Martin Is Delegate To Convention

Wilburn Z. Martin will be Motley County ISD delegate for the 99th State Convention of the Texas State Teachers Association, March 16-18 at the Dallas Memorial Convention Center. Mr. Martin, who is from Plomot, will be accompanied by his wife, Trula.

Mr. Martin will be among the thousands of TSTA members and guests expected to attend, and will be a voting representative to the 1978 TSTA house of delegates.

This official governing body will be meeting during the convention to act on proposed amendments to the TSTA constitution and consider committee reports, resolutions, and other business. First delegate session begins March 17 at 4:00 p.m.

The official delegates -- numbering about 1,500 -- are elected from the more than 500 TSTA local associations throughout the state. They are certified by districts on the basis of one delegate per 100 members or major fraction of 100, to represent the members of TSTA. Every local association is entitled to at least one official delegate.

Livestock Show Is Monday

Date for the 38th annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show sponsored by the Motley County Livestock Association will be Monday, March 20. FFA and 4-H members, under the supervision of local advisors will be showing steers, lambs, market hogs, breeding hogs and rabbits. The heifer class is open to anyone living in Motley County, owning land in Motley County or Junior exhibitors eligible to show in the Motley County Jr. Livestock Show. Billy Roach, County Extension Agent from Snyder will again serve as judge.

The show will begin at 10:00 a.m. at the old Matador FFA building, with hogs, lambs, rabbits and heifers to be shown in the morning. The steer show will start at 1:30 p.m. the sale of top animals will follow the steer show.

J. C. Cross of Matador, will again serve as announcer. The concession stand will be operated by the Matador Jaycees.

School Board Meets

The Motley County School Board met Monday, March 13 in the Motley County School. Business discussed included adopting Drug Education Policies, Special Education policies, five year priorities plan for accreditation, and textbooks for 1978 - 79. Other items discussed were the old High School Building in Matador, unemployment compensation, tax assessor and the hiring of new teachers. It was decided that the three days lost due to bad weather will be made up on May 22, 23 and 24.

Post Office Sets Packaging Rules

New regulations on the packaging and wrapping of parcels became effective March 9, the U.S. Postal Service announced.

The new rules reflect established commercial standards and apply to all mailers, both individual and businesses, using the Postal Service.

The new recommendations include:

1. The use of fiberboard containers in strengths directly related to the weight and nature of the parcel contents. Heavier containers must be used for heavier loads.

2. It is recommended that paper wrappers not be used on fiberboard containers. Experience shows such wrappers can be torn and lost in handling, and the address and return address of the parcel lost.

3. A clarification of closure and reinforcement requirements with the recommendation that pressure-sensitive, reinforced tape be used for closing and reinforcing containers, instead of twine or cord.

The Postal Service said more details on the new regulations will be available at post offices.

MOTLEY INCLUDED IN AID REQUEST

AUSTIN-Motley County was included Tuesday in Gov. Dolph Briscoe's request that three Texas counties be declared disaster areas to qualify farmers and ranchers for emergency loans through the federal government.

In a letter to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, Briscoe also requested the disaster area designation for Knox and Dallas counties to help cover losses caused by severe weather from Nov. 12, 1976 to February 27, 1978.

Briscoe also asked the Small Business Administration to allow eligible residents of 102 Texas counties to participate in a physical disaster loan program through which more financial aid might be available. Federal estimates, he said, show 114,765 farmers and ranchers in those counties have suffered estimated losses of \$459,860,122 during the past year.

School Building Soon To Be Razed

Concerned citizens attended the meeting of Motley County School Board Monday night when it was learned that the old Matador High School building will soon be razed, unless feasible proposals are submitted to retain it for use as a possible community center and museum.

While sentiment was high in favor of keeping the structure intact for civic uses, logic was not a discounted element in the discussion as it turned to the cost of repairs which would be necessary, after three years of disuse, as well as the cost of maintenance after restoration.

Broken windows and other forms of vandalism during the past three years also were pointed out as detrimental issues to be considered.

Interested persons have already begun the process of obtaining information as to whether the building can be converted into a profitable and usable facility, if necessary funding can be secured. As one spokesperson said, "The time has come to implement a program or forget it. When we look -- the first thing needed it money -- much money; then work -- much work!"

