## Farm Degrees Awarded Two County Boys

Two Motley county boys, James Taylor of Matador and Bob Stafford of Roaring Springs last week were awarded the Lone Star Farmer degree in an impressive ceremony at San Antonio.

The coveted honor is awarded by the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America which has a total membership of approximately 39,000 boys. The two Motley county boys were among the 488 to receive degrees during the annual convention attended by 3,000 delegates.

James Taylor is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Taylor of Matador and was accompanied to San Antonio by Vocational Agriculture Teacher Bill Moss. Bob Stafford is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Stafford of Roaring Springs and was accompanied to the convention by the Roaring Springs school vocational agriculture teacher, O. L. Harris.

Highest State Award  
In order to receive the Lone Star Farmer degree a candidate must have already met the requirements and received the Greenhand and Chapter Farmer degrees through the local chapter. The state degree is given by the state association and only one higher degree is obtainable, the American Farmer degree awarded by the national association of FFA.

All degrees are granted on a basis of a boy's project program, accurate and complete record books, leadership and participation in cooperative activities. David Keith also accompanied the group to San Antonio as a delegate to the FFA convention.

## Motley County Ballots Strength In All Boxes

### Bitter Fight Seen As Top Candidates Begin Second Race

Governor Allan Shivers needing only 6,000 votes for victory over his three opponents, is matched for a "fight to the finish" battle with his three-time opponent, Ralph Yarborough, in the August 28, second primary.

Texans went to the polls Saturday in almost equal numbers for the two leading candidates. Governor Shivers yesterday had a total of 666,226 votes to Yarborough 642,374 out of 1,344,730 votes cast, giving the Governor a lead of 23,852 votes, but not enough to overcome the combined votes (Clyde Davis 16,145 and J. J. Holmes 19,983) of all three opponents.

In Motley county Governor Shivers received 628 votes as compared to Yarborough 447. Davis received 17 and Holmes 6.

Incumbents opposed and unopposed fared well in the county election. Ben Ramsey received 662 votes over two opponents. John Ben Shepperd received 835 votes over his one opponent and Lyndon B. Johnson received 795 votes over his one opponent. Walter Rogers received 790 votes over two opponents.

## FIRE DESTROYS SPUR LANDMARK

Flames for the second time in 44 years Wednesday night destroyed the famous Spur Inn. The historic hotel was destroyed by fire in 1923 and rebuilt from original plans. It was first built in 1910 by S. M. Swenson and Sons company, Spur's founders.

The 40-room hotel which had had as its guests many outstanding leaders, including the famous Texas poet Larry Chittendon had stood vacant for the past two years. In report of the fire yesterday the Lubbock Avianche said, "The only victims were the ghosts of Dickens county pioneers."

## Whitflat, Flomol Commissioner Race Is Only Run-Off

VOTERS MARCHED to the polls in Motley county Saturday, voted, and went away to await the returns. The county polled a total of 1147 votes according to Democratic Chairman W. L. McWilliams, but the largest number of votes polled in any race was 1123 for the two sheriff candidates.

Sheriff John Stotts was re-elected by 731 votes over his opponent Sterling Price's 392 votes.

County Judge Vance Glibreath was re-elected with 681 votes over his opponent Gerald Yeates' 450 votes. A total of eleven hundred and eleven votes were cast in the race.

James (Doc) Taylor defeated incumbent Tom Berryman for the office of County Commissioner precinct one with 343 votes against 253 votes.

In all boxes Motley county voted near its total strength as previously estimated. All elections progressed orderly and most reports were made within a short time after the polls closed. In the two Matador boxes balloting was so heavy at times that voters waited for short intervals.

## Only One Run-Off

Only one run-off in the county remains for the second primary, August 28. The five candidates in Precinct 2 County Commissioner race (Whitflat-Flomol) is narrowed to Jack Spray with 51 votes and incumbent J. E. Monk with 92 votes.

County Clerk Pat Sheridan received the most votes of any unopposed county candidate with 1033. Mrs. Velma Fulfer was second for the office of County Treasurer with 1024 votes and Howard Traweck received 1013 votes for County Attorney. See complete returns elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune.

## Bishop Is Defeated As District Judge

AMARILLO—Henry S. Bishop who had served as judge of the 47th Judicial District since 1918 with the exception of two terms, was defeated for renomination Saturday by E. E. Jordan, county judge of Potter county for the last six years.

Bishop had served for 14 years as district attorney before he was elected judge. He was a pioneer Motley county teacher, and was Flomol's first teacher.

## Geese To Appear On Television Screens

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 51-b and reading as follows:

Section 51-b. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control.

(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created. On or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment...

(c) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, the Commission may acquire necessary real and personal property...

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be permitted by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars in the erecting of memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Republic in the Texas War for Independence...

"(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollar valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section 17, of Article VII (adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purposes of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.

(e) Should the 53rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots the following:

FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the amendment published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by repealing Section 2a of Article VI and by amending Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service, providing for submission of the proposed amendment to the qualified electors, providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be repealed and that Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Texts be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to wit: "First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

"Second: Idiots and Lunatics.

"Third: All paupers supported by any county.

"Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service, and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

"AGAINST the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service, and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Half of County Votes In Two Matador Boxes

Slightly more than half of the votes cast in Saturday's primary were polled in Matador's two boxes. The voting precinct, however, extends much beyond the incorporate city limits and includes one of the county's most densely populated farming areas.

The total vote count in the sheriff's race was 1123 with 565 being cast in the two Matador boxes (and not including absentees which would probably bring the total Matador vote to 600-absentees counted in county total).

In order to give complete election returns and reduce needless typesetting the Tribune will publish only totals of unopposed candidates and not list them in each of the various voting boxes. Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 7

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years, providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year; providing for enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, to set up a system of payments to needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month."

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for crediting to members of either the Teachers Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems."

"Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be numbered 63, which shall read as follows: "Section 63. Qualified members of the Teacher Retirement System in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Teachers Retirement System shall be entitled to credit in the Teacher Retirement System for all services, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as a teacher or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for crediting to members of either the Teachers Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems."

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age, giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy children under sixteen (16) years of age, providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government, limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance;"

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government, limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 2, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines such machines shall provide for the following:

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

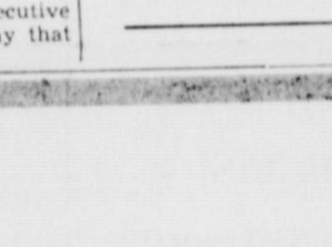
