#### Dynamite Blast Increases Heat Jitters

A BLAST of dynamite shook Matador about 9 p. m. Friday. With the citizenry suffering heat jitters, listening to radio details of the Geneva troubles and mention of the atom bomb anniversary, it was not exactly the kind of a thing calculated to quiet nerves. Residents rushed out of their homes throughout town. Some looked for planes overhead and others felt certain their water-heaters had exploded. Almost everyone thought the explosion was near their home.

It was two pounds of dynamite tied in a tree and exploded by Ed Jameson and associates, southeast of the city limits. They wanted to get rid of the dangerous material and decided on the tree method. It made a loud, earth-shaking noise. "Didn't even destroy the tree," Jameson declared.

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# Keep Texas Free!

(Page One Editorial, Lubbock Avalanche, Wednesday, July 21).

VERY OFTEN in American political campaigns, the clash of personalities of candidates obscures the basic issue involved. Fortunately, the current campaign for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in Texas is not one of these.

As always, this year's campaign features a number of minor issues, some of which have been blown up to assume an importance far greater than actually can be attached to them. But under the welter of claims and counter-claims, charges and counter-charges, there is just one important issue upon which the electorate shall rule, that issue is:

Shall the Democratic Party in Texas continue to exert conservative influence on the National Democratic Party's present control; or shall that conservative influence be stifled and the party organization in this State be delivered to the Northern and Eastern wing?

The two principal candidates, Gov. Allan Shivers and former District Judge Ralph Yarborough, have taken firm and unmistakable stands on this issue. Governor Shivers champions those Texas Democrats who would keep the party in this State free of foreign control and dictation. Judge Yarborough would have Texas Democrats "loyal" to all National Party dictates, even when those dictates are against the best interests of Texas and Texans. THE MAN who wins the Democratic nomination next Saturday will head the State Democratic organization until January of 1957. How the individual votes next Saturday will, therefore, reflect his preference as to whether the Texas Democratic Party will be run by, of and for Texas and Texans; or whether it will become a tool of the National Party leadership, dominated by Northern and Eastern extremists whose ideas of government are far different from those of the majority of Texans.

Thus, the Shivers—Yarborough contest is not primarily important as a clash of individual candidates, or personalities. But it is of tremendous, even paramount, importance as a clash of ideologies — of completely divergent philosophies of government.

Those who wish to keep political freedom in Texas, and thus avoid dictation from afar, will vote to re-elect Mr. Shivers, whose record as Governor, incidentally, is one of the best of our times.





#### Two Different Political Philosophies

In the Texas campaign for governor two good and honorable men are opposing each other. They are both members of the Baptist church in Austin and it is hardly probable that either has any more evil attached to his past than fhe average man. Both, however, have done "campaign window-dressing" against the other. Both men are qualified to serve the office but they are not alike.

The actual issue in the election involves two opposite political philosophies. Judge Ralph Yarborough is a liberal and Governor Allan Shivers is a conservative. Neither candidate has any reason to deny his position. Governor Shivers has kept the state's spending within its ability to pay and he is stubborn to the extent that he refuses to be forced into any position by pressure groups.

On the other hand Judge Yarborough is a liberal in his views and in the event of his election. Texas will be under a liberal administration. If the voter feels that Texas should exercise more liberalism in its spending and that the state can more effectively function with more taxes, the choice is

If, however, the voter feels that Texas has made progress under Governor Shivers' administration and that he has exercised enough liberalism during the period he has served the state, then he will support him in Saturday's election.

The Tribune is a small newspaper and its influence is extremely limited. Two years ago it took issue with Shivers when he allowed his name to be cross-filed on the Republcian ticket, but it has found no cause to blame the governor with any mistakes of the Republican party.

Governor Shivers wanted the tidelands for the school children of Texas. He, in the opinion of this newspaper, bought them at the cost of making a concession to the Republican party, believing the people of Texas would approve his strategy. His enemies took advantage of the lowering of his guard. They never mention the 32 millions of dollars that Allan Shivers recovered for the school children of Texas. They refer, instead, to his selling the Democratic party to the Republians. The Democratic party is stronger under Governor Shivers' leadership than ever befor. It means something and the opposition knows Texas is no longer a "vest pocket" Democratic vote that is chained to the national party.

Other critics of Allan Shivers point to the third term as some fearful poison that may destroy the sacred cow of tradition. It is significant that if we elect county officers to more than two terms, district judges and attorneys repeatedly, and state and national legislators often for most of their actives lives, that we will survive a good governor more than two terms. 
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