It was pointed out that some persons would like the auditorium to be used. Others are interested in a location for a museum, while others point to a need for a school library and meeting rooms for clubs.

"None of these will bring in money unless productions and other entertainment in the auditorium are charged for, and a charge is made for the museum," it was pointed out. "These might bring in enough to pay for maintenance by the year, but not for refurbishment of the building to make it usable in the first place."

The school board will go ahead with plans to advertise bids for demolishing the building, but pointed out that it probably would be sometime in May before anything definite would be decided. Plans are to use the site for expanding the parking lot which has already replaced the campus on the north side of the building.

When the parking lot was laid out early last year, the water and sewer lines were detached. Since the heating system and electricity were already disconnected, these will be only a starter for replacements which will be needed, according to a preliminary survey.

Since money is the first consideration, these questions were posed by those who attended the meeting:

- Are you interested in trying to recapture the building for a county museum and civic center?
 - Are you willing to contribute labor? If so, to what extent?
- It was further noted that although a grant might be secured, usually a matching amount of money must be made by the people seeking the grant.

his net income, and net income is the only thing that really counts. The first meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, March 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the Motley County School lunchroom in Matador, and the second meeting is set for Friday, March 31 at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Building in Quitaque.

A former Motley County Game Warden, Weldon Fromm has been appointed the new regional law enforcement supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, according to an announcement by Henry Burkett, executive director of the department.

The post was vacated as Ted Wheelis retired in February. The Lubbock regional position has such a varied law enforcement responsibility that the new appointment was necessary to keep the three district offices in Ailene, Amarillo and Lubbock operating in full swing.

"The Panhandle and South Plains have had many water safety accidents, and I plan to stress strict enforcement of water safety rules as the spring fishing and summer boating season nears," said Fromm.

"Also, more emphasis will be put on landowner-sportsman relationship by all P&WD personnel working the Lubbock region," Fromm commented.

An increase in the number of trespass and shooting-from-the-road violations have been noted by the former Amarillo supervisor.

Fromm plans to study the problems in the huge Lubbock region and comments and suggestions as to law enforcement problems are welcome at the various P&WD offices in northwest Texas.

