## Matadors To Face Valley On Friday

in Motley County. They were members of the Class of 1924. The program and business meeting of the Ex Students and Teachers Association was held at the Motley County School.

After the heartbreaking defeat by the Happy Cowboys last Friday the Matadors are coming back this week to face Valley, their toughest opponent of the season.

The Valley Patriots were beaten by Crosbyton in the first game of the season 12-6, but since then they shut out every team they played until last week when Silverton scored 14 points on them.

"This will be the best ball team we have faced this year," Motley County head coach Gene Griffin said. "We will have to play our best game ever to beat them."

Griffin said Valley's ace running back is a 165 pound junior named James McNary. "They have outstanding speed. We have got to shut down McNary to beat them."

During the Patriots loss to Crosbyton, McNary was out of the game after the fourth play. Also Silverton has "a real good defense."

"McNary is the one they live and die with," Griffin said. "We have got to stop him."

The Matadors rolled up 179 yards rushing and 81 yards passing against Happy, but failed to contain the fourth quarter offense by the Cowboys. Motley County had struck first on their first drive when, after nine plays and an 18 yard carry by Harvey Lee, relief quarterback Shawn Bearden hit end Dewight Campbell for a 20 yard touchdown. With 7:19 remaining in the first quarter the Matadors were on top 7-0.

On the next drive by Happy, Dewight Campbell intercepted a Cowboy pass in the end zone to give the Matadors the ball again. But two plays later MC lost the ball on a fumble and the Cowboys recovered on the MC 31 yard line.

But the Matadors stopped the Cowboys again and forced them to give up the ball on downs. The ball changed hands twice before Happy got it back again, then they drove to the Matadors one yard line in 10 plays and running back PeeWee Moore plunged in for the TD. The point-after-touchdown failed and Matadors still led 7-6.

Happy got the ball once more before the half ended, but Charlie Campbell intercepted a Cowboy pass and ran it to mid-field, but a clipping penalty moved the ball back inside the MC 30 yardline.

The third quarter saw both teams struggle and punt, but Happy got a break when a Matadors punt was blocked and the Cowboys took over on the MC 36 yard line. Penalties and incomplete passes crushed what Happy hoped would be a chance to score.

One play into the final period, Randy Meredith intercepted another Happy pass, but the MC offense failed to take advantage of the turnover and punted.

In seven more plays Happy drove in for a TD, with a quarterback Julian

sneak from the one. The PAT again failed but the Cowboys were now leading for the first time 12-7. Three plays later MC lost the ball on a fumble on the 34 yard line. It proved to be the most costly as the Cowboys pushed in for another TD, covering 34 yards in eight plays. The score was 18-7.

But quarterback, Julian

Zabielski and the Matadors were not finished. Zabielski hit two long gainer passes, kept the ball himself for a seven yard gain and with 3rd and goal-to-go on the four yard line, he hit David Green for a touchdown. An attempted on side kick failed and time ran out for MC, as they were defeated 18-13.

Harvey Lee led in rushing with 111 yards in 16 carries, Charlie Campbell had 51 in 16. Julian Zabielski completed three of eight passes for 56 yards, and one Touchdown. Shawn Bearden had one of two for 18 yards and a TD.

David Green caught two passes for 40 yards and Dewight Campbell caught two for 41.

## Daylight Savings Time To End On Sunday

Daylight savings time ends at 2 a.m. Sunday, October 26, and clocks officially will be set back one hour, under the provisions of the 1966 Uniform Time Act.

Standard time remains in effect until the last Sunday in April.

Every time the time is changed people forget which way to turn the

clocks. And just about everyone grumbles "Well, I just wish they would leave the time like it is." Never is heard -- "Isn't it nice we get to save more daylight, use less electricity and our heating bills will be lower." -- or "It sure is nice to get back to Standard time now that the days are shorter."

At any rate people should remember to turn their clocks back in the fall (fall back in fall) and forward in the spring (spring forward in spring).

Before you go to bed Saturday set the clocks back one hour. And don't worry, you can make up that extra hour of sleep next April.

area.

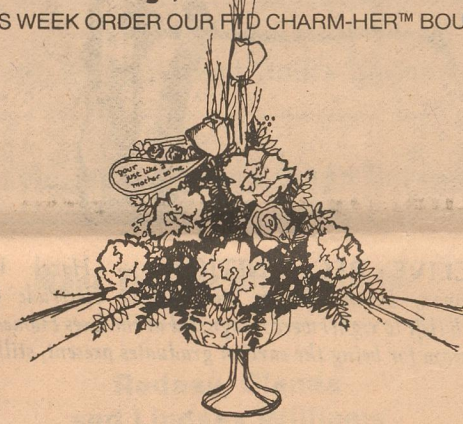
The "Weigh In" netted the club treasurer over \$7.00 and the members will weigh again at the next meeting.

