The annuals will be sold for \$6.00 each this year. There will be a table in the lobby of the school before school and during the noon lunch hour where you will be able to buy your annual.

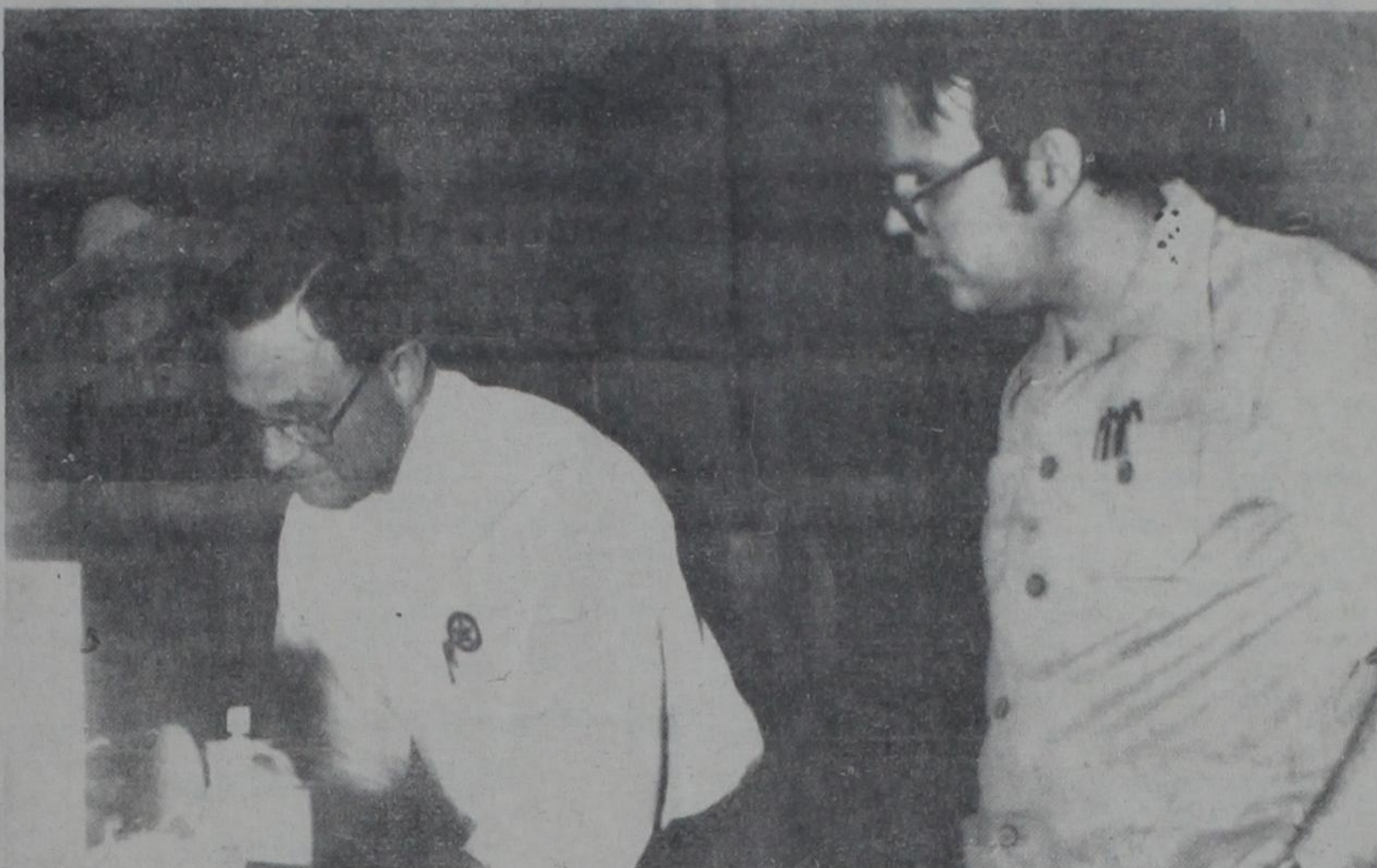

INVESTIGATE BURGLARY - Motley County Sheriff Alton Marshall and Sargeant Bud Newberry, Texas Ranger of Lubbock conducted an investigation into the burglary of Bob Stanley Pharmacy Thursday morning, while James Stanley looks on.

Pharmacy Burglarized

Bob Stanley Pharmacy was burglarized early Thursday morning, when vandals used a prize bar to gain entry to the west door entrance. Drawers were ransacked in the burglary, but only two bottles of drugs were known to have been taken.

The burglary was discovered by James Stanley when he came to open the store at about 8:00 a.m. Thursday morning. He summoned Sheriff Alton Marshall and Sheriff Marshall, along with Sargeant Bud Newberry, Texas Ranger from Lubbock investigated the break in, which was reported to have occurred somewhere between midnight and 1:00 a.m. Thursday.

