## A Second Glance

According to Top-O-Texas, Football Yearbook the Matadors of Motley County certainly have a reason to holler "ole."

Among the group of 12 returning lettermen are tackle Glen Calvert (6-0, 235) and fullback Harvey Lee (5-11, 185). Although both are only sophomores, they are expected to lead Motley County headlong into the District 2-B race.

But they aren't the only stalwarts returning for the Matadors.

There is also quarterback, Julian Zabielski (5-8, 160) and fellow backfield members Randy Meredith 5-11, 160) and tailback Charley Campbell (5-8, 160).

On the line, the Matadors will be led by strongboys David Walker (6-0, 200) and Joe Warren (6-3, 255). Both will hold down the tackle positions. Dewayne Walker (6-1, 210) is expected to challenge for a starting position.

Bill Palmer (5-10, 155) and Eddie Roys (5-7, 150) hold down the guard slots, while David Green (5-11, 170) and Dennis Gwinn (5-3, 110) play end.

Motley County, which went 2-8 last year, should be a much-improved ball club this time around. However, they will have to compete against always-tough Silverton, Nazareth, Valley and Claude for the loop title—no enviable job.

The red and black clad Matadors open the season against Class A kingpin Paducah. Playing one of the toughest non-conference slates, the Matadors will also meet Rochester, Crosbyton, Sudan and Class B power Jayton.

## Hale Center Cowboy Promoting First Book

"Remuda" is the Spanish word for a herd of horses, said longtime Hale Center cowboy, Carter White, who makes his living inspecting cattle for the Texas Animal Health Commission.

"The Big Remuda" is also the title of his very first book about "horses and family and friends." When he's not busy writing about horses and kids and memories, White tries to keep livestock fit for market and other purposes.

His book came after a great deal of thought and years of writing, he said. The illustrated magazine-style publication was printed at White's expense in Plainview, and he's been distributing it to West Texas retail outlets interested in selling it.

"It's 92 true stories about horses and people," said the native West Texan who occasionally finds it necessary in his work to ride horseback.

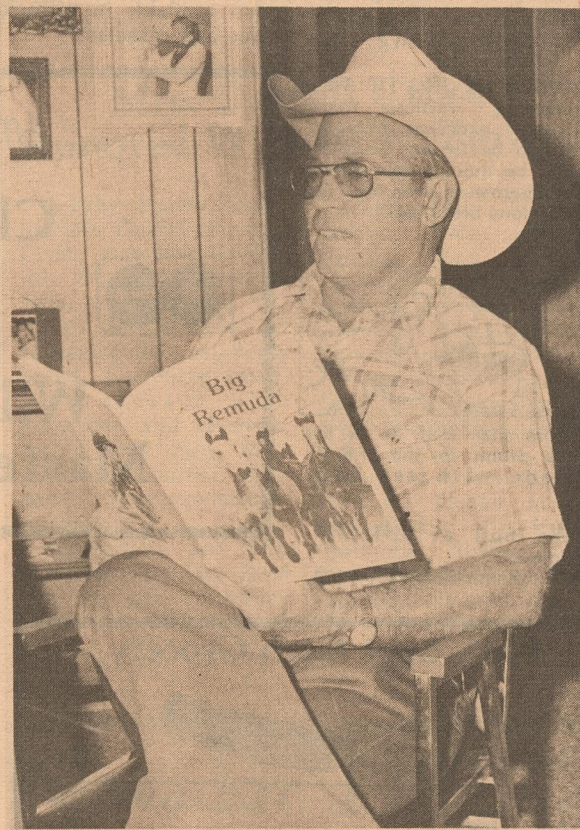
The book was written in memory of his brother-in-law, Billy Joe Woods, and Odessa resident.

"I've been around horses all my life," he recalled Monday. "I'm no rodeo cowboy...most of my experience has been out of necessity. That's why I do use horses a whole lot of the time on my job."