**ANSWER:** Medicare hospital and medical insurance protection will end if your daughter's

entitlement to disability benefits ends before age 65. At 65, of course, she will be eligible for Medicare protection the rest of her life.

## Beef A Bargain Despite Higher Prices

Cattlemen and consumers have one major point in common—they can't understand why a steer at the feedlot brings only 68 cents per pound when a sirloin steak costs almost \$3 per pound.

However, the price difference sounds higher than it actually is, says Dr. Ed Uvacek, economist in livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Uvacek explains the price dilemma this way. "A Choice steer that weighs 1,000 pounds actually yields only about a 600-pound carcass. The other 400 pounds are by-products, some of which have value, such as hides and tallow.

"Even the beef carcass that is left is not all steaks and roasts," emphasizes the economist. "The average 600-pound carcass provides only about 50 pounds of sirloin steaks, 37 pounds of round steaks. Hamburger, stew meat and

miscellaneous cuts add up to another 146 pounds. Waste or cutting loss amounts to a huge 162 pounds."

At 68 cents per pound for the live steer, the average cost of all retail cuts from the carcass would have to be about \$1.56 per pound just to pay for the animal. This does not include any costs for slaughtering, wholesaling, cutting, wrapping, transporting or retailing, Uvacek points out.

Since the average national retail price for Choice beef is now about \$2.20 per pound, the consumer is paying only 64 cents per pound for the entire cost of all marketing and merchandising functions. "That's pretty cheap," contends the economist.

"What's ironic about all this is that while consumers are already getting a bargain, feedlot operators are losing about 10 cents a pound on that 68-cent live steer," Uvacek said.

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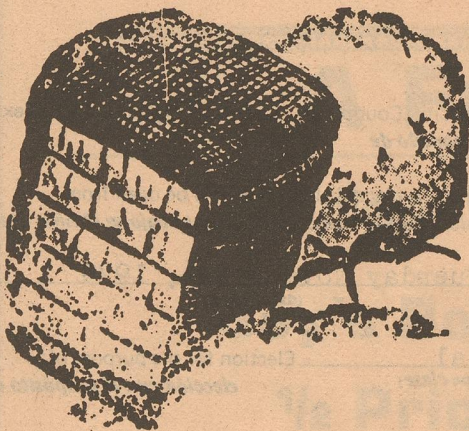

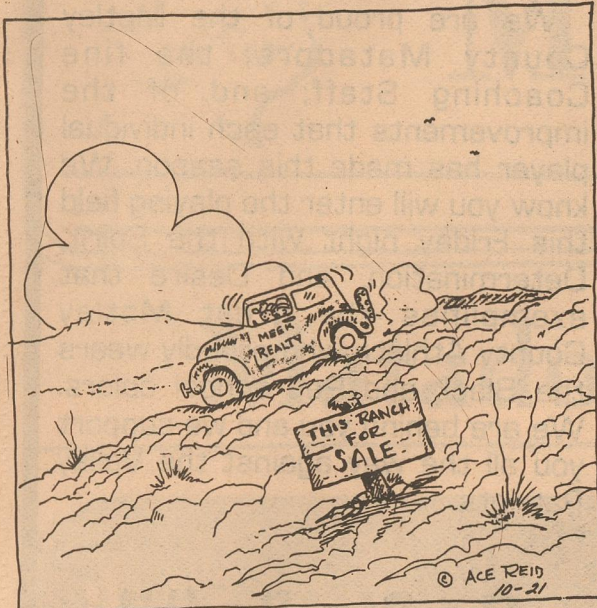

## Warning Issued For Swindlers

Social Security officials in the five-state Dallas Region have issued warning of a growing number of cases of swindlers who prey on older people by posing as social security employees.

"In the past two weeks, we have had at least eight cases of swindlers operating in New Mexico and southeastern Oklahoma," Ray Purcell, Manager of the Plainview Social Security office, said last week.

An 87 year old New Mexico man had saved \$1,358 to pay for his funeral. A con man, who posed as a Social Security Representative and said he would get the man more benefits, took the money and disappeared.