It is believed that the vandals may have been scared away by a burglar alarm in the store that sounded when they entered. They made their escape through the back door entrance.

A similar break in occurred in Floydada on the same night at Arwines Pharmacy, where drugs were also taken. It is believed that the break ins may be related, although there is no proof to this at this time.

No new clues have been turned up but there are suspects in the case.

Stanley Pharmacy was robbed once before, in May, 1975 when burglars broke the plate glass window on the east front side and stole approximately \$100 and a quantity of drugs.

Ground Hog To Look For Shadow

55 MPH Speed Limit Is Supported

AUSTIN — The Texas truck and bus industry, in a letter mailed recently to Governor Dolph Briscoe, has reiterated its support of the 55-mile-per hour speed limit on the highways of Texas.

"With public attention drawn to highway safety as the result of recent heavy holiday travel, this seems an appropriate time for those of us who use the highways of Texas to do business to remind other motorists of the hazards of speed," said Texas Motor Transportation Association Chairman Edgar O. Weller, president of Frozen Foods Express Inc., in Dallas, in his letter to the Governor.

The organized truck and bus industry, through TMTA, was among the first organizations to endorse Governor Briscoe's 55-mile-per-hour program when it was announced in November, 1973. In fact, a news release announcing the industry's support was issued just moments after the November 28, 1973 news conference in which the Governor outlined his proposals.

Weller also points out the success of the industry in encouraging commercial drivers to support the speed laws. "... According to a September, 1977 publication by the U.S. Department of Transportation, entitled '55 MPH Fact Book,' our efforts to comply have resulted in better traffic safety records for the industry: 'Since 1974 the number of trucks and buses exceeding the speed limit has declined sharply. Trucks actually have a better compliance record than automobiles.'"

Enumerated in the letter are the efforts which the truck and bus industry makes to promote compliance among its members, including self-policing and personal insurance credit for drivers whose safety records warrant it.

With approximately 1,000 members, Texas Motor Transportation Association represents the organized truck and bus industry in Texas. Headquarters are in Austin, Texas.

Winter Critical To County Livestock

With the recent cold weather and the long dry spell the wildlife of Motley County could be in for hard times. Winter is a critical time for wildlife, such as deer, turkey, quail and rabbits, as food is in short supply.

The Soil Conservation Service says that landusers can reduce some of these problems by planning and carrying out conservation practices that benefit wildlife. The basic needs of all outdoor "Critters" are food and cover. If a landuser can enhance what is naturally available he can produce better management of his available resources.

Thinning, but not destruction, of existing shelterbelts is beneficial, and planting of new shelterbelts with wildlife plants in the mixture is good.

Other practices that may benefit wildlife are proper grazing of pasture and rangeland, leaving standing stubble in the field or fence row, plantings of beneficial plants such as Russian olive, sand plum, kleingrass, engelmann daisy and bundleflowers.

The Soil Conservation Service, located in the Motley County Courthouse, is available to assist landusers in planning and applying conservation practices that will benefit wildlife. The future of abundant wildlife rests in the hands of good land managers.

SAC Bomber To Fly Near Matador

Strategic Air Command (SAC) bombers will fly a new low level training route in Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas. The new route began on January 20 and will be used until January 10, 1979.

The giant eight-engine B-52 Stratofortresses and swing-wing FB-111 fighter-bombers will fly the training route at subsonic speeds along a center line of an eight mile wide corridor at altitudes ranging from 600 to 2,000 feet above the ground. The route will be used to measure precision bombing, navigation training and electronic countermeasure activity.

Aircraft do not carry bombs on these training flights. All bombing is simulated and radar scored by ground based scoring sites. Radar bomb scoring (RBS) equipment will be located near La Junta, Colo.; Hitchland, Tex.; Lefors, Tex.; and Post, Tex. These sites, using radio and radar signals, measure the accuracy of simulated bomb releases and simulated launching of short range attack missiles. (SRAMS).

The Strategic Air Command conducts low-level bombing and navigation training to assure bomber crews are kept combat ready at all times. The routes are changed periodically to provide unfamiliar targets and radar returns. Populated areas are avoided as much as possible and all routes are coordinated with the Federal Aviation Administration.

Aircrews flying this training route, designated "Oliver Branch 55," will begin descending from high altitude north of Goodland, Kansas. They will begin the low level portion of the route south of Yuma, Colo., proceed south toward La Junta, where they will make a left turn and fly toward Boise City, Okla.

From north of Boise City, aircrews will fly southeasterly to the Oklahoma-Texas border near Higgins, make an 120-degree right turn and fly toward Amarillo, Texas. Southeast of Amarillo, aircrews will turn left and fly to Silverton, making another left turn toward Matador. Aircrews will exit the low level portion southeast of Post. After exiting, aircrews will make a turn toward Jayton, and continue to climb to a higher altitude.