He said the 4-H Horse Club is stressed heavily in the last part of the book because, "The Texas 4-H Horse Club program is something I'm most proud of. It provides young people with something to do and enjoy and it keeps them off the streets."

White said the middle of the book may "slow down some because that's where I talk about breeding stock and the problems involved.

"There's a lot of real

close friends in this book," said White. "It's mainly about horses, even though family and other people are involved."

Writing horse stories, White naturally has to write about the people who rode the horses, and the combination adds up to a picture of life in West Texas — mostly in Garza and Lynn counties — dating back to the times of White's grandfather.

For the past seven years, White has been a livestock inspector for the Texas Animal Health Commission, and he still uses horses in his work in Hale, Lamb and Lubbock counties.

He grew up in Garza County and he has ranched, farmed and done a stint of oilfield work in times when a small ranching operation

revenue from sale of cemetery lots in the new section of the cemetery, it was pointed out that the cost of maintenance, such as wages for caretaker, and needed equipment, absorbs most of the funds from month to month.

East Mound Cemetery receives excellent care through the work and supervision of Mrs. Johnny (Evelyn) Jackson. Many residents also personally work the graves and care for the lots where loved ones are buried.

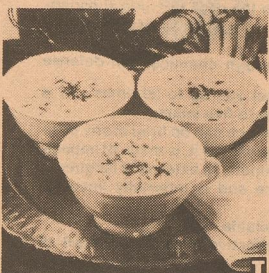
Parents of the prospective bridegroom are Mr. and Mrs. Gene Sledge of Midland.

### CURRIED APPLE SUPREME

1 1/2 cups diced apple  
2 tablespoons each flaked coconut, chopped onion  
2 teaspoons curry

powder  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 can (10 3/4 ounces) Campbell's condensed cream of chicken soup  
1/4 cup plain yogurt  
1/2 soup can milk

**Recent Letter**

Mr. Max Cleland, Administrator Veterans Administration Washington, DC 20000

Dear Mr. Cleland:

I didn't think I would ever be writing a letter of this type to a veteran, especially a disabled veteran, but you are a disgrace to all of us who have ever served.

With your appointment, we thought it would be ideal as you would know the plight of many, but you seem to have taken the attitude, "I've got mine, let's see how you can do!"

First, most of us earned even less a month than those who "managed" to stay behind earned a day, saying nothing of the risk in combat.

Second, veterans often received training in a skill that can't be used in civilian life, so they couldn't qualify for the higher paying jobs when they returned.

Third, the pensions veterans can qualify for are a joke. True, we have a pension system that no other country has, but the "paupers oath" that those who do not have a service connected disability to claim are a slap in the face to those who served.

Fourth, additional medical facilities and hospital beds are needed, nor less as you have sanctioned.

Fifth, it is OK for VA personnel salaries to increase, even though many should be fired for the lack of work and care they do or show, but do everything to cut the benefits to the veterans.

I could continue, but I know it is useless as you have shown no concern for those who you served with, or those who enabled you to be with us today. Many didn't make it back, but I did, and you did. I am not eligible for a pension until I am 60 because my service was a combination of active and reserve, but I am serving as a Veterans Service Officer without pay because of another job I have. Would you do this? I did it because there was no one else to help our veterans.

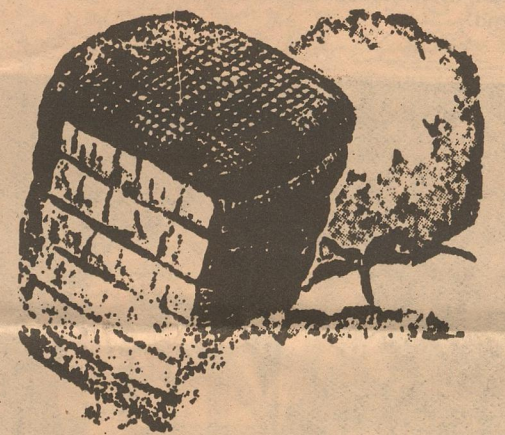
In Motley County, Cummins will be responsible for both adult and youth programs conducted by the Extension Service. He will also coordinate activities in pest management programs in that county.