"Similar incidents occurred in other Spanish-speaking communities in New Mexico. A 64 year old man lost \$800 the same day, and another man lost \$600 the week earlier. An aged couple in Broken Bow, Oklahoma, lost \$260 to two swindlers posing as Social Security Representatives. One of the men, posing as a doctor,

said he would do a physical examination, and if their health were poor enough, they would receive from \$100 to \$125 more in benefits."

Other Social Security offices in McAlester, Hugo and Poteau, Oklahoma also have received several reports of people posing as Social Security employees in order to gain admittance to homes.

"Once inside, these people will try to steal money or other valuables, or sometimes will try to sell worthless junk," Purcell said. "In one case, three imposters entered a couple's home on the pretense that social security wanted to give them new carpet to help their arthritis.

The Social Security Administration urges everyone to be extremely cautious of anyone appearing at their home claiming to be a Social Security Representative. "We suggest that before admitting anyone, ask for identification, then call the Social Security office to verify that the person does work for Social Security and has been sent to your home."

Lightning kills an average of 600 people in the U.S., and injures 1,500 more every year, according to the National Wildlife Federation. In addition, lightning sets off 9,000 forest fires in a typical year.

Ninety-five percent of all species in the animal

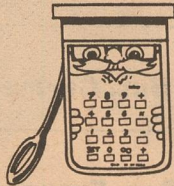

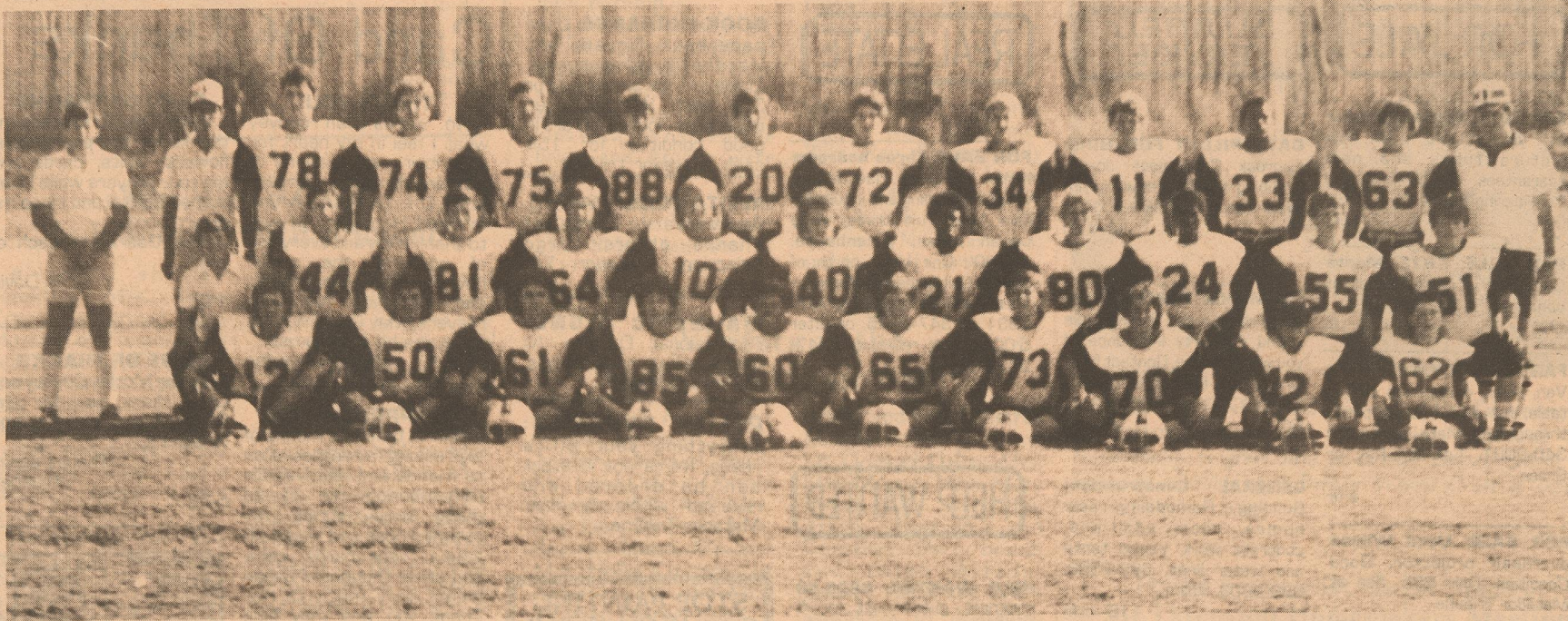
