# County Economy **Boosted By Oil**

The sale of Crude oil and Natural gas from Motley County wells in 1978 boosted the county economy and accounted for \$1.7-million of the \$17.1-billion value place on the Texas production last year, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the top producing counties of Texas, the Dallas-based Association said the county ranked 187th among the 202 counties having marketed production valued at \$100,000 or more, not including the sale of natural gas liquids.

The county's wells produced 185,000 barrels of crude oil, valued at \$1.7-million, and 16,783 Mcfs of natural gas, valued at \$17,000. Owners of royalty in the county received \$218,-000 as their share of the output, the Association

"Considering the shortfall in total U.S. petroleum production relative to our nation's energy needs, production from every Texas county is more vitally important today than ever before," said the Association's president, H.B. (Hank) Harkins of Alice, an independent producer and drilling

contractor. In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county also supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$80,500, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$79,300, while natural gas levies totalled \$1,200.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas operators spent a reported \$588,954 in the drilling of three dry

# Law Changes Right of Way On Ramps and Frontage Roads

AUSTIN — Texas drivers need to know about an important new law which will seriously affect how they drive on freeway frontage roads.

The change is so important that ignoring it could literally become a matter of life or death.

The law, passed in the recent session of the Texas Legislature, gives traffic entering or leaving freeway ramps the right of way over frontage road traffic.

It was signed by the governor on June 11, and becomes effective August

It reads in part:

"The driver of a vehicle proceeding on an access or feeder road of a controlled access highway shall yield the right of way to a vehicle entering or about to enter or leaving or about to leave the road to enter the highway.

Many ramps on Texas highways already are arranged that way, and YIELD and other signs are in place on the frontage roads for this kind of operation.

Other places where ramps and frontage roads meet, however, are not. There, the signs presently are arranged to require the ramp traffic to yield.

The situation is especially critical where the frontage road carries traffic in both directions. Ramp traffic both entering and leaving the freeway crosses opposing streams of traffic on the

frontage road.




