> "Spotted" **Rains Aid**

Motley county's agriculture utlook has been greatly improvd during the past week by 'spotted" rains, which left as much as three inches in some sections of the Flomot community to as little as a trace in other

The rainfall here (not official) was approximately one-half inch with most of it falling early Monday afternoon.

Northfield was reported to have received more than one inch and Ben Edwards in the Hornica area measured about 1.60. Heavy showers were reported in other sections of the ounty.

Farmers and ginners say the howers, augmented with cooler hights, will greatly aid the coton crop prospects and in some nstances assure a good yield. Altho the cotton crop has suffered to some extent because of he prolonged drouth and extreme heat, some experienced observers believe Motley county till has an excellent chance to produce a better than average rop. They say it is true that cotton has died in some fields, but tenerally the excellent May rains produced a "ground-season" which carried the cotton through the extreme weather.