### Social Security Tips

**Question:** I hired a gardener to do some landscaping and general gardening around my house this spring. I understand that I'm supposed to pay social security taxes on his wages and file a report with IRS. When should I do this?

**Answer:** If you pay a gardener or other household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in a calendar quarter, you must deduct social security taxes from the wages and pay an equal

amount as the employer. Send the taxes and a report of the wages to the Internal Revenue Service before the end of the month after the calendar quarter--before July 31 for the second quarter of 1979. The report, form 942 (Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees), is available from local IRS offices.

### Tower Blasts SALT II Treaty

Senator John Tower (R-Tex) told the members of the Senate Armed Services Committee last week that he would be reluctant to accept the SALT II treaty as currently written because it permits the Soviet Union to reach a level of nuclear warheads far in excess of what they now have, and would result in the United States entering any SALT II negotiations from a weak position.

"We have a bad treaty before us that permits the Soviets to reach as many as 21,000 warheads, regardless of what they might be planning to do--with or without SALT II. Considering that the Secretary of Defense and the Joint Chiefs have acknowledged that the United States will lose its 'essential equivalence' with the Soviet strategic forces in the early to mid 1980's--the period of the SALT II treaty--we would, therefore, be in an inferior position to begin SALT III," Tower stated.

In a dialogue with General David Jones, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Tower illustrated that the terms of the SALT II treaty permit the Soviet Union to have the following: 820 MIRVed ICBMs with 10 warheads

Tower also pointed out that if the Soviets exercised the option permitted under the treaty to place all their MIRVs at sea, the total would increase to 21,090 warheads. "I recognize the difficulty in predicting what the Soviet Union will do in the future. However, our experience in SALT I has been that they will build up to the limits. They have deployed 1,398 ICBMs and 950 SLBMs, exactly the number of launcher permitted under SALT I, to the missile," Tower added.

"We should send this treaty back to the drawing boards and try and negotiate a more favorable agreement. I fear that the bargaining position we will find ourselves in during the period of increased vulnerability will cause us to have to make decisions from weakness, resulting in concessions even more detrimental than those made in the final stages of SALT II," Tower concluded.

## What Am I Doing Wrong?

"What am I doing wrong?" is the query of more and more farmers as they complete harvesting another good wheat crop this year.

For the first time since the Soviet "steal" of the 1973 American wheat crop and wheat prices soared to the \$5 a bushel level, farmers saw prices rising before and during harvest. Speculation as to the cause of the rising prices came from many sources, such as the USDA and the CIA (yes, the Central Intelligence Agency). They unanimously agreed the Russians were experiencing another severe drought that would cause them to import huge quantities of grain this year.

Optimism was running high in farming areas and even the USDA predicted record incomes for farmers.

Now that the national harvest is nearing completion, farmers are wondering where the record incomes have gone. It seems Southern farmers harvested and sold before the price increase occurred, central states farmers were fortunate enough to be harvesting during this time, but very few sold thinking surely the government and other market analysts could be relied upon for judicial marketing information. Northern farmers who have any crop left to harvest after a massive invasion by grasshoppers or the devastating drought, do not see prices reflecting \$4 a bushel or anywhere near that level because wheat markets have dropped over 60¢ a bushel since the beginning of harvest!

As a matter of fact, the only grain sale this season that has been of the "windfall" category was that made jointly by Bunge Corp. and Continental Grain Co. in South Dakota to Taiwan amounting to 3 million bushels at \$5.50 a bushel, not be farmers!

Farmers, after investing another nine months of their lives, sweat, tears, and prayers into this year's wheat crop, have had to take again what the multi-national grain companies would offer to pay. When prices were highest this year, they were still only about 62% of parity. This means that the 38% farmers didn't receive in payment for their wheat came from equities in land and or machinery, increasing farm debt considerably.

