**Record Shows Growth**

### Bert Green High In FFA Contests

Bert Green of Roaring Springs has again taken the lead in the field of agriculture. A member of the Roaring Springs F. F. A. Chapter, he was named high individual in a Grass Judging contest recently at Tulla, with a score of 394 out of a possible 400 points. He was awarded a medal from the Soil Conservation Service.

Vo-ag teacher, Billy Peacock accompanied the team, and also a livestock judging team to Tulla, Jan. 22. Members of the livestock team were Jim Lewis, Allen Smith and Rex Martin. Others on the grass team were Sammy Swim, and George Smith.

On January 28 the same teams attended the Amarillo contest, with a substitution of Lewis Carpenter for Rex Martin. There, Bert Green took 2nd highest individual award with a ribbon, scoring 369 out of a possible 400 points.

The livestock team placed 15th in the entire contest made up of 56 teams, with a score of 1112 out of a possible 1200 points.

"Although the teams did not bring home any banners, they have learned a lot as far as knowing what a good beef animal should look like and what characteristics they should have in order to put on weight where it counts the most," said Peacock. "The grass teams are learning what grazing value each of our grasses have, and how to identify them when out in the field."

"The team members are using their own time in learning and training for the contests, and as their teacher, I am proud to say that we have not taken any class time for this purpose. We plan to enter several other contests before school is out, and if the boys improve as they have in the past, they should go forward and possibly win a few banners to hang on our class walls."

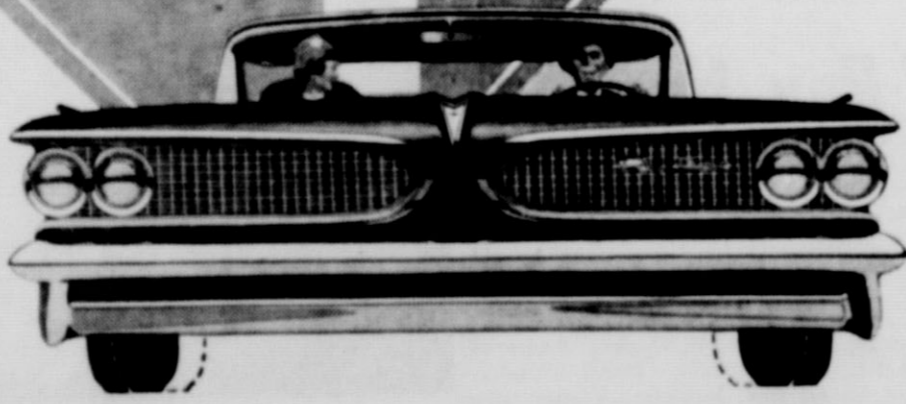

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

**COTTON ROOT ROT IS COMMON DISEASE**

Cotton root rot is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas and is found in the Motley County area, being most common in areas where heavy alkaline soils are found. Growing resistant plants or acidifying the soil are the most common methods of fighting the problem.

Ornamental plants affected by the disease, caused by a fungus, die suddenly. Small plants often die within a few days after the first wilting while larger trees may die more slowly. The root system of affected plants decays and small plants can be pulled from the soil with little effort. The bark of the roots is decayed and brownish and wooly strands of fungus frequently are apparent on the root surfaces.

Under moist conditions, spore mats sometimes appear on the soil surface. These mats may range from 2 to 12 inches in diameter and first are snow-white and cottony in appearance. They later have a tan and powdery appearance.

Now is the time to plan a control program for ornamentals. Plant only resistant or immune plants, whether they be made for the first time or replacement. For a listing of the resistant and immune plants, get a copy of L-390, Cotton Root Rot from County Agent Pallmeyer.

**BARLEY PRODUCTION THEME OF BULLETIN**

Barley is a relatively minor crop in Texas but warrants further consideration by growers in some areas because of its dual value as a feed grain crop and as winter pasture for livestock.

The barley acreage is widely distributed over the state. It is grown under a wide range of climatic conditions and on many soil types. But it thrives best on well-drained, fertile soils in a cool climate, so it is usually fall sown in Texas.

Practically all the barley grain grown in Texas is used as feed for livestock. It is a desirable grain for fattening hogs or steers or may be used as part of the maintenance ration of breeding stock. Barley also is a good forage crop and an excellent winter crop.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture has released Bulletin 918 entitled "Barley Production in Texas". It discusses areas of adaptation, uses, culture, varieties and other related topics. The bulletin is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

## Pat Groves In Naval Reserve Training Corps

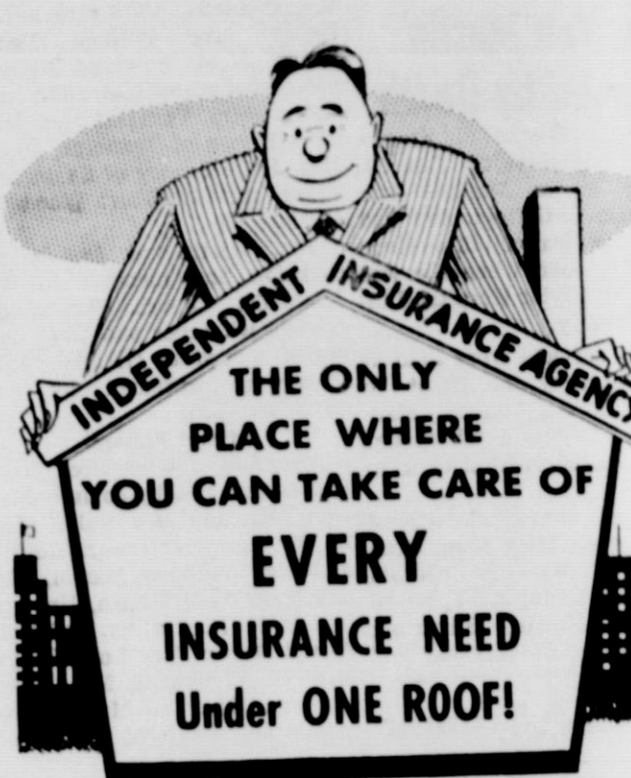

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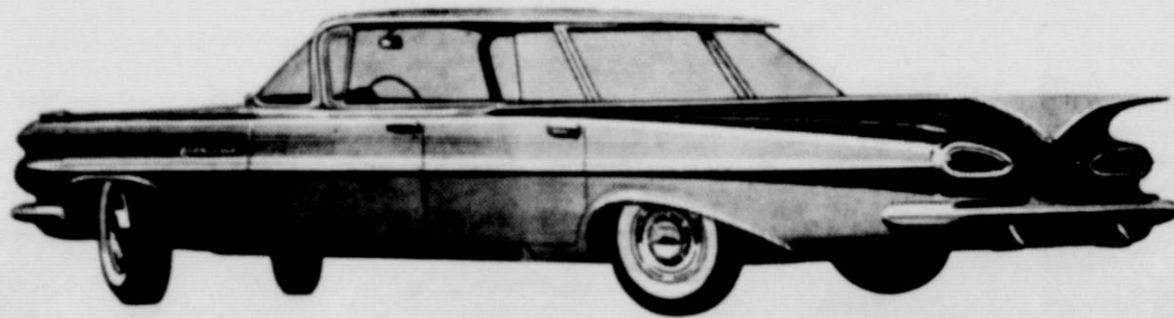
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