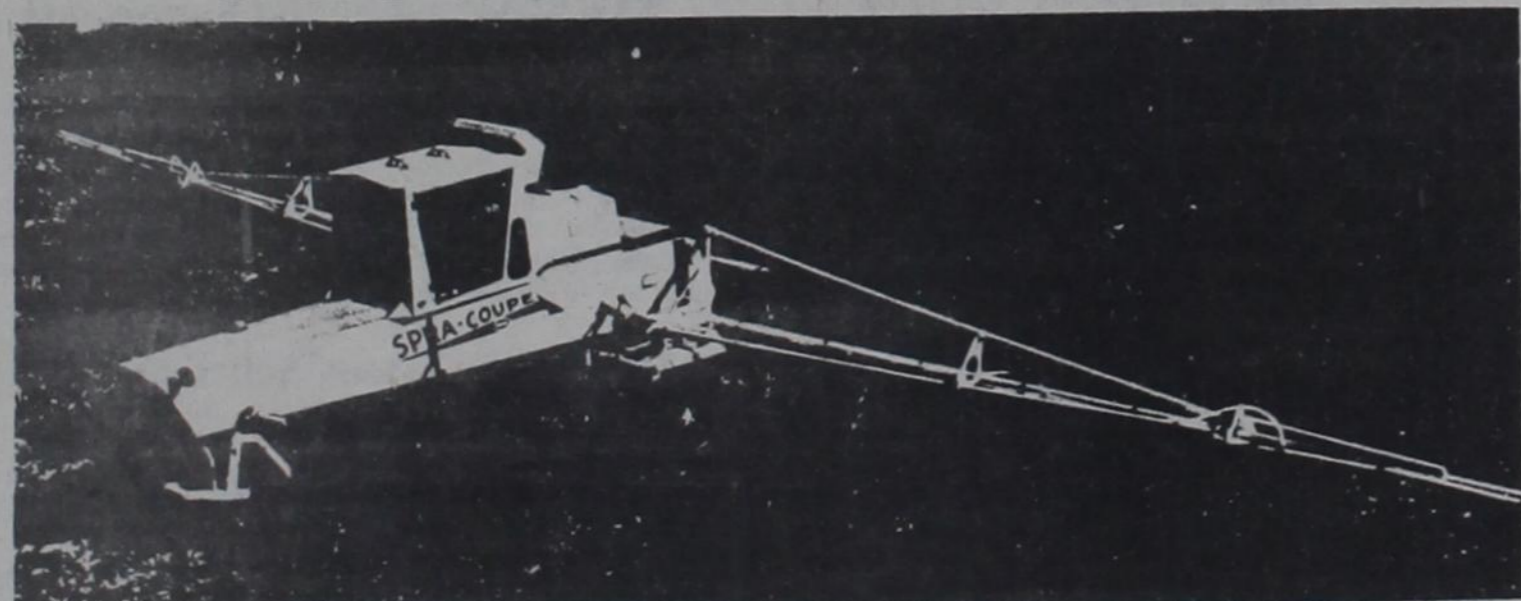

Program On Safety Presented For Club

A program on highway safety was presented Thursday, March 9, for members of El Progreso Club in regular meeting at the home of Mrs. E. A. Day. Speaker was resident Trooper Neal Haralson with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Mrs. R. E. Campbell Jr., served as program leader and presented the local highway patrolman in one of the club's most interesting programs, heightened by member participation.

Trooper Haralson centered his talk on defensive driving which he followed with a film clip on this subject.

"Try to obey traffic laws - this is half the battle," he advised. "Look out for the other driver - check every five seconds in your rear view mirror and allow enough space between your car and others ahead. Relinquish your right of way to avoid an accident... and don't hesitate to use your horn - that's what it's for."

He cited hazardous intersections as responsible for numerous accidents, and said that locally, many accidents occur on unmarked, dirt streets. "We don't know how many accidents occur which are unreported where damage was considered minor."

Many pointers for safe driving were given in the talk and in the film, titled "Focus - Defensive Driving Tactics."

The mental attitude of the driver when he gets in the car is responsible for many accidents, according to the film. It was pointed out that most accidents begin ahead of the time and place of the actual happening. Sometimes an accident can be traced to an argument at home, with the driver leaving in an angry mood and not concentrating on his driving.

The proposed changes in rates, with some increasing and others decreasing, will reduce General's gross revenues from its Texas operations by \$2,565.00.

This week has been proclaimed by Gov. Allen Shivers and Mayor Douglas Meador as "Korean Veterans Appreciation Week."

REEVES URGES FARMERS TO KEEP UNITED FRONT...State Legislature, Rep. Elbert Reeves, Friday night urged farmers to keep a united front in protection of their future welfare. He was principal speaker at the annual kickoff supper of the Motley County Farm Bureau, held in the Matador school lunch room.

"Farmers have already lost more in Austin and Washington than through crop failures," Rep. Reeves declared, "and many changes are in process. Perhaps never at any period in history has it been so essential that farmers remain united and present a solid front in demanding the place in the economic scheme of the nation and the world."

"Many things must be righted before we can expect farm prices to adjust themselves. Washington is now declaring that supply and demand will make its own adjustment, but supply and demand is made ineffective by Government interference. There is no way for the farmer to profit while the farm policy is governed by international bankers..."

A government economist here early this year investigated the possibility of a small, low-rent housing unit in Matador, and explained to members of the board and Mayor Douglas Meador, the problems which the board would face.

Veterans Failing To Apply For Benefits

Many eligible veterans residing in Texas are failing to apply for State benefits to which they might be entitled. According to Bill Palmeyer Veterans Service Officer for Motley County, many veterans are still unaware of their possible entitlement to certain benefits provided through the State government of Texas.

A veteran residing in Texas is entitled to free Disabled Veteran license plates for his personal automobile if he has service-connected disabilities which are rated 70 percent or more by either the U.S. Veterans Administration or a branch of the Armed Forces of the United States. A veteran who has service-connected disabilities of 60 percent or more is entitled to free Texas drivers license.

Another benefit provided by State law is a property tax exemption for veterans with service-connected disabilities of 10 percent or more, and for widows and widowers of veterans whose disability ratings of 10 percent or more, were in existence at the time of their deaths. Also eligible for a property tax exemption is the spouse of a person who died or was killed during military service, and the minor children of such active duty deceased persons. The tax exemption runs from the first \$1,500 of the assessed value for a 10 percent rating, to a maximum of the first \$3,000 of assessed value for the 10 percent rating. The exemption for the spouses of deceased servicemen is the first \$2,500 of the assessed value.