We are fooling ourselves if we think we are not doing something wrong--we are; it's called planting and producing too much! We must each one of us cut back production to the bone or find new uses for our crops! We cannot afford to keep giving away our crops at below cost-of-production prices! We must stop being the patsy for the government, the nation, and the world by annually producing cheaper and cheaper food for them.

At all costs, our grain must be kept out of the hands of the multi-national grain companies who, in effect, "steal" it from us for a pittance and reap all the profits of our labors.

We cannot allow ourselves to be

duped into thinking there is nothing we can do and that we must accept prices offered by these companies! Their prices we receive will not be enough to pay off our mortgages and the financial day of reckoning will come sooner or later!

The possibility of new marketing sources for our crops, which ethanol production offers, is a different approach to cutting production. We need this new income source and we must keep it in the control of farmers!

Either we dive into ethanol production head first and help ourselves out of this cost-price squeeze depression or we will all disappear into the corporate farm structure which Secretary Bergland has forecast and says is the answer to the world shortage of food!

Remember farmers, you have everything to gain by supporting ethanol production. You have nothing to lose because unless you find and use alternate marketing sources for your crops, soon you will have no crops to market.

Most farmers are not anxious to see their farms forced into bankruptcy, bought by a foreign investor, or absorbed into a multi-national corporation. They hope to see their land passed on to their children, because unlike the leaders of their government, they believe in the survival of the family farm unit will do everything in their power to insure its preservation!

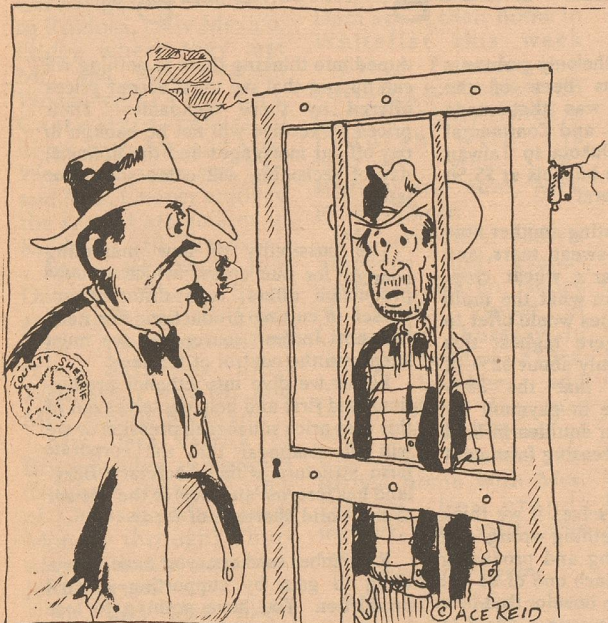

### The Consumer Alert

by Mark White  
Attorney General

AUSTIN—The State of Texas spends approximately one billion dollars annually on its Medicaid Program. Although the program does a commendable job in assuring medical care for the needy, experience teaches that any government program involving such vast expenditures of public money carries with it the potential for some fraud.

In recognition of the potential for a limited amount of fraud in the Texas Medicaid Program, one of my first acts as Attorney General was to form a Medicaid Fraud Control Unit within the Consumer Protection Division: This Unit is charged with the responsibility of investigating cases of suspected fraud among the eighteen thousand institutions and individuals who provide medical care to Medicaid recipients.

Based in Austin, the Unit is staffed by attorneys, investigators, auditors and a limited support staff. These personnel, in cooperation with local district attorneys, investigate, and if warranted, refer for prosecution, cases of suspected fraud which involve physicians, dentists, pharmacists, hospitals, nursing homes, laboratories and any other person or organization that receives payment from the State for services rendered to Medicaid recipients.

The cases handled by the Unit are as varied as the individuals who provide the services. And, although fraud does not appear to be widespread in the program, the work of the Unit so far indicates that there are a limited number of health care providers who try to take unfair advantage of the system:

-A psychiatrist, practicing in Travis County, recently was convicted of billing the State for services to patients when
