

BICYCLE BUILT FOR TWO-Johnny Bert Ezzell, 11, victim of polio for the past five years and his mother, Mrs. Bert Ezzell, are shown above on a specially-built bicycle. Two regular bicycles were attached side by side so that Johnny Bert can exercise his legs while his mother pedals. On recent trips they have traveled as much as three miles on Matador streets. Mrs. Ezzell declared she believed the cycling is proving beneficial to Johnny Bert, who now helps in the pedaling.

A specially made seat was prepared for the youth, and his feet are attached to the pedals to keep them from falling out of position. Paralyzed from the neck down with a combination of spinal and bulbar polio in September, 1949. Johnny Bert has undergone three operations at the Dallas Scottish Rites Hospital and returns for regular check-ups and observation.

Altho he is unable to move except when lifted by his mother or his father, Superntendent Bert Ezzell, Johnny Bert is top boy in his class at school. He is pushed to school in a wheel chair by his mother and sits at a wheeled desk. Classmates push him from one room to another. In addition to regular school work he is studying music and expression. He is an avid baseball fan and knows from memory scores of statistics about his favorites. Happy with the improvement the cycling has shown in Johnny Bert's condition, the devoted mother, says: "The exercise is helping both of us - it is reducing me.