Another benefit is free admission to all State Parks in Tex. for veterans with service-connected disabilities rated 60 percent or more or suffered the loss of use of a lower extremity.

All of these benefits are provided through laws passed by the State Legislature, and additional information on them, and others, can be obtained from your local Veterans Service Officer.

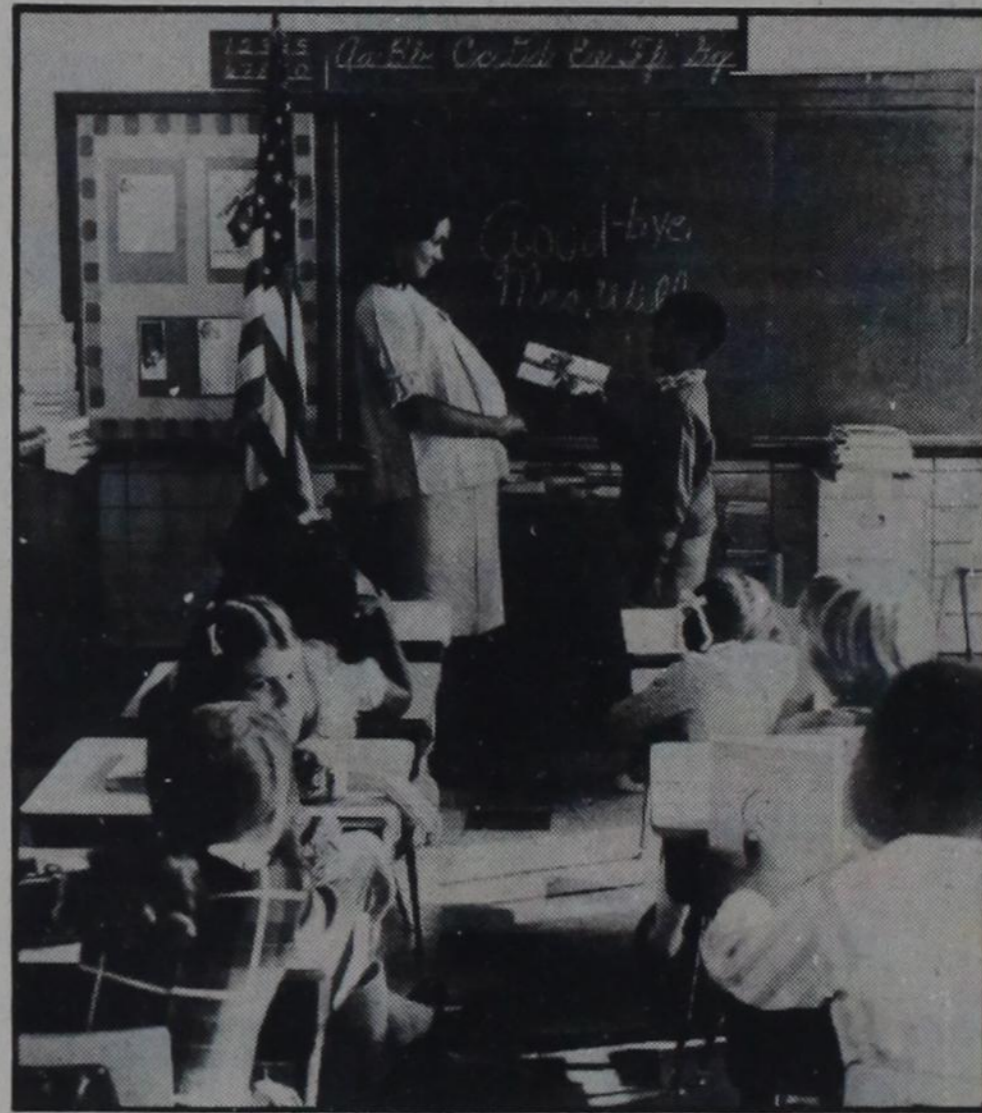

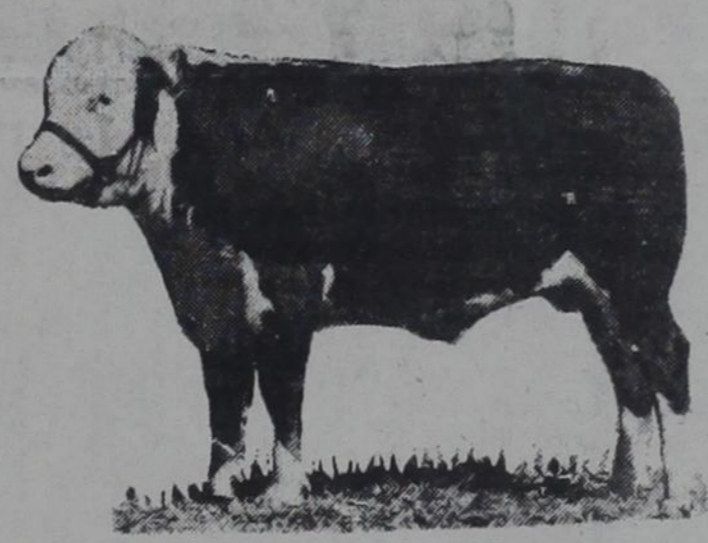

National Wildlife Week Is March 19-25

"Wildlife Needs You" is the theme of the 1978 National Wildlife Week March 19-25.

The conservation endeavor is sponsored by the National Wildlife Foundation with the help of the Sportsmen's Club of Texas, Inc.

James Gillespie, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Matador, said his agency is cooperating with the observance by offering publications about wildlife to interested people.

"All of us in SCS have a keen appreciation of wildlife," Gillespie said. "Wildlife provides esthetic, environmental, economic and other benefits. Since they need food, cover, and water, the best way to help wildlife is to provide adequate habitat."

Most wildlife in Texas inhabits privately owned farms and ranches, Gillespie said. This land provides hunting, fishing, trapping, and other values inherent in a well-balanced landscape and the fish and wildlife it supports. For that reason, farmers and ranchers play a key role in maintaining wildlife populations.

Gillespie said the following publications can be obtained from his office:

Invite Birds To Your Home - This booklet lists 20 plants that can be grown in conservation landscape plantings in Texas and gives the number of bird species that use each variety.

Catfish Farming - This USDA publication, written by four SCS biologists, tells how to grow channel catfish, blue catfish and white catfish in ponds, raceways or cages.

Russian Olive for Wildlife and Other Conservation Uses - Tells how to grow this small tree that produced food eaten by more than 50 birds and mammals; adapted to dry, cool climates.

The genial science teacher was recognized for his work in preserving historical sites and artifacts as well as for his work in schools and other organizations in the fields of archaeology and geology.