This low level course has both an alternate entry and exit point. The alternate entry is near Boise City, and the alternate exit point is east of Amarillo near Shamrock.

Aircrews desiring additional training at the completion of simulated bomb releases near Lefors, will make an 180-degree turn near Clarendon, fly northeast toward Cheyenne, Okla., and re-enter the route north of Wheeler.

Study Club Given Checklist On Crime

A checklist on crime presented by Mrs. John Hamilton for El Progreso Study Club, Thursday, January 26, at the home of Mrs. Franklin Price was a "Hands Up" program as required by the Texas Federation of Women's Club. The Hands Up movement is a national volunteer effort to halt crime, and a project of General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Following the business session, conducted by Mrs. Price, club president, Mrs. Hamilton introduced her subject by quoting statistics taken from FBI report for 1975, "Crime in the United States."

"Twenty-one serious crimes are committed every minute in this country," she declared. "A violent crime occurs every 31 seconds; one murder is committed every 26 minutes; a forcible rape every 9 minutes; aggravated assault occurs every 65 seconds; robbery every 68 seconds, and a motor vehicle is stolen every 32 seconds."

These were cited as only a few of the crimes studied. Mrs. Hamilton also pointed out that a large percent (77) of persons arrested for robbery were under the age of 25 and that 58 per cent were under age 21.

Almost three-fourths of the offenders released after serving prison terms were rearrested within four years, she said.

After presenting these figures, Mrs. Hamilton then outlined procedures for self protection. She was joined by other members who offered comments regarding safety measures for the home, and how victims, especially women, should cope if assaulted. Murders and other crimes in this area were cited. It was noted that crime is greater in larger communities, and that one method of combatting it is in neighborhood involvement, or "watch."

Mrs. Hamilton also stressed that personal items, such as tools, cameras, radios, etc., should be given identification with a small, engraving machine, to aid in their recovery if stolen. Credit card and mail frauds were other crimes discussed.

"We are familiar with home improvement, self improvement and health improvement... in the end you are your own best protection, if you know what to do," she summed up, and concluded the program with the Inspirational Thought for the day.

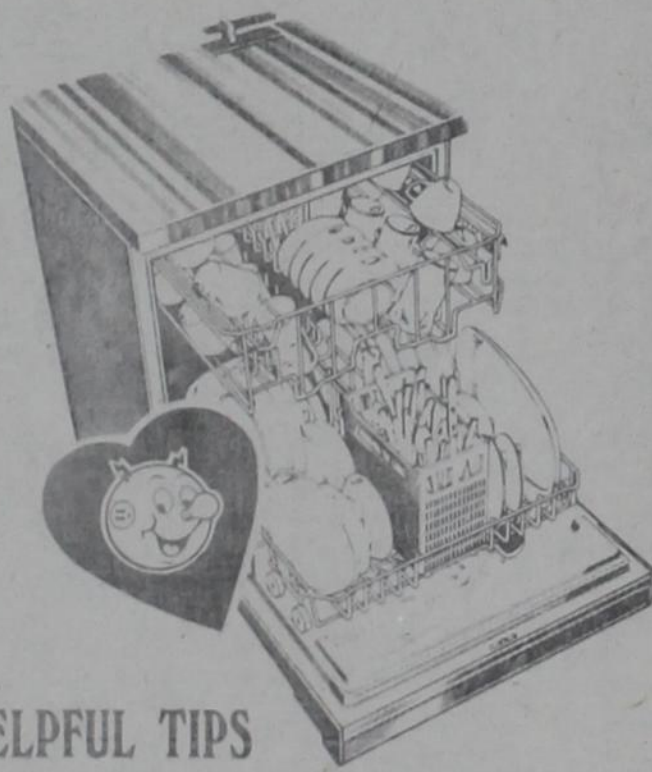
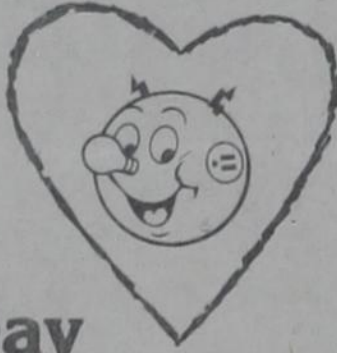

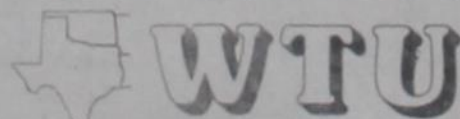

TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF WATER RESOURCES PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE

