Pan American No. 1 C. Brooks, offset staked Monday.

The new location brings to a total of eight, the number of projects staked in the "oil-poor" county. Four are currently drilling, two wildcats and two field offsets.