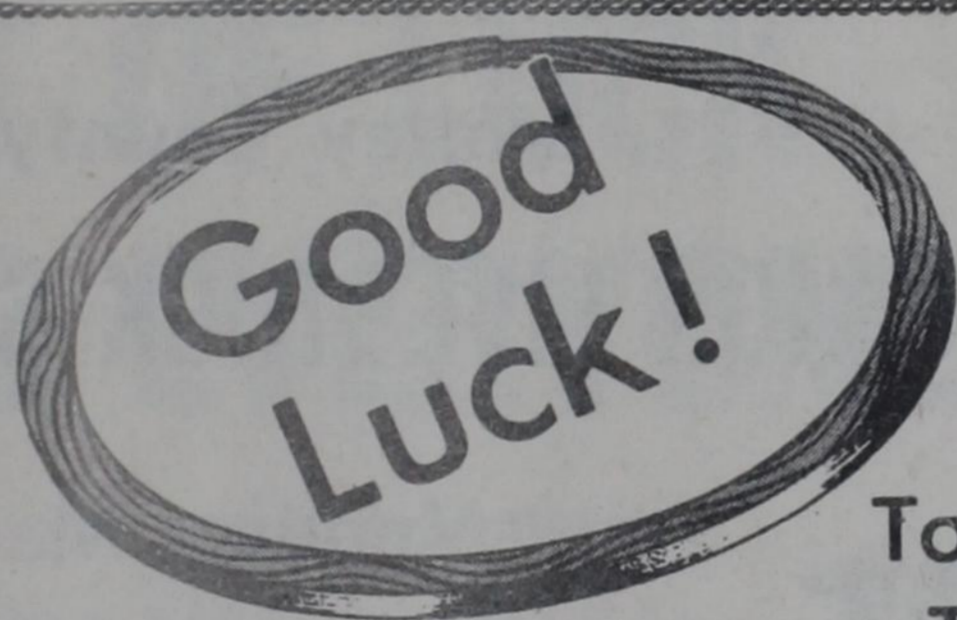

A Hearing Commission of the Texas Department of Water Resources will conduct a public hearing beginning at 1:00 p.m., March 30, 1978, Room 216, Amarillo Building, 301 S. Polk, Amarillo, Texas in order to receive testimony concerning Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. This hearing was previously scheduled for March 1, 1978. This document is the first of two volumes which, upon completion of Volume II, will form the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. Volume I, Basic Data Report, includes information on existing wastewater treatment facilities; existing water quality; existing land use patterns; existing population; and projections of economic growth, population and probable land use patterns. Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will present the recommended plans for water quality management and the legal, financial, and institutional requirements of each plan. Also included in Volume II will be descriptions of feasible alternatives, an environmental assessment, and a summary of the public participation activities conducted during the development of the plan.

The Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin is being developed to satisfy the requirements of Section 208 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, and pursuant to Title 40 Code of Federal Regulations Parts 130 and 131 and the State of Texas Continuing Planning Process. The public hearing shall be conducted in compliance with Section 26.037 (formerly Section 21.089), Texas Water Code. The study area for this plan includes most of the Red River Basin. This plan will not address the planning required in the Texarkana Designated Areawide Planning Area; detailed planning within that area will be provided through the development of the Texarkana Areawide Waste Treatment Management Plan and will not be considered at this hearing.

Copies of the Basic Data Report will be made available for public inspection at the following locations: Texas Department of Water Resources Offices, Stephen F. Austin Building, 1700 North Congress Avenue, Texas; Texas Department of Water Resources District 1 Office, 301 S. Polk, Room 306, Amarillo, Texas 79106; Texas Department of Water Resources District 2 Office, 4819 Avenue Q, Lubbock, Texas 79412; Texas Department of Water Resources 4 Office, 203 James

Collins Blvd., Duncannon, Texas 75116; Texas Department of Water Resources District 5 Office, 3801 Highway 42 North, Kilgore, Texas 75662; and the Red River Authority of Texas, 302 Hamilton Building, Wichita Falls, Texas 76301. Copies of Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will be made available at these same locations when completed in June, 1978.

However, the hearing cited in this notice will consider only Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin.



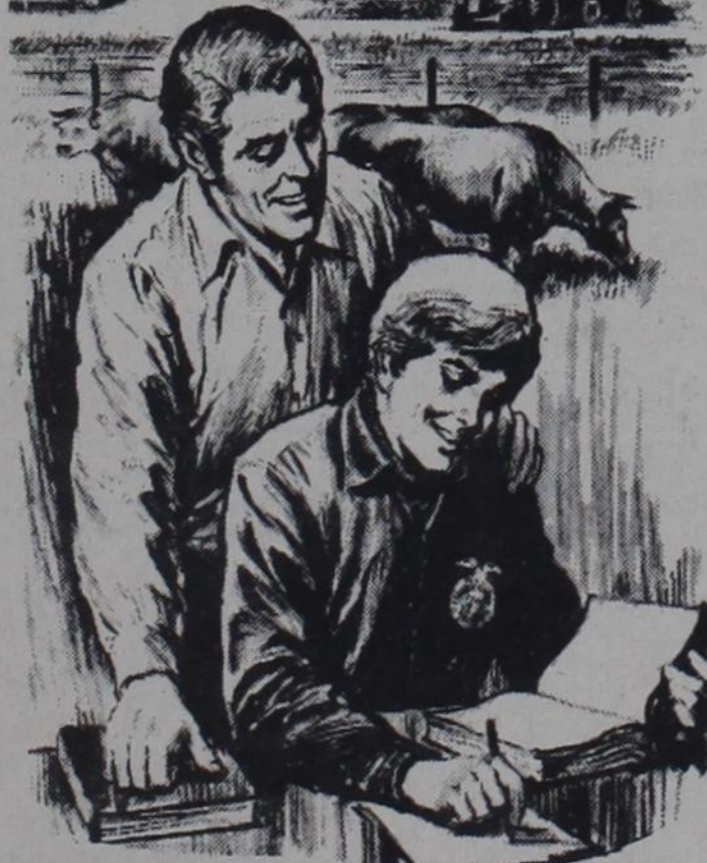