A Hearing Commission of the Texas Department of Water Resources will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Feb. 28, 1978, County Courthouse, Lamar County Courthouse, Paris, Texas and at 1:30 p.m. March 1, 1978, Room 216, Amarillo Building, 301 S. Polk, Amarillo, Texas in order to receive testimony concerning Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. This document is the first of two volumes which, upon completion of Volume II, will form the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. Volume I, Basic Data Report, includes information on existing wastewater treatment facilities; existing water quality; existing land use patterns; existing population; and projections of economic growth, population, and probable land use patterns. Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will present the recommended plans for water quality management and the legal, financial, and institutional requirements of each plan. Also included in Volume II will be descriptions of feasible alternatives an environmental assessment, and a summary of the public participation activities conducted during the development of the plan. The Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin is being developed to satisfy the requirements of Section 208 of the Federal Water Pollution Act Amendments of 1972, and pursuant to Title 40 Code of Federal Regulations Parts 130 and 131 and the State of Texas Continuing Planning Process. The public hearing shall be conducted in compliance with Section 26.037 (formerly Section 21.089), Texas Water Code: The study area for this plan includes most of the Red River Basin. This plan will not address the planning required in the Texarkana Designated Area-wide Planning Area; detailed planning within that area will be provided through the development of the Texarkana Area-wide Waste Treatment Management Plan and will not be considered at this hearing.

Copies of the Basic Data Report will be made available for public inspection at the following locations: Texas Department of Water Resources Offices, Stephen F. Austin Building, 1700 North Congress Avenue, Austin, Texas; Texas Department of Water Resources District 1 Office, 301 S. Polk, Room 306, Amarillo, Texas 79106; Texas Department of Water Resources District 2 Office, 4819 Avenue Q, Lubbock, Texas 79412; Texas Department of Water Resources District 3 Office, 203 James Collins Blvd., Duncanville, Texas 75116; Texas Department of Water Resources District 4 Office, 3801 Highway 42 North, Kilgore, Texas 75662; and the Red River Authority of Texas, 302 Hamilton Building, Wichita Falls, Texas 76301. Copies of Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will be made available at these same locations when completed in June, 1978. However, the hearing cited in this notice will consider only Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. Requests for copies of the Basic Data Report and

The public is encouraged to attend the hearing and to present evidence or opinions as to the accuracy of the existing and projected data compiled in the Basic Data Report. Written testimony which is submitted prior to or during the public hearing will be included in the record. The Hearing Commission would appreciate receiving a copy of all testimony at least five (5) days before the hearing. The testimony and questions concerning the report should be addressed to Gordon W. RESIDENT'S FATHER DIES

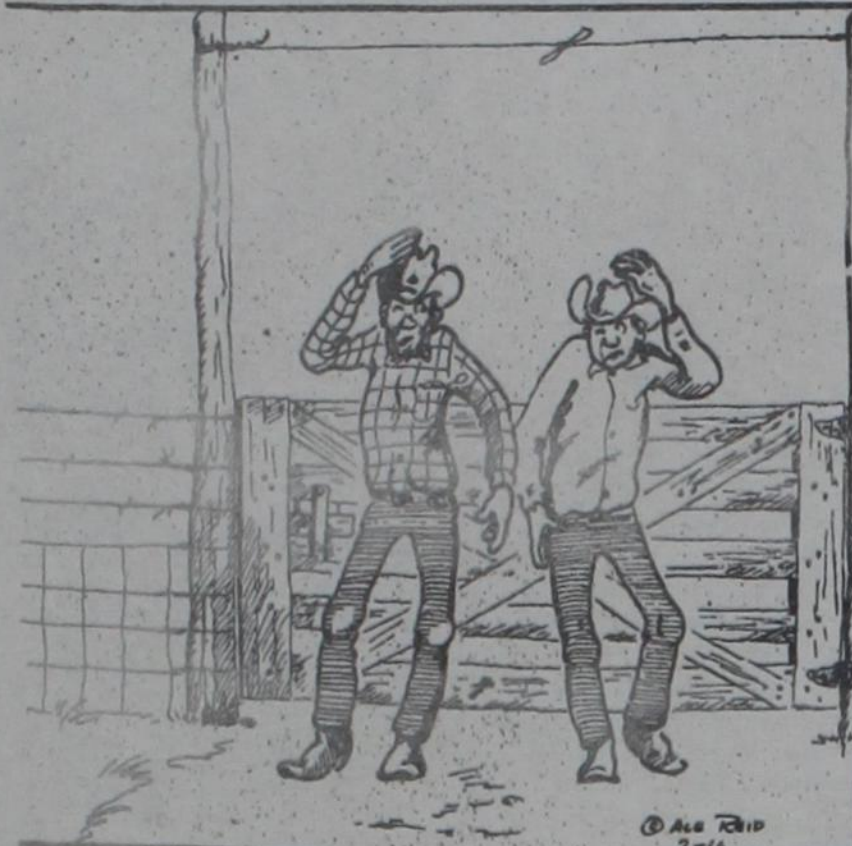
